

Financier And Philanthropist Dies In Ont.

TORONTO (CP) — Percy R. Gardner, 69, Toronto financier and philanthropist, died Friday in hospital of a heart attack.

Mr. Gardner was vice-president and director of the Consolidated Fire and Casualty Insurance Co., and a director of the Bank of Nova Scotia and Capital Wire Cloth Ltd., of Ottawa.

He was a partner in the stockbroking firm of Gardner, Wardrop and Co. which he founded in 1926. He gave hundreds of thousands of dollars to charity, many of the gifts being anonymous.

In 1955 he founded the Gardner Medical Research Foundation that donates sums to research in Canada and the United States.

He donated \$75,000 in 1960 to the Israel bond drive, even though he was not Jewish.

Born in Mount Forest, Ont., Mr. Gardner moved to Toronto at 16 with only \$30 in his pockets. He had been orphaned at 15.

He obtained a job sorting parcels in a department store and then joined the purchasing department of a brass company where he learned enough about the metal business to open his own company when in his 20s.

U.S. Appeals Court Backs John C. Doyle Conviction

NEW YORK (CP)—The U.S. 2nd Court of Appeals has affirmed the conviction of John C. Doyle, president of Canadian Javelin Ltd., who was sentenced in May for illegally sending unregistered stock by mail from Canada to the United States.

The three-judge panel had reversed its decision in the case June 10 last after hearing arguments in court by Doyle's defense lawyers and by Herbert Edelherz, deputy chief of the fraud section of the U.S. justice department.

The decision was made this week. The appeal judges ruled that they affirmed the "judgment of conviction" and gave Doyle's lawyers five days in which to take further legal action.

If no further action is taken by Doyle, he will begin a three-year prison sentence, to be suspended after three months.

Doyle, a Canadian citizen resident in the Bahamas, had

pleaded guilty Feb. 3 in Hartford, Conn. Federal District Judge T. Emmet Clarke passed sentence May 3 and imposed a \$5,000 fine.

The alleged crime occurred in 1958, a year before Canadian Javelin stock was registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. The company owns iron ore in Labrador and other mining property.

Doyle and three other men were indicted in 1962. The indictment, however, was not made public for more than a year because the government said two of the defendants were out of the country.

Later, the charges against the other defendants and 10 of 11 counts against Doyle were dismissed.

Doyle is free on \$10,000 bail but is confined to New York and Connecticut during term of the bail.

Go Ahead Given On New Aircraft

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson has given definite orders for development of a U.S. supersonic transport plane.

He said at the swearing-in of the new administrator of the Federal Aviation Agency, Gen. William McKee, that the administrator will have charge of the program.

Turning to a number of senators and representatives at the ceremony, Johnson said he will ask an appropriation of \$140,000,000 for the next phase of the program.

Opening lead—king of hearts. If you play regularly with fire, you must expect to get burned once in a while. The bridge player who gets fancy occasionally in his bidding is, in a sense, playing with fire, and he should be prepared to pay a penalty at times for his misbehavior.

Here is a typical example of how things can go wrong, even in the best of circles. The deal occurred in the match between France and the United States in 1966. The bidding went as shown when a French pair had the North-South cards. It is plain to see that either

North or South, or possibly both, lost control of the bidding, since they eventually got to an absurd contract of five diamonds doubled-down three, 500 points.

North's spade bid over the first double may have been consistent with his style, but if so, South never caught on to the bid at all. South carried on as though North were the most honest bidder in the world, though obviously the hand proved that North had at least a tiny streak of larceny coursing in his veins.

Psychics may be paying propositions in a well-developed partnership—though even this is debatable—but psychic bidding between partners who are not operating on the same wave length can be murderous, as proved to be the case in this deal.

At the second table, where an American pair held the North-South cards, the bidding went:

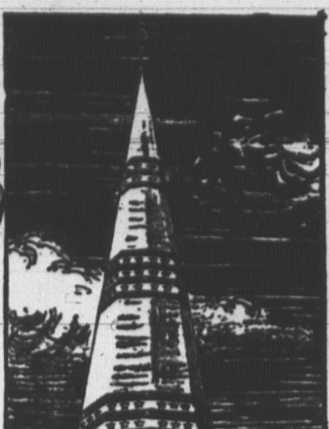
North East South West

East went down one—100 points—and the outcome was that the United States team gained 600 points on the deal. The lesson to be learned, if there is one, is that in the long run honesty pays, or, perhaps more to the point, that Crime Does Not Pay.
