The English Elections.

Salisbury as a Cabinet Maker.

LONDON, July 27. Lord Salisbury has definitely accepted the Premiership, and a meeting of the conservative members of the House of Commons has been called for to-day.

Lord Cadogan is mentioned as the probable Secretary of State for the Colonies, and it is stated that Lord Randolph Churchill has accepted the position of Chancellor of the Exchequer and Leader of the Government in the House of Commons.

Other forecasts name Lord Iddesleigh for Lord of the Privy Seal; the Duke of Argyll, liberal-tory-unionist, for President of the Council; the Marquis of Lorne, liberal-unionist, for Irish Viceroy. Other names submitted are not so well authenticated.

Rioting in Amsterdam.

AMSTERDAM, July 27. Conflicts took place here on Sunday between the police and the populace because of the prohibiting of the customary popular games on that day.

To Resist the Military.

LONDON, July 27. The Crofters of Tiree, Scotland, are arming to resist the military. Spears and blades have been forged, women are busily engaged in piling stones ready for use, and all available firearms are being loaded.

Severe Storm in Pennsylvania.

PITTSBURG, PA., July 27. Damages to the extent of \$350,000 were caused by the late storm. It was most severe in western Pennsylvania, where houses were struck by lightning and flooded, crops destroyed and so forth.
