NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Weekly Union (Manchester New Hampshire): "Suppose the nation that the differences have arisen with had not been Spain, broken down, impoverished and exhausted and we had not the fixing the time in our own hands; that England had not yielded in that Venezuela 'incident' but had declared a war to require us to take a more humble position and come right on to do us damage, it has been pretty clearly demonstrated how much immediate harm they could have inflicted, in the time that has elapsed in preparation. Or suppose it had been France or Germany, what might have been the consequences in the offensive warfare of their making? There has been every incentive to hasten the getting ready to make the war short, sharp and decisive and perhaps as much has been done as could possibly be. If so, the world has seen what is the very best we could do under our military system. If it is to be continued, it is quite possible that we have been regarded as a military nation before this war as shall be after it as regards the great powers of Europe.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Mail and Empire: A million dollars to the gentlemen of the Drummond railway; \$400,000 to Mr. Greenhields; \$21,000 to Mr. Francois Lemoine, Edmonton bridge contractor; \$7,000 to Mr. E. E. Sheppard for promoting trade to Mexico; another half per cent. knocked off the savings of the poor; a lift in the taxes on sugar; a tariff blow at the poor women and girls in the shirt and cuff industry. But of course these things are all right, Mr. M. C. Cameron voted for them, and his independent decision has been rewarded with a governorship.

St. John Telegraph: Up to the present the American government has disbursed for war expenses upwards of three hundred millions of dollars, a large sum than the entire debt of Canada. Yesterday in the Senate of the United States, Mr. Hale, of Maine, gave it as his opinion that if the war lasted a year it would cost the country between \$700,000,000 and \$800,000,000, and he announced his willingness to be placed on record as making that statement. Mr. Hale's estimate of the cost of war does not seem to be extravagant, in view of the amount already disbursed and the present scale of expenditure. The larger of the two sums named is nearly as great as the sum paid by France to Germany at the close of the great war of 1870-71, as one of the conditions of peace. No doubt the American people are well able to afford such lavish war expenditures but it must be admitted that up to the present time they have had very little to show for their money.

The Canadian Grocer: The independent element in Canadian politics is never as strong as it is today. The business men of the country are gradually recognizing the fact that politicians are as much alike as two peas. Where they differ most is in name and in the fact that the one is in love and the other desires to get in power. When it comes to exhibiting a real and practical concern for the commercial interests of the country both are found wanting. Good business legislation in this or any other country is dependent upon the watchfulness and energy of the business men, and this watchfulness and energy will be powerful only in proportion to the independence of the business element. If business men take themselves to this or that party, following where it leads, Governments will always be more or less careless of those interests which are of greatest import to the country. Evident as it is that the independent sentiment is spreading among the business men of Canada, yet it needs both further expansion and more practical employment. The way in which business men have been allowed to go by the board during the last session of the Dominion Parliament, proves that beyond all questions.

SINKING OF THE MERRIMAC

Under Cover of Darkness

HEROISM DISPLAYED BY AMERICAN NAVAL LIEUTENANTS.

A Desperate Mission Most Successfully Accomplished.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

On board the Associated Press despatch boat Dauntless, off Santiago, Port Antonio, Ja., June 6—Lieut Richmond P. Hobson, of the flagship New York, with a volunteer crew of seven men, under cover of the darkness, after the moon had set shortly after three o'clock on Saturday morning ran the big collier Merrimac into the throat of the harbor swinging broadside across the channel and thus exploded and sank her.

He succeeded in his desperate enterprise under the fire of the batteries and forts which guard the entrance without support from the fleet.

Ensign Powell, also of the New York, with a steam launch, crept close under the guns of Morro Castle to take off the heroes of the Merrimac and remained there pluckily until daylight discovered his position without seeing a trace of the Merrimac crew.

As it was retired under a heavy fire from Mau-er rifles and the heavy guns of the batteries.

Lieut Hobson and his men are now Spanish prisoners and a flag of truce announces that they will be exchanged in due course of time.

That their mission was successful admits of no doubt for Ensign Powell distinctly saw the spars of the wrecked ship in the middle of the channel.

Seven Vessels Engaged

AMERICAN SHIPS SAID TO HAVE WITHDRAWN.

Spanish Ships Believed to be Vanguard of Cadiz Fleet.

CAPE HAITIEN, June 6.—Advices from Mole St. Nicholas say that on Saturday some distance off Jean Habel, a seaport on the north-west coast of Hayti, half-way between Point DePait and Mole St. Nicholas, a combat took place between three Spanish and four American ships.

The American ships are said to have withdrawn from the combat.

One of the Spanish warships entered the harbor of San Rafael for water.

The officers of the ships lying at Mole St. Nicholas were extremely reticent.

It is thought possible that the Spanish ships encountered were the vanguard of the Cadiz fleet.

MOVEMENTS OF RESERVE SQUADRON.
