**French Students To Be Put On Equal Footing In NFCUS**

EDMONTON (CP)—The National Federation of Canadian University Students has voted to reorganize the federation to put French-speaking students on an equal footing with their English-speaking counterparts.

Delegates at the federation's annual congress unanimously approved a resolution which calls for equal voting between the two cultural groups on certain fundamental issues such as the constitution. On other matters, voting would be based on student population.

The resolution was drafted by a specially formed committee after three French universities—Montreal, Sherbrooke and Laval—had asked the congress to establish two groups, one French and one English, under the superstructure of a national federation.

The committee was headed by NFCUS President Dave Jenkins of Edmonton and included representatives of nine universities.

"We called an emergency meeting because the students leaders realized if they couldn't work something out there would be a complete breakdown of negotiations and perhaps the federation," Mr. Jenkins said.

The organization would eliminate the four existing regional groups in the federation in favor of a French caucus and an English caucus. Each caucus would elect a vice-president and three members to make up the federation's board of directors.

"There was no problem in recognizing the two groups as separate linguistic and cultural entities," Mr. Jenkins said. The

TORONTO (CP)—Trade Minister Sharp said here today that he made the statement in efforts to initiate another round of major tariff cuts under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade are "running into heavy weather."

need for Canada to improve its world trade position by exporting more manufactured goods. "The most rapidly growing markets in the world today lie in the area of manufactured goods, not in industrial materials and food," Mr. Sharp said. "This suggests that the only lasting solution to our payments base and in particular to in-

crease our proficiency in the area of secondary manufacturing. The minister said it would be a mistake to try to solve the basic imbalance in Canadian trade by negative, restrictive measures. The emphasis must be on expansion and on becoming more efficient. "That is why we have been supporting so strongly the efforts that are being made to initiate another round of major tariff cuts under the auspices of the general agreement on tariffs and trade," he said. "These efforts are running into heavy weather. Important differences of view exist, particularly between the United States and the European economic community as to the details of the plan for cutting tariffs." He added.
