Livestock

'During the past fifteen years due to the increased use of ground limestone stimulated by government policy, greater use of chemical fertilizer and purchases of imported feeds, the production of hay and grass has increased in this province, to the point where under normal conditions we have insufficient cattle to make efficient use of the fodder.'

Limitation Of Acreage

'There is apparently a strong feeling among a majority of our farmers that limitations on individual acreage should be imposed to the end that production will remain within reasonable volume.'

Butter

'The butter stored by the Dairy Products Board in the government cold storage, is coming out in excellent condition, a fact which suggests the possibility of having Charlottetown designated as a purchasing point by the Dairy Products Board, thus relieving our producers of freight charges to Halifax and Saint John.'

'Support prices on butter have brought stability, if not prosperity to the producers of butter in this province. Butter will likely continue to be our main dairy product, and its high quality and good reputation bears witness to efficiency on the part of our creameries, and effective guidance by dairy officials.'

should be made to encourage greater use of the sire bonus policy.

'One of the first steps in developing artificial insemination would be the provision of a veterinarian to specialize in sterility problems in cattle. Such an official could work in co-ordinating the efforts of farmers and Departments of Agriculture in laying a groundwork for artificial breeding, a development which we feel is worthy of careful consideration at an early date.'

Daylight Saving

'With regard to proposals for establishing daylight saving time in municipalities, the brief states: 'We have no reason to believe that there has been any change in this matter and while freely admitting the advantages to a rather limited section of urban people, we do feel that the dislocation and inconvenience caused by daylight saving time is unwarranted and unjustifiable. We believe our rural people are prepared to co-operate with those who wish to open and close their business at an earlier hour; in this manner the inconvenience and loss will fall upon those who receive the advantages.'

The Potato Industry

'In many respects, the brief states, 1932 was one of the most satisfactory potato years ever experienced. Extremely high prices in the spring combined with a bumper crop a heavy movement and satisfactory prices in the fall, produced a high net revenue.'

Veterinary Service Policy

'Under the Veterinary Service Policy, valuable aid is being provided livestock breeders. It is regrettable, but not necessarily disturbing that a number of the veterinarians have left the service. This situation may take some time to correct before a sufficient number of practitioners will be available who will settle permanently in the province.'

UNCONDITIONAL ACTION

On most of the occasions when a man stands at the crossroads of his decision, he calculates the probable consequences of the alternative choices before him and decides for the more acceptable of the two. But there are also times when no such calculation is possible, the future is so indeterminate and so dependent on his present action.

There are even moments when he must defy the consequences he foresees and venture his all on what the imperative of conscience requires. To default at such a time is to forfeit his manhood. To be equal to the demand is to rise to a new level in selfhood.

What happens in such a case is not so much that one decides, but rather that a decision is made for one, and that one can but consent thereto. Sometimes it is as if the deed to be done existed in advance for him and now comes to him like an angel of destiny, to be welcomed or rejected.

The grandeur of duty lies in its very simplicity. The heroic souls do not think of themselves as heroes; they act no part before their fellows, they make no appeal to posterity. If questioned, they say that they act as they do because they must. It is what the occasion requires of them, and how could they be unfaithful to it?

In the hour when a man gathers his whole self to do the deed to which no conditions are attached, he asks no reward and looks for no applause. Perhaps he has his uncertainty and his reluctance still, but something great has come upon him and he obeys.

Seen in this light, it becomes clear that in the last resort duty is vocation. That is to say, it is an external constraint, no impersonal law which lays on all alike the same obligations.

It is the entry of a personal God into a man's life, so that he recognizes what is God's will for him in his situation and with such powers as he possesses, and responds by consecrating himself to do that will.

HOT BISCUIT SUPPER-SANDWICH

Season to taste 1 c. minced cooked meat with grated onion, salt, pepper and condiment sauce; moisten slightly with leftover gravy or cream sauce. Mix and sift twice, then sift into a bowl, 2 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 1/2 c. once-sifted hard-wheat flour), 4 tps. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. dry mustard. Cut in finely 5 lbs. chilled shortening. Make a well in dry ingredients and add 1 c. chili sauce and 1 1/2 c. milk. Mix lightly with fork, adding milk if necessary, to make a soft dough. Knead for 10 seconds on a lightly-floured board and divide dough into 2 equal portions. Pat one portion into a greased round 8 1/2" cake pan and spread almost to edges with meat mixture; moisten edges of dough with water. Pat second portion of dough into an 8 1/2" round and place over meat mixture; press lightly around edges to seal; score top layer deeply into 6 pie-shaped wedges. Bake in hot oven, 425°, about 20 mins. Serve hot with brown tomato sauce. Yield: 6 servings.
