A NEW PLAN OF CAMPAIGN.

REPRESENTATIVES OF THE DEMOCRATS AND POPULARS OF THE UNITED STATES have developed a plan of campaign designed to ensure the success of the "free-liver."

"In each State bound by this contract each of said political parties shall have its own full national ticket in the column under its own party emblem and a full list of candidates for Presidential electors."

This is an ingenious arrangement. Can it be successfully "worked"? That is the interesting question.

PROSPECTS OF A SETTLEMENT.

The Premier has promised that the Manitoba Question shall be satisfactorily settled within six months. It remains now to be seen whether the Archbishop of St. Boniface, representing the minority in Manitoba, or Mr. Greenwood, representing the majority, will back down at Mr. Laurier's behest.

"In closing, I must say that I hope that the Liberals will give us our schools, 'as a sure of police and with a view to their interest.' The remedial law granted us: 1, a Catholic school board; (2) of the books; (3) of the Catholic normal schools; (4) of the Catholic inspector; 5, the right to erect school districts; 6, the right to impose municipal taxes for schools; and the exemption of all taxes for the support of the Protestant schools (taxes which we paid to Winnipeg during six years).

On the part of Mr. Greenwood we have heard nothing later than his assurance that he would not, upon any consideration, retreat from the position taken by his majority.

A NOTABLE ANNIVERSARY.

On the 6th of August, 1775, one hundred and twenty-one years ago to-day, Daniel O'Connell was born. And the scenery of the wild mountains of Kerry, the great literature first saw the light. His youthful and early manhood were spent in preparation for those stormy deeds which characterize his patriotic efforts for the emancipation of his countrymen.

The Canadian Grocer, noting some observations of Mr. Laurier in regard to preferential trade, says that while both parties in this country favor such trade there is still a strong feeling in England in opposition to it, a truth, "as a whole, the hearts of the people are softening."

NOXIOUS WEEDS.

Dr. James Fletcher, an ologist and Botanist of the Dominion Experimental Farms, lately visited the Province of Manitoba, where he placed before the farmers the latest and best information concerning the necessity and means of keeping their farms clear of the noxious weeds which in some localities are gaining a foothold.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

At a meeting of Liberals, held in Winnipeg on the evening of the 3rd inst., it was decided to ask the government to appoint Joseph Martin to the position of Minister of the Interior.

The New York Sun, in commenting on an article of the Globe, writes: "Sir Richard Cartwright cannot persuade a corporation in the United States Senate to assent to any reciprocity treaty which does not contain an agreement for the imposition of the same duties on British manufactures imported into Canada as are levied on them by our own Customs House."

Referring to the Guardian's remarks concerning the Scott Act and an alleged "deal," we suggest that it can be fairly said to be made as to how it happened that certain papers issued for a Scout Association just before the election were made returnable on a Sunday, and why the proceeding suddenly collapsed.

Goldwin Smith, in the Saturday Review has a long article on the American political situation, which he views with characteristic gloom. He makes the point that if Canada was in the Union her vote would swing the scales in favor of honest money, and would be a powerful factor in the maintenance of the gold standard.

Word has been received at the Marine and Fisheries department at Ottawa that the illegal fishing is going on among the Government oyster beds at Shediac, N. B. For five years the beds have been constituted a Government reserve and were used for all manner of experiments.

The quarterly report of the Department of Trade and Commerce to the 30th April, 1896, has been received, containing figures that wind up the fiscal year. During the twelve months the revenue was \$35,659,775 as compared with \$33,119,485 for the preceding year, and the expenditure was \$30,557,274, against \$31,228,871 in 1895.

The Republicans of the United States seem not to be at all afraid of the silver issue. Their tone is sounded by the Worcester Evening Gazette, which says: "Sound money is not a new principle for the Republican party, which has fought inflation heresies before, and notably in 1868 and 1880."

The SS. Bonavista, sailing from Montreal Friday morning, August 7th, will be due at Charlottetown, Monday morning, August 10th, and will sail for St. John's, Newfoundland, via North Sydney, carrying horses, cattle and sheep on deck and produce under deck, at lowest possible rates.

NEWS NOTES.

Farm laborers are wanted in portions of Manitoba.

Gold has been discovered at Mount Carme, Connecticut.

Four thousand people were drowned in the northern province of Kiang Su, China, by a tidal wave five miles long.

Barley cutting is in progress about Portage la Prairie. A Brandon despatch states that harvest will be general in that district in about ten days.

It is now expected that thirty six states will be represented at the Indianapolis conference for calling a gold Democratic convention.

The British naval manoeuvres, which have just concluded, have proved a surprise. Notwithstanding the strength of the defensive squadron, the attacking force succeeded in reaching the objective point unharmed.

Governor Altgeld, the chief of the free silver movement in Illinois, is the President and largest stockholder of the Unity building in Chicago. The Herald publishes one of the leaves in fac-simile. The coin is payable in standard gold coin of the United States.

France's silver coinage contains only 40 per cent of its face value in silver. The Government is repudiating the money on a small scale, as it refuses to accept at their face value francs bearing the effigy of Charles X., Louis Philippe, and Napoleon III., without the larret leaf.

Lord Wolseley's remark that he would not like to put British-Indian troops in front of European soldiers has caused intense feeling. The remark is attributed to Lord Wolseley's jealousy of Lord Roberts, who has the greatest faith in the Indian portion of the army.

There is some fear in England that if Cecil Rhodes is too hard pressed by the Imperial government on account of Jameson's raid, it may undermine British South Africa's allegiance, and England may see a colonial revolt and the "United States of South Africa" erected with Mr. Rhodes as President.

As the British Privy Council decided that the local option law is not "ultra vires" of the province of Ontario, the government has issued special instructions to license commissioners in various parts of the country to enforce its provisions.

Dr. William H. Park, the New York bacteriologist, is critically ill with typhoid fever, which he contracted from experiments with the fever germs in the interest of science.

The people of Sirling, Ont., are much excited over poisoning cases. The family of the Rev. Mr. Cruickshank were the first attacked. Friends attending the sickened family partook of meals at the parsonage, and soon seven more were seriously ill.

A Liberal member from the eastern townships will, it is said, move for a reduction of the Governor General's salary from \$50,000 to \$25,000. In 1889 Parliament adopted a resolution reducing the governor's salary from 10,000 to 6,500 pounds sterling, but His Excellency, having referred the bill to the Home Government, the Duke of Buckingham and Chandos, then Secretary of State for the Colonies, replied to His Excellency that Her Majesty's assent had been withheld.

A London despatch says: Several most important discoveries have just been made in Cairo bearing upon the history of the Christian Church in the first two centuries of the era.
