Mrs. Wendall Wood, R.N. of Central Royalty, supervisor of these courses was present and gave the opening lecture and demonstration. It is expected that there will be an enrolment of at least 12-14 when the class meets again next Wednesday.

Island Odds And Ends

More than a month ago, on August 3rd, a new amendment to the Unemployment Insurance went into effect, designed to permit persons already drawing unemployment insurance benefits, to continue to draw such benefits even though they become ill, injured or quarantined. It is not intended to provide benefits for a person who is obliged to stop working because of illness or injury.

A person who makes a claim for unemployment insurance benefit must still satisfy the same requirements as before, that is, he or she must be capable and available for work and unable to obtain suitable employment. A person who leaves work because of illness is obviously not available for work and the Unemployment Act does not apply to such cases.

What the change in the Act is intended to cover are those special cases where a man or woman becomes unemployed and actually starts to draw unemployment insurance benefits, and then is injured or becomes ill, or is quarantined. In these cases illness is not the primary reason for the person's unemployment. Before the amendment, the payment of benefit was stopped in such cases until the person was again available for employment. Now, however, the person will continue to draw benefits regardless of whether he is ill or not, provided he has first established his claim in the regular way.

In any case, of course, the total length of time during which benefits will be paid will depend on the amount of credits the man has built up during the time he was employed.

In most cases a person will not have to prove that he is sick in order to continue drawing benefit. If during the time that a person is drawing benefit he is not offered a job, the question of whether he is sick or not will not arise. If, however, when he is offered a job he is unable to accept or to appear for an interview because of illness or injury, he will be required to prove that he is actually ill or injured, or that he is quarantined.

If an unemployed person is too ill to report to his National Employment Service Office he may make arrangements by telephone or by mail. If the illness is minor, the office will hold his benefit payments for him. If the claimant is likely to be laid up for a lengthy period, the office will mail cheques directly to his home.

In case the unemployed person is so ill that he cannot sign papers or take any part in the collection of his benefit, a representative may act for him. The representative, who should be a relative or close friend, will complete a form which can be obtained at any National Employment Service office, or will have the form completed by the unemployed man's doctor.

The new amendment will not increase the number of claims for benefit from unemployed persons, but it is expected that it will cause some increase in the amount of money paid out in benefits. However, as long as employment remains high in this country the new provision should not materially affect the growth of the U. I. fund, and the present rate of contributions by employers and employees will not have to be increased.

At March 31, 1953, the balance in the unemployment insurance fund stood at more than 851 million dollars, an increase of more than 78 million dollars in the fiscal year 1952-53. The total of benefit payments during the fiscal year ending last March was almost 136 million dollars, an increase of almost 46 million dollars over the total for the previous year. The ratio of benefit payments to contributions was 79.9 in 1952-53, considered to be a rather high ratio for a year of comparatively high employment, although the fund is held to be adequate to meet any foreseeable conditions.

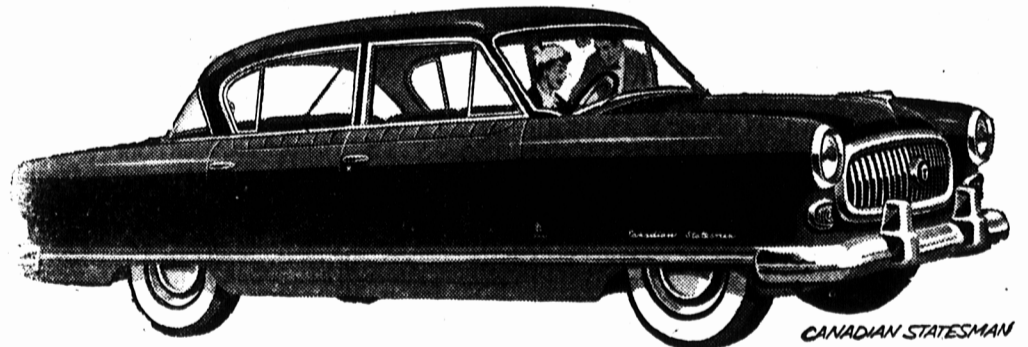

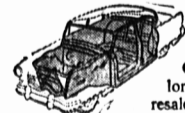

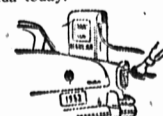
