VANCOUVER (CP)—The National convention of the newly-named Canadian Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and General Workers voted Friday to increase the membership of its national executive board to eight from six members.

Over Half Million In Road Tenders Opened

Tenders for the construction of paved highway in the Province were opened in the office of the Minister of Highways yesterday at noon.
 Submitting the lowest tender for paving from Wood Islands to Little Sands and from Murray Harbour to Murray River—a total distance of 10.3 miles was the Island Construction Ltd. Their figure was \$148,253. This stretch of highway is known as Tourist Road No. 8. Two other tenders were submitted for this work. They were Warren Maritimes Ltd—\$171,271 and Morrison and MacRae—\$176,034.

Bonny To Lead Canadian Ships

OTTAWA (CP)—The aircraft carrier Bonaventure will lead Canada's naval component in a series of NATO exercises in the Mediterranean this fall.
 The Bonaventure, with two squadrons of anti-submarine aircraft—twin-engine Trackers of 881 Squadron and helicopters from Helicopter Squadron 50—will sail from Halifax Oct. 8 and visit Portsmouth, England, before returning to the Canadian port Dec. 15.
 The navy announcement Friday said the destroyer escorts vessels Huron, Haida, St. Laurent and Ottawa will accompany the Bonaventure.

Sept. Defence Contracts Let

OTTAWA (CP)—Contracts totalling \$5,635,621 were awarded in the first two weeks of September by the defence production department and Defence Construction (1951) Limited.
 A \$569,250 contract for fuel oil, awarded to Imperial Oil Ltd., Ottawa, topped the list released Friday.
 S. Cunard and Co. Ltd., Halifax, received a contract for \$243,000 for coal.
 A \$285,000 contract was awarded to Forbes and Sloat Ltd., Fredericton, N.B., for a tank and anti-lark range at Gagetown, N.B.

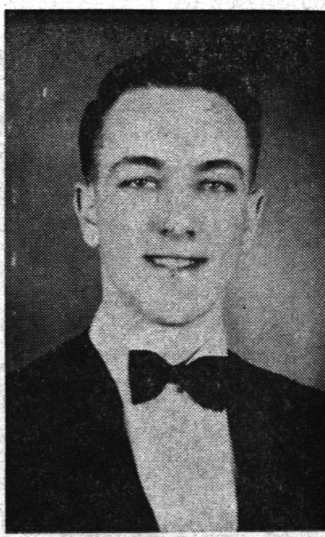
New Glasgow Firm Gets Job

NEW GLASGOW (CP)—H. Russell MacEwan, member of Parliament for Pictou, announced Friday that Defence Construction Ltd. has awarded Eastern Woodworkers Ltd. of New Glasgow a \$423,718 contract for a drill and recreation hall at Gander, Nfld.
 Mr. MacEwan also said the transport department has awarded contracts to Ferguson Industries of Pictou for the docking of the icebreaker Saurer, \$4,500, and docking and repair to the light-house tender Brant, \$47,000.

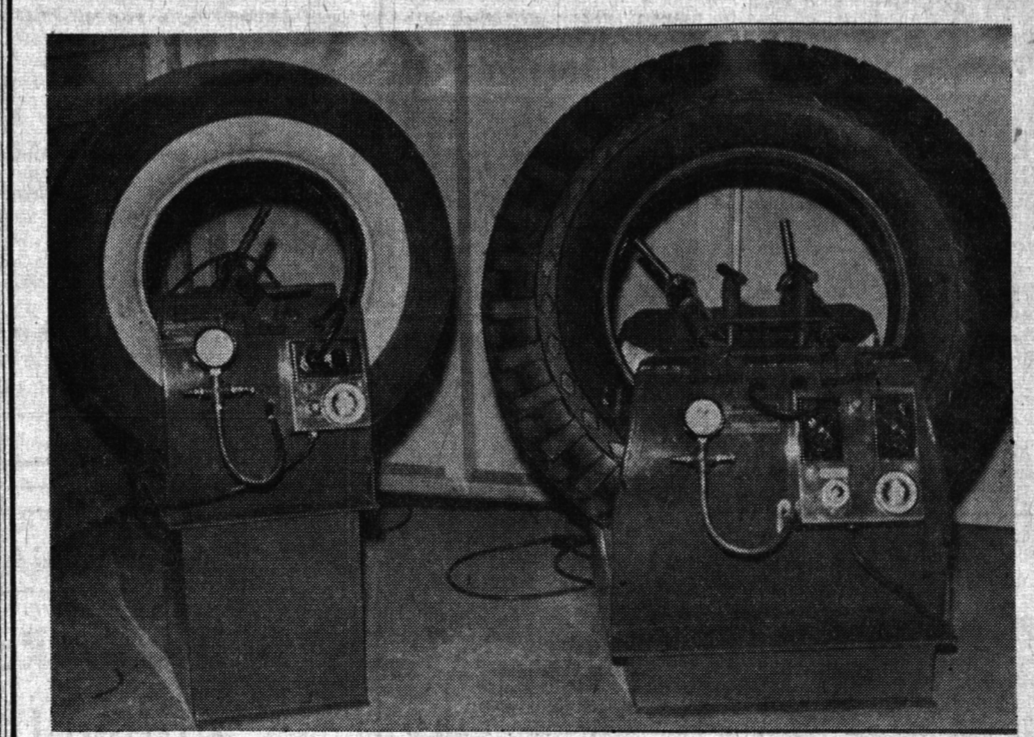
