## THE CAMPAIGN IN INDIA

Successfully Carried Out.

## JUNCTION OF BRITISH FORCES.

SIMLA, Oct. 23.—Despatches received today from Kharappa announce that the plan of campaign against the insurgents has been so far successfully carried out, and that a junction has been effected near Kharappa of the British forces under Sir Yeatman Biggs and General Sir Wm. Lockhart.

## CANADA'S TRADE STATISTICS

### Increase of Exports and Imports

### SMALL INCREASE IN REVENUE.

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—The trade returns for September show exports valued at \$16,599,088, being an increase of \$3,964,042. This increase is a general one, consisting of the products of the mines, lumber, agricultural products, and animals and their products.

The imports for the month are valued at \$12,057,115,—an increase of \$727,020. The revenue increased \$99,874. The increase in the exports for the last quarter, over the same period of last year, amounts to a total of \$5,234,914. The imports, however, are practically stationary.

The duty collected in the last quarter shows only an increase of \$83,000.

### Low Water in the St. Lawrence.

MONTREAL, Oct. 23.—Since August 3rd fourteen ocean-going steamers have touched ground in the river.

### LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—In connection with the increases in the strength of the British army, the defence of the Colonies of Great Britain is receiving unusual attention. The government has just despatched a former under-secretary of state for war, Sir Ralph Wood Thompson, to Australia, with in-

structions to report to the war office upon the condition of the defences of the Australian Colonies, the increase in colonial forces, and to submit proposals for arming the local troops and exchanging battalions from Australia with those of the motherland.

The mission of Hon. W. S. Fielding, the Canadian Minister of Finance, to Great Britain also includes discussing with the Colonial Office what proportion of £1,500,000, which it is proposed to expend in strengthening the Canadian defences, should be borne by the Imperial Government.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Oct. 20.—Raymond, the twelve-year-old son of A. D. Allen, stenographer in the Circuit Court, went to school carrying a stick of dynamite. The explosive, which the boy had found in a stone quarry, was in his pocket with a knife, top and marbles and a number of other things common to boys' pockets. In getting into his seat the boy banged his pocket against the desk, causing an explosion which will probably cost him his life and which was heard for two blocks. The boy's right hand was blown off and in his right groin a terrible wound was inflicted from which the surgeons say he cannot recover. The teacher, Miss Mack, was close by and had her skirts torn into shreds, but she was not hurt. The explosion caused a panic among the other children and several were hurt in trying to get out of the building.

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 20.—Matthew Cunningham, of Nova Scotia, came to this place to better his prospects, and fell in love with Mrs. Reed, of Virginia. They became engaged. Tuesday morning they were married, and the party started for home. The morning train pulled into the station, the conductor shouted "all aboard" and Cunningham ran and jumped aboard and yelled "Good-bye, sweetheart, good-bye." The bride became hysterical. She cannot account for the desertion.

MADRID, Oct. 21.—A despatch received here from Leyte, one of the Philippine Islands, says that place has been almost devastated by a cyclone. The cyclone destroyed the towns of Tagloban and Hernalan, on the Island of Leyte, as well as several villages. It is estimated that 400 persons lost their lives through the disaster. The latest advices from Manila say the cyclone occurred on Oct. 12, and that Burigo, on the eastern coast of Leyte, has been wiped out, and that an immense wave swept inland, engulfing villages. Several thousand natives perished at Tagloban. The cyclone also swept the island of Samar.
