**A SAD FATALITY.**—The Pioneer reports that an extremely sad fatality occurred at Tyne Valley on Wednesday about 12 o'clock, which resulted in the death of the child of Mr. and Mrs. Baglowe. The latter, it appears, had gone out after some potatoes for dinner, leaving the child, who was between 3 and 4 years old, in the house. When she returned it was to find the poor child lying upon the floor burnt. The child said "Oh mother, I'm burnt to death," and expired. The poor mother then fainted, and it was both lying upon the floor thus that they were found. The unfortunate child's clothing had no doubt caught whilst playing in her mother's absence, before the fire.

**A PAINFUL ACCIDENT.**—On Friday morning, Mrs. Harry McKee, of Summerside, met with a serious and very painful accident. She was going down stairs with a baby in her arms, when she slipped on the steps and fell. She endeavored to save the baby from injury by putting out her arm but missed the window frame and her arm crashed through the glass, receiving very severe injuries. The forearm was cut open almost its entire length—a deep, nasty, jagged wound, which Dr. McLellan stitched up, seven or eight stitches being required. The under side of the upper arm was also badly cut. We are very happy to learn that Mrs. McKee is now progressing favorably both from the wound and the shock.—Pioneer.

**THE VICE-REGAL VISIT.**

Programme for the Reception of Lord and Lady Aberdeen to-morrow.

Some slight changes have been made in the arrangements for the reception of their Excellencies tomorrow. The following programme will be followed as closely as possible:

The Acadia, having their Excellencies on board, is expected to reach here about 12.30 Tuesday. On landing they will be met by a Guard of Honor and escorted to Government House, where they will lunch quietly.

At 3 p.m. the distinguished visitors will drive to the Opera House, where they will again be received by a Guard of Honor, and on reaching the platform of the Opera House will receive addresses from the Provincial Government and Mayor and Council. His Excellency is expected to make a short reply to those addresses, immediately after which the public reception of those ladies and gentlemen desirous of being presented will take place. This will not be later than 3.30 o'clock. Ladies and gentlemen will not come in full dress, as the reception is an informal one, but in order that the names may be known and announced each person should have two cards with their names written on them.

At the conclusion of the public reception Lord Aberdeen will probably go to Victoria Park and there inspect the sailors from the Dominion cruisers and the militia who may turn out.

Lady Aberdeen will remain, and deliver her address on The Women's Council of Canada. The idea that this address is for women only is quite a mistake and gentlemen will find it very interesting.

In the evening the Lieut.-Governor and Mrs. Howlan will entertain their Excellencies at dinner. They will remain during the night at Government House and a little after 9 on Wednesday morning will visit one or two of the city schools, probably Upper Prince Street and the Convent School. After the visit to the schools their Excellencies will drive to the railway station and take a special train at 10 a. m. for Summerside.
