

Lions Tie Series; Top Juniors 6-4

Last night the Kennedy-coached Lions defeated the Juniors 6-4 to knot the series 3-all. Going in to the bottom of the fourth frame the Lions were carrying a 6-0 lead.

The Juniors, however, drove four runs across the plate in this frame, with the MacCormack-coached crew making the best of three errors committed by their opponents.

Randy Vince Bradley went the route for the winners, limiting the Juniors to three hits. He walked five and struck out two. One of these hits was a double by second-sacker Cecil Ledner.

Mike O'Brien started for the Juniors but was chased in the

top of the fourth for John Hughes with an error and the score reading 6-0. O'Brien was touched for six hits and walked three.

Hughes had the game under control from the moment he stepped on the mound, sending seven opposing batters down via the strikeout route in the remaining frames. Two of the Lions' batters managed to get on base in the final frame, Kennedy hitting a single and shortstop Buck Whitlock, being issued a walk.

Sammy Gregory and Forbie Kennedy of the Lions led all batters each hitting 2 for 3. Gregory smacking two singles and Kennedy poling a double and a single.

PLAYOFF ACTIVITY in the Maritime is hotbed of baseball got underway Sunday.

The Kings County League, for the past number of years the real baseball center of these seaside provinces, got two best-of-three semi-finals series underway. In one encounter the Mount Stewart Legionaires, Prince Edward Island's surprise team of the year, eased by the always dangerous Peakes Bombers before a great turnout of 1,500 fans while Georgetown and the young St. Peter's Rovers had their game called after 1 1/2 innings because of a downpour of rain.

Both games as expected turned out to be typical play-off encounters with the fight going right down to the wire. At Mount Stewart the Legionaires scored a run in the bottom of the ninth as shortstop Buddy MacIntyre belted one out of the ball park. It was much the same situation at St. Peter's with Georgetown scoring two in the top of the 10th. The Rovers were at bat in the bottom half of the frame when the rain ended the contest. It will be finished next Sunday.

WITH THIS KIND of baseball being played there is little reason to doubt that crowds even greater than those that sat in on last year's playoffs will be turning out long before the finals have been reached. Last year as fans will remember well over 3,000 spectators jammed the parks to watch St. Peter's and Morell battle it out. This great enthusiasm on the part of the area's faithful fandom makes Kings County by far the Island's biggest baseball center and not even in the semi-pro leagues of the mainland are crowds like that attracted to the contests.

While the Legionaires got the jump in the short series with Sunday's victory look for the Bombers to come back fighting next Sunday. Peakes just doesn't go down without the stiffest kind of a fight, a fact which they have proven with their performances over the years.

IT IS ALSO PLAYOFF time for the Island's minor leagues. Tuesday afternoon at Memorial Field will see the opening game in both the bantam and Little League playoffs.

The Charlottetown Little Leaguers and their Summerside counterparts will clash in the first game of a best-of-three Island final while bantam Abbies and Summerside meet in the opener of a two-of-three series in the semi-finals. The bantam winner will take on Kings County's champions for the provincial title and the victor in this series advances to the Maritime tournament being held at Truro Aug. 28-29.

The two series will climax a banner season in minor league baseball in both Summerside and Charlottetown. The few fans who do take in the minor contests have seen some spirited baseball and a lot of close competition in both centres. The organization and successful direction of this important phase of baseball reflect well on the abilities of Johnny Carroll in Summerside and Jack Ready director of the city leagues.

IT IS NOW OR NEVER for the BIS Shamrocks.

Tonight the Shamrocks go up against Rollaway Aces in the City League softball semi-finals and a victory is absolutely necessary if the Irishmen are to continue in the hunt for the championship. Irv MacKinnon's Aces hold a 3-0 stranglehold on the series and need only one more victory to wrap it all up and enter the finals against either the Lions or Juniors, currently in a best fight in the other series.

Maybe the layout during Old Home Week was just what Ev Beagan's crew needed to regain the form that won them the crown last year. But MacKinnon and his cohorts are betting that it will be all over tonight.

BILL MAZEROSKI, the wonder boy second baseman of last year's pennant contending Pittsburgh Pirates, is having his troubles this season. Mazeroski who was rated by players, coaches and writers as about the slickest fielding second sacker to hit the major league in many a moon, is causing some of them to change their minds.

Danny Murtagh, Pirates' mentor, has this to say about his play: "I just can't understand what has happened to him. He's just a joy (22) but to look at him last year and look at him this season, you'd never know he was the same fellow. I hesitate to say this but he appears to be just a bit slower in the field and I think it's his worrying him at bat.

"Bob Skinner and Bill Virdon have been our other disappointments. Our only bright spot is that we have pined good ball in the field and our pitching has been pretty good under the circumstances. We aren't beating ourselves — we're just helpless at bat and our pitchers can't carry the load."

REMEMBER PETE RADEMACHER?

Miss Mustard's 95 was good for a spot in the championship flight as was Miss Horne's 101. The top 16 golfers in the qualifying round begin match play this morning and by this evening only four golfers will remain in the battle for the championship.

Bengals Edge Indians 5-4; Braves Wallop Dodgers

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit's Paul Foytack, bombed for five runs in less than one inning by Cleveland batters Sunday, beat the Indians Monday 5-4 after overcoming another shaky start.

The hard throwing righthander failed to get the side out in the first inning Sunday. When the contest was postponed in the top of the second, Tiger manager Jimmie Dykes decided to come back with Foytack Monday.

Foytack yielded three runs in the second inning and gave the Indians only four base hits the rest of the way in registering his 11th triumph against 10 defeats.

The loss dropped the Indians 3 1/2 games behind the league-leading Chicago White Sox.

Foytack's battery—mate, Lou Berberet, drove in the deciding run with a sixth-inning sacrifice fly.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Courageous Red Schoendienst, battling back from a bout with tuberculosis, rejoined Milwaukee Braves Monday—but only for a workout.

The 36-year-old second baseman took a light drill at bat and in the field, still hopeful of getting back on the active list to help the Braves in the stretch drive of the National League pennant fight.

"I think it would be a lot easier for me to get back this year but it's up to the doctor," Schoendienst said. "Actually, he doesn't want me to play this season. So I'm concentrating on next year."

The status of Schoendienst will depend on the outcome of an examination in St. Louis next Tuesday.

"If the doctor gives me the okay we'll put him back on the roster Sept. 1 when we can carry more players under the baseball rules," said general manager John McHale.

Schoendienst, who was stricken with TB after the world series last fall and underwent surgery to speed his recovery, said he still is several pounds over his bet playing weight of about 172.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Milwaukee right-hander Bob Buhl continued his mastery over Los Angeles Monday night as the Braves belted the Dodgers 8-1 in the first game of a two-night doubleheader.

Buhl's fourth victory over Los Angeles this season enabled the Braves to take temporary possession of second place, one percentage point ahead of the Dodgers.

Milwaukee's 10-hit attack included homers by Joe Adcock, Eddie Mathews and Hank Aaron. The Braves supported Buhl with a lousy attack against four Los Angeles pitchers.

Sandy Koufax lasted only an inning and a third after surrendering four runs.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A ninth-inning rally by the Philadelphia Phillies fell short Monday night as the St. Louis Cardinals defeated them 5-4 in the first game of a two-game series.

The Phillies bunched four hits in the last frame to score all their runs with nobody out, chasing Vinegar Bend Mizell from the mound. Lindy McDaniel finally put out the fire.

St. Louis collected 10 hits, five of them doubles, scattering them through every inning but the seventh and the ninth.

Seasoned Golfers Top Field In Can. Amateur Tourney

VANCOUVER (CP)—A pair of seasoned golfers took the early lead Monday in the first 18-hole qualifying round for the Canadian Amateur Golf Championship.

Doug Silverberg, 26-year-old Calgary insurance supervisor, toured the Marine Drive Club in three-under-par 68. Bob Kidd, 33, of Vancouver fired a 69.

Bobby Panasiuk, 17-year-old Ontario amateur king and semi-finalist in the Canadian junior championships earlier this month, came home in 35-36—71, even par.

Few others among the early finishers came close to equalling par.

Ron Willey, 23-year-old Vancouver car salesman, and Johnny Johnson, Vancouver real estate salesman, each fired 72.

Together with Kidd and Bert Ticehurst, also of Vancouver, they formed British Columbia's winning team in the interprovincial.

TICEHURST SLIPS

Ticehurst, the only man to break par Saturday and holder of the Marine Drive competitive record of 67, slipped to 76 Monday.

Silverberg was rolling along at a record five-under-par pace for 15 holes over the 6,432-yard par 36-35-71 layout. But on the par-three, 167-yard 16th his tee shot was six inches off the green and fell under the lip of a trap to the right. He took a four.

After paring the tough 17th, Silverberg again ran into tee shot trouble and took four to reach the green from where he sank a six-foot putt for a five.

Peter Hope, 23-year-old Dartmouth, N.S., amateur, who paced Maritimes golfers in the interprovincial play, again turned in a fine round. He shot a "safe" 73. Kidd played cautious golf throughout. He missed long putts for par on the seventh, ninth and 17-and took five on each; he birdied five holes, the most sensational being a nifty 45-foot putt on the par-four third.

COURSE HEAVY

The fairways and greens were heavy following an overnight downpour. A 10-mile-an-hour southerly breeze was a factor on five-holes and chilly, 60-degree weather and a slight drizzle during the early afternoon added further discomfort to the 146 Canadian and United States amateurs entered.

A second 18 holes of qualifying play will be held today with the low 64 expected match play Wednesday. Scores of 155 or better were expected to enter the championship flight.

SPORT ECHOES

The Summerside Junior and Intermediate baseball teams have won two games apiece in their current series for the town championship, and the deciding game was rained out on Saturday. The game lasted one-third of an inning. The lead-off man of the Intermediates struck out just before the deluge—a torrent of rain which made the bases a very few minutes.

Felling is running high in this series, as is usually the case among fellow townsmen (a civil war is about the most unconvincing form of conflict that can be imagined). So strenuously has the battle been waged, on and off the diamond, that the services of a neutral umpire have been secured. Perhaps "out-of-town" is a better word than "neutral," as nearly all umpires are neutral. It is not favoritism but astigmatism which causes a lot of their troubles, and, of course, some of their very best calls, if they happen to be bordering, are pronounced by players and coaches and jerrid at by fans.

Suppose, Mr. Gus fan, you were the catcher, and an opponent was bearing down on you headed for the pay-off base, the home plate. The ball is a little late, arriving so without it you attempt to get in the way and impede the progress of the runner—a strictly illegal tactic, by one sometimes practised by backstops. The runner, like the rebels at New Orleans, kept a-runnin' with the result that you were hit, and knocked bow-legged. You pick yourself painfully out of the dirt mopefully realizing that you had it coming, and—the umpire comes snarling at you for ignoring the rule book. What would you do, Augustus? Would that little voice inside you whisper—"count ten" or "bom—away"?

It happened that way in the fourth game of this championship series, and the catcher concerned led loose with a lot of words not found in the best dictionaries, especially if they are abridged. This sort of thing is not to be condoned, of course, but we think when a player illegally gets in a runner's way, and gets the "tossed salad" treatment, that is no time for an umpire to start quoting rule 5, section B. It's like looking down in the ditch at a car-driver's broken body and telling him to appear in court the next morning for passing another car on a curve.

1959 Is Tough Year For Boxing Champs

LOS ANGELES (AP)—This has been a tough year for champions in boxing, as Hogan (Kid) Bassey, for one, can testify.

And the veteran little scrapper from Nigeria faces a rough task in trying to regain his world featherweight title from Davey Moore of the United States.

The return match at 15 rounds or less goes on Wednesday night before a crowd approaching 10,000 at the Olympic Auditorium and a television (ABC) audience, starting at 11 p.m. ADT.

The roll of fallen champions lists heavyweight Floyd Patterson to Ingemar Johansson, welterweight Virgil Akins to Don Jordan, bantamweight Alphonse Halimi to Jose Becerra, and last March 18 Bassey to the pride of Springfield, Ohio, Moore.

This was in the same Olympic battle pit. And if the rematch is as good as the original, it should be a great fight.

Sharp-shooting Davey, then the No. 1 challenger, stopped Bassey in 13 rounds. Moore opened the first of two bad cuts over the eyes in the third round.

He was ahead by as much as seven points when the Bassey corner called it quits between the 13th and 14th rounds.

Willie Ketchum, Davey's manager, said: "Moore is a better all-round fighter. He can out-punch and outbox Bassey."

Bassey had charge of the fight through the first five rounds, but Moore, ripping open another gash in the sixth, grew stronger as the match continued.

DRINKS SOLDERING FLUX
