The executive of the Prince Edward Island Branch of the United Nations Association of Canada has made plans for the second general meeting of the Island branch. The meeting will be held at Montgomery Hall on Thursday at 8.15 p.m. and is open to the public.

Mr. Brockel told the annual meeting of Upper Lakes Shipping Limited that the only major construction on the American side at the end of 1961 was the Paul H. Carnahan, a tanker being converted at Lorain.

"Your yards are doing better," he said.

The Canadian segment of the Great Lakes fleet had expanded, and in 1960 represented 28 per cent of lake fleet capacity, the largest proportion in history.

Russians Make Wheat Claim

OTTAWA (CP) — Russia's claim of a new high-powered wheat strain may involve a multi-headed plant, a federal cereals scientist said here.

We've always regarded those as a sort of monstrosities," said A. G. Whiteside of the Plant-Breeding Research Institute in the agriculture department. None had been pursued in this country.

He was commenting on a brief Moscow report that a Soviet biologist, working in Kazakhstan where the huge virgin lands project is centred, had developed a wheat bearing 100 to 150 kernels a stalk against 40 to 50 in existing varieties of good grade.

"Juliet and Nancy have been friends for a long time," Sinatra said. "They're crazy about each other."

Sinatra previously was wed to Nancy, a childhood sweetheart and mother of his three children, and actress Ava Gardner. It would be the first marriage for Miss Prowse.

She met the crooner when she came to Hollywood for her first movie, Can-Can, in which he starred.

Wood Buffalo Record Set By Hunter

OTTAWA (CP) — A wood buffalo shot in the slave River area of the Northwest Territories last fall has broken the world buffalo record, it was announced here. The old record had stood for 36 years.

The northern affairs department said the animal was shot by Samuel Israel of Seattle, one of 100 hunters licensed by the government for the 1961 hunt in a wilderness area northwest of Wood Buffalo National Park. The park straddles the northern border of Alberta.

Mr. Israel's buffalo had a head measurement of 137 1/4 inches under North American big game rules established by the Boone and Crockett Club. The measurement includes tip-to-tip horn spread, length of horns on the outside curve and circumference of horns at the base.

It was exactly an inch better than the record held by the chief ranger of Yellowstone National Park in the United States for a buffalo shot in 1925.

A wild herd of wood buffalo roams an extensive range in the Canadian park. Each fall the government allows 100 hunters to

Kovacs had been to a baby shower in honor of comedian Milton Berle's wife. Kovacs and his wife, blonde actress Edie Adams, had left the party, at the home of director Billy Wilder, in separate cars.

Industrial Bank Loans Increase

OTTAWA (CP) — Volume of loans by the Industrial Development Bank in the first quarter of its current fiscal year has jumped 82 per cent above year-earlier marks.

A monthly report by the Crown-owned bank showed 472 loans totaling \$22,246,000 had been approved in the three-month period October to December. This compared with 236 loans for \$12,213,000 approved in the corresponding period of 1960.

The bank approved 150 loans in December for \$7,048,000, compared with 91 loans totalling \$4,687,000 in December, 1960.

At Dec. 31, a total \$183,478,810 in loans, investments and guarantees were outstanding compared with \$105,970,780 a year earlier.

(Continued from page 1) "not a matter for discussion." U.S. Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon told the press conference that his government welcomed the Canadian declaration of support for freer trade as "a very important statement."

Mr. Dillon said it "means that we each, in our own way, will be working toward the same objective."

He said that any substantial tariff cuts between the U.S. and the Common Market would "redound substantially to the benefit of Canada" under the most-favored-nation trading principle.

But he said the conference had not discussed any specific tariff cuts between Canada and the U.S.

The U.S. minister declined to be drawn out on whether the U.S. would welcome the disappearance of Commonwealth tariff preferences in the British market.

He said the U.S. has expressed "satisfaction" over the British decision to seek Common Market membership but it was "not quite correct" to say the U.S. had encouraged this in advance.
