

Wanderers Top Team In Invitation Meet Over Local Abbies

A large gallery of spectators saw an excellent program of athletic entertainment at Memorial Field yesterday afternoon when an eight-man team from Halifax Wanderers A.A.C. clipped off top team honors over Charlottetown's Abegweit A.C. in the annual Maritime Invitation Track and Field championships.

Wanderers compiled a total of 66 points for their winning effort while the local team was the runner-up with 41 points. Fielding only two competitors, Bathurst clipped off third place with 14 points and a one-man entry from Saint John came through for fourth place with six.

Wendell Barrett and George Walters carried the banner high for the Abegweits in individual point-getting, Barrett clipping off the best all-round athlete award with a total of 16 points and Walters a close runner-up with 14. Jack Brophy of Wanderers was next in line for individual awards with 11.

In compiling their points totals, Barrett collected firsts in the hop-step-and-jump and running broad jump, second in the 100 yard dash and javelin throw, while Walters took a first in the Javelin throw and second in the discus and hammer throw and shot putt. Brophy took first in the running high jump, and second in the pole vault and hop-step-and-jump. Brophy won the high jump with a height of five feet five inches but lost an exhibition jump after failing to clear the bar beautifully at three inches better than his winning jump.

Saint John's representative, Bill Keicher, gave the crowd an added thrill in the pole vaulting when he vaulted the bar with a good foot to spare at the 10-foot level in an exhibition jump after leading the event honors with a height of eight feet, four inches. He placed third in the running high jump.

Bill Haley of Wanderers pretty well cornered the market on the dash events clipping off the 100 yard dash with a time of 10 3-5 and the 220 yard event with a winning time of 23 2-5.

Bob Maher of Bathurst won the 440 yard dash in the time of 37 3-5 while another Bathurst athlete, Paul Kenny, broke the tape a winner in the mile run in a time of 4:44. Other leading winners were Ray Pilon of Wanderers in the shot putt, brother Bob Pilon in the discus throw, Earnie Matheson of Abbies the hammer throw with a 104 foot, three-inch toss and John Martin of Wanderers the half-mile run in 2:06 4-5.

The prizes for the first and second place winners in the track and field events and the six-mile running race were presented at a special banquet held at Sandy's Restaurant last evening at which all competitors and officials were the guests of the Department of Physical Fitness. Director Brigadier W. W. Reid presided over the dinner and Councillor W. H. Beaton made the presentations.

Many kind tributes and congratulations to the fine calibre of competition carried on throughout the day and the excellent way in which the officials conducted the meet were extended by special speakers during the banquet. Those who gave brief talks were Brigadier Reid, Arthur Gaudet, Lt.-Col. W. J. MacDonald, Bob Kennedy, coach of the Wanderers team and Councillor W. H. Beaton.

U. S. Pro Golf Tourney in Finals

OAKMONT, Pa., July 2 —(AP)—Par-punishing Sam Snead took the easy road and husky Walter Burkemo of Franklin, Mich., the hard one today to sweep into the finals of the 33rd Professional Golfers Association championship.

Snead continued his merciless barrage of birdies and pars to crush 29-year-old Charles Bassler of Catonsville, Md., 9 and 8.

Burkemo, 32-year-old Michigan open champion making his first serious bid for national recognition, rallied to eliminate Ellsworth Vines of Los Angeles, one-time world tennis champion, one up on the 37th hole.

The young pro from just outside Detroit, two down with two holes to play, won the 35th and 36th with a birdie and par. He clinched the victory with a birdie on the extra hole.

The finalists will meet at 10 a. m. EDT tomorrow for the championship playing another 36 holes over Oakmont's 6,882, viciously-trapped yards.

Upsets Feature Tennis Tourney

WIMBLEDON, July 2 —(AP)—Herbie Flam of Beverly Hills and Sick Savitt of Orange, N. J., left 15,000 centre court fans goggle-eyed today as they crushed two of the biggest names in amateur tennis, Frank Sedgman of Australia and Art Larsen of San Leandro, Calif., and swept into the semi-finals of the all-England championships.

Flam, a gamester who didn't know when he was licked, spotted the top-seeded Sedgman two sets and then came on in broiling heat to outduel the big Australian ace 2-6, 1-6, 6-3, 6-4, 7-5.

Sedgman once was within two points of a 6-4 victory in the final set, but Herbie hung on to score the finest triumph of his career.

Savitt, the former Cornell University star who won the Australian singles title last winter, demonstrated to the audience that it was no fluke as he walloped Larsen, the present U.S. champion, 6-1, 6-4, 6-4.

Meanwhile, Lorne Main of Vancouver and Brendan Macken of Montreal reached the quarter-finals of the men's doubles when they defeated one-armed Hans Redl and Alfred Huber of Austria, 4-6, 6-2, 6-2, 6-8, 7-5.


Main's heavy and accurate service and the volleying of all four men featured a match which drew a capacity crowd.

The Canadian pair will meet the second-seeded Americans, Gardnar Mulloy and Savitt, in the next round.

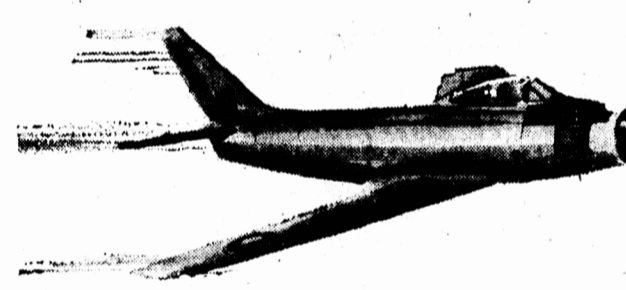
