Vernon Bridge Man Is Remanded To County Jail

Parker E. Hamilton, Murray River, appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston yesterday for two violations of the aeronautics act. The accused pleaded guilty to charges of flying a plane at night when not licensed and failure to submit a flight plan at Charlotteown Airport. The case was adjourned for one week so that technical evidence could be presented, prior to sentencing. Mr. Hamilton was represented by Bert Campbell.

Kevin Joseph Callaghan, Lake Verde, was fined \$20 and costs and ordered to pay \$7 as his share of the cost of damage to the property of Daniel-Augustin Holland.

Five other youths were also reported involved in this Hal-lows' incident and are to appear in court later.

William Leigh Frynter, Charlottetown, was fined \$10 and costs when he pleaded guilty to

the charge of unlawfully leaving rubbish in view of the roadway. The magistrate remanded three cases to the Georgetown Court and three others were adjourned for trial for one week at Queen's Court.

John Joseph Thomas, Vernon Bridge, was remanded to Queen's County Jail, until his next appearance on November 28 on a charge of illegally having intercourse with a girl under the age of 14.

Summerside Store Hours May Be Uniform

SUMMERSIDE — It was indicated by more than half a dozen local merchants in a preliminary comment on Christmas store hours that the shopping hours may be uniform throughout the town.

Some of the larger stores opened for business on Saturday, Nov. 12, and most of the smaller stores followed suit with their larger counterparts the past Saturday.

Merchants interviewed stated that what was needed was more open discussions at the meetings. He said that his store planned to observe the hours set down by the association and that it was one of the most important organizations that he belonged to.

Blood Donor Clinic Exceeds Quota By 58

KENSINGTON — A quota of 150 donors was surpassed by 58 when a total of 208 donors attended the blood donors clinic at Kensington yesterday.

Chairman of the clinic, Earl Carrier, said last night that he felt good publicity and a fine day, as well as the public being very conscious of the need, produced the fine turnout.

He spoke highly of the caterers last night. Catering were Spring Valley Women's Institute, Margate Women's Institute, and the Lady's Auxiliary of the Royal Canadian Legion, Kensington branch.

Mr. Carrier expressed his personal thanks to all the donors and all who helped make the clinic a success.

Sponsored by the Kensington Legion, the clinic was held at the Legion home here.

The resolution stated that the establishment of such a centre provided that the town will not be required to pay any of the costs over and above the estimated cost of \$1,750 representing electrical and diesel work by the electric light department.

Mrs. Perry said she felt this estimate could be quite a bit lower as the town department would be doing the work.

The resolution further stated that tenders be called, with work to be completed by March 31, 1967.

A recommendation by Chief of Police S.D.A. Wannamaker that six new eight-inch amber flashing Eagle traffic beacons

be installed within the school zone was approved on resolution by D. Alex MacDonald, seconded by Councillor Schurman.

The new lights will be located at the intersection of Beaver and Central Streets, Central and Poplar, Green and Summer, Summer and Beattie, Beattie and Granville, and the final one at the Island, intersecting Beaver and Summer Streets.

Single head flashers will be used at the intersections, with manually operated controls, along with automatic time clocks. Estimated cost was placed at \$1,223.

NATAL DAY — Councillor Mellish put forth a resolution that August 12, 1967, be designated as Natal Day in the town of Summerside in keeping with the 1967 Centennial celebrations.

Councillor Mollison said that it was an excellent idea and that it was hoped in future years to observe the day during Lobster Carnival Week.

Chief Wannamaker's report stated that the town police had three bicycles at the police office and owners have not been located. He said there were four bicycles still missing since the summer months.

Councillor MacDonald commended the police department for their action on speeders during the past month. The chief's report showed that there were 29 speeding convictions during October, 27 drunks convicted (one dismissed), and three convicted for squealing tires.

The report also stated that 13 accidents happened with damage in excess of \$100, six with damage under \$100, and one report of a person injured in an accident.

There were 128 complaints during October, 11 appeared under the Criminal Code, nine under the Highway Traffic Act, six for possession, and six charges of theft under Juvenile Delinquents Act.

During the past month, \$1,082 was collected in fines and costs, \$700 for parking meters, and \$200 in parking violations. Total collections came to \$2,163.50.

RESOLUTION ADOPTED — A proposal by the Summerside Recreation Commission and manager of Civic Stadium was approved on resolution by Councillor Mellish, seconded by Councillor Perry.

The proposal was that Bennie Grady be engaged as director of minor hockey in Summerside plus his duties as assistant to the manager of Civic Stadium, with his salary divided between the Summerside Recreation Com-

mission and the Civic Stadium.

The second recommendation was that Merle Skery was to carry on in charge of the canteen at Civic Stadium, and to perform certain duties originally carried out by Mr. Grady.

The third recommendation approved by council last night was that Robert Perry be hired as equipment man and also to do casual duties for Civic Stadium.

The fourth recommendation was that Thomas LeBlanc be hired for clean-up and other duties at Civic Stadium.

The proposals were jointly presented by Layton Schurman for the Summerside Recreation Commission and J.C. Hogan, manager of Civic Stadium.

By resolution, members of the retirement committee for the new retirement plan are as follows: town clerk-treasurer, chairman; chairman of the finance committee, president of the Summerside Police Association, president of local union 1432, IBEW, and the president of local union 804, NUPE.

Councillor Alex MacDonald moved that Governor-General Vanier and Madame Vanier be written informing them that Summerside regretted they could not be here recently due to illness. Motion was seconded by Councillor Schurman and passed.

FIRE REPORT — In the Summerside fire department report, it was stated that there were five silent alarms during the month, and also five active fires. At their regular meeting, \$100 was voted to the centennial swimming fund.

The operating deficit of Civic Stadium was reported by rink manager J. Charles Hogan to be \$1,200 better than the same period last year. Manager Egan predicts a busy winter.

Councillor Schurman reported that the downtown parking committee of the Board of Trade was proceeding well with part of the parking area behind the business section.

Junior Chamber of Commerce members were welcomed to the meeting, which was informed that the Jaycees plan to attend regularly each month.

Councillor Perry reported that 64 members of various town departments out of 67 will contribute to the new pension plan.

In answer to a query by Councillor Schurman on the shifting of electric utility poles at Read's Corner, town manager Joe Brophy said that the town would have to pay to move the poles the first time.

A letter from John N. Turner thanked the town for the hospitality shown the Commonwealth parliamentarians when they were in Summerside.

READY FOR SNOW — Councillor Schurman reported that everything was in readiness for the winter season as far as snow removal equipment was concerned. The same system was being employed as last year.

He also reported that work at the council chambers was being carried out under the winter works program at almost no cost to the town, excepting material.

Building permits during the month were issued to Ideal Dairy, Robert Smith (Russell Street), Williams and Murphy at Macnamara's (Water Street), Gordon Rogers (Noire Dame and Willow), Henry Wedge (Myrtle Street), Dr. Thomas Moore (Commerce Crescent), Ambrose Wedge (Water Street), Charles Linkletter (Linkletter Motel - further addition), Davis Lidstone (Fernwood Motel).

Current tax collections to last Friday lowered the outstanding balances to \$41,655. Tax appears at the end of October were \$63,381.01, and on last Friday were to \$62,924.
