Canada Will Conduct Survey For Ceylon

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada will finance and conduct a \$500,000, two-year aerial survey of Ceylon's natural resources under provisions of the Colombo plan for economic development of south and southeast Asia, it was announced Monday.

Ni Cavell, administrator of the trade department's international economic and technical co-operation division, said a contract for the survey has been awarded to the Photographic Survey Corp., Ltd. of Toronto. The survey will cover the entire island which has an area of about 25,000 square miles.

The island will be photographed by a Lockheed Hudson aircraft, employing aerial survey methods used extensively in Canada. Maps and maps will be prepared from the photographs and geological and forestry studies undertaken with the aid of special equipment.

Mr. Watson MacNaught To Leave Shortly For Japan

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, leaves shortly for Japan where he will act as adviser to the Canadian delegation attending the annual meeting of the International North Pacific Fisheries Commission which meets in Tokyo on October 31st, and will last for about a week.

Mr. MacNaught was head of the Canadian delegation which met in Washington two years ago with representatives from the United States and Japan and set up this commission. The purpose of the commission is to control by agreement the fisheries of the Pacific, principally halibut, sockeye salmon and herring. It meets annually and consists of four members from each country.

Mr. MacNaught will leave Summerside on Wednesday for Ottawa, and will leave Vancouver by Canadian Pacific Airways on October 28th and expects to return to Canada on November 15th.

Sentenced On Charge Of Robbing Tignish Fisherman

AMHERST (CP)—Two Amherst youths, Walter Jones and Douglas Sperry, were sentenced to penitentiary terms on a charge of robbing Saturday at the farm of the Cumberland county Supreme Court. Chief Justice J.L. Ilsey presided.

Sperry was sentenced to five years, and Jones to two years. They were convicted of robbing Ralph Handerman, a Tignish, P.E.I. fisherman of \$60.

The youths attempted Friday to escape from prison where they were being held pending the outcome of the trial. A jailer walked in the cell as they finished sawing their way through two steel bars blocking the window.

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Cow-catcher After Sharks On West Coast Now

OTTAWA (CP)—The old-fashioned locomotive cow-catcher has gone to sea, to kill sharks in Canada's west coast salmon fisheries. The fisheries department recently fitted one of its vessels with a triangular steel ram with a sharp point and a knife-like upper edge, and sent it out to chase basking sharks in Barkley sound on the west coast of Vancouver Island.

The boat gaged nearly 50 of the monsters during its first month of operations. On one day it speared 18.

The ram, which costs about \$200, looks like the answer to the shark problem which has been bothering salmon fishermen for years. It is a big improvement over harpooning, which is too slow, and rifle

Sight Partially Restored After Three Operations

MEDICINE HAT, Alta. (CP)—Fields of golden wheat, gaily-colored autumn leaves are not sights to be taken for granted by 22-year-old Jenny Ferretti. They are marvelous to her because of the dimmutive school teacher who has returned here after three successful operations partially restored the sight she lost suddenly last fall.

Thanks to the deft fingers of a Toronto eye surgeon — and her abiding faith—Jenny will be able to see normally.

"I went to a dance last October in Rosemary," Jenny said. "I woke the following morning and could not see. I was not totally blind but all I could distinguish between was dark and light. My eyes were inflamed."

NEW CORNEA

The school teacher from Ranier, Alta. 70 miles west of here, who was taught at nearby Rosemary, was taken to Calgary where Dr. John Aikenhead recommended a cornea transplant, although he said he could not guarantee the success of such an operation.

"After visiting the doctor I went to the Calgary Canadian National Institute for the Blind, where I stayed for four months studying braille while arrangements were completed for the operation on my temporary job here until next spring.

Large Barn At Miscouche Destroyed In Fire Last Night With \$15,000 Loss

A large barn, owned by Clarence Carr of Miscouche, and all its contents, which included 35 head of young cattle, 75 tons of baled hay, 3000 bushels of grain, 25 tons of baled straw, a tractor, milking machine and other items, was burned to the ground last evening with an estimated loss of \$15,000.

The blaze, which broke out shortly after nine o'clock, is believed to have originated in some manner from the tractor and it was only the prompt action of the R. C. A. F. and Summerside Fire Departments which saved the house and adjoining buildings from destruction. Because of the inflammable contents the blaze gained headway rapidly making it impossible to gain access to the building to effect a rescue of the cattle or save any of the items stored inside.

The building, 70 X 34 was built fifteen years ago and was partly covered by insurance. Mr. Carr is a son of Mr. H. V. Carr, fisheries office, Miscouche.

Concerned With DEW Line Crashes

EDMONTON (CP)—The Canadian Airline Pilots' Association is concerned about the frequency of accidents on the Distant Early Warning radar line airlift operations.

W. J. Montgomery of Winnipeg, association president, said Sunday this matter will be discussed under flight safety when the group holds its annual three-day convention in Toronto starting Nov. 7.

Commenting on a series of accidents which have dogged the DEW line operations, Mr. Montgomery said in an interview that few association members are flying in the airlift and none of the members have been involved in fatal accidents.

"We are concerned about the frequency of DEW accidents and their reflection on the aviation industry."

NEVRE LOST FAITH
