### Blind 96-Year-Old Red Cross Worker Came From P. E. I.

Final tribute was paid Tuesday to Marguerite Gaudet Poirier, 4187 Westhill Avenue, Montreal, who died at her residence, Friday, September 27th 1957. She was in her 96th year. Mrs. Poirier was born and educated in Prince Edward Island. She ran a hotel at Wellington P.E.I. for forty years with her husband, Fidèle, who predeceased her in 1930. It was then that Mrs. Poirier came to Montreal to live with her daughter. Despite failing sight, which resulted in total blindness ten years ago, she continued with charity work for which she had been so well known on Prince Edward Island. She became a member of the St. Monica Church, and throughout the Second World War did work for the Canadian Red Cross, receiving high praise for the perfection of her efforts. At the age of eighty she took a 1,300 mile trip to see her son in Minnesota, and in her later years frequently travelled alone to Boston. Mrs. Poirier is survived by three sons, Dr. John Sylvère and Alcide; three daughters, Jacqueline (Mrs. Boulanger), Mrs. Zelica Wareham and Milie (Mrs. Prahalas); twenty-three grandchildren and twelve great grandchildren. Requiem Mass was sung in St. Monica Church, with burial in Cote des Npiges Cemetery.

## National Officers Attend Air Cadet League Meeting

Mr. Gustave Ledroit, national president of the Air Cadet League of Canada accompanied by George M. Ross, Ottawa, general manager of the league; W.C. G.R. Verr, Ottawa, senior Air Cadet liaison officer and Darrell Eagles of Air Cadet League headquarters arrived in Summerside yesterday to attend the annual meeting of the Provincial League which was held at R.C.A.F. Association Wing Number 200 club rooms. The meeting was highlighted by the presence of Air Commodore M. Costello, air officer commanding Maritime Air Command and of Group Captain Swetman commanding officer R.C.A.F. Station Summerside. The meeting opened with Mr. James Currie, chairman of the provincial committee presiding. Reports from the various squadrons in the Province were received and tabled all indicating that much progress is being made in the air cadet movement here. In addressing the assembled delegates the national president, G.R. Ledroit spoke of the great importance of the air cadet movement in training young Canadians and teaching them to be good citizens. He paid tribute to the civilian leaders in all parts of Canada who devote their time to this great youth movement. The general manager, Mr. George Ross, said that the splendid attendance was a reflection of the deep interest in air cadets. "It is tough work," he said, "but at the same time very rewarding. The air cadet movement," he went on, "is steadily growing all across Canada and our standards are steadily improving."

He advised the leaders not to worry too much about the number of cadets in their squadrons because he said, "if you have good cadets in your unit that is the main thing." He said that the present enrollment was 22,000 and that plans are under consideration to expand the present ceiling of 22,500 to 25,500. "Furthermore," he stated, "the air cadet movement is very highly rated by the Dominion Government and I assure you that the money which is being spent in training these boys is not an expense but rather a good investment."

Mr. Ross spoke of plans now under consideration to institute college technical scholarships for Cadets who can qualify. Plans he said, are presently being studied and funds will be available for this project. Two leading colleges who will participate in the plan are the Ryerson Institute of Technology in Toronto and the Alberta Technical College in Calgary. GREAT FUTURE Air Commodore M. Costello in briefy addressing the group said he had witnessed the gradual perfection of the air cadet movement. He said he foresaw a great future for the League in Canada.

Group Captain Swetman, commanding officer R.C.A.F. Station Summerside, assured the delegates that he had always been pleased to assist the cadets in every way possible. He congratulated the delegates from Tig-

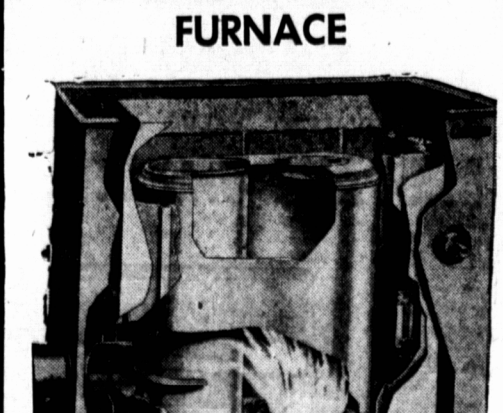
