

Veno Leads Field In Fredericton Open

FREDERICTON (CP)—Jim Veno of Orono, Me., sank a three-foot putt on the 18th green Wednesday and carded a two-under-par 68 for the first-round lead in the \$1,025 Fredericton Open Golf Tournament.

It gave Veno a one-stroke lead over Bruce Dobie of Worcester, Mass., heading into today's (Thursday's) final round of the 36-hole championship.

Veno played the 3,934-yard layout with perfect form, hitting long off the tee and dropping several long putts. Veno, 23, in his third year as a professional, won the Maritime Open Tournament on the same course in June. It was his first tourna-

ment since being injured in a construction accident in April that resulted in a concussion and a shoulder separation.

The big, 220-pounder is an entry in the \$4,000 Saint John open Friday and Saturday—and goes to Moncton Sunday to play in a 36-hole open there.

Twenty-four pros are playing for the \$500 first prize here.

Kerry Way Wins Classic To Cop \$60,004 Prize

LEXINGTON, Ill. (AP)—Kerry Way won the \$122,540 Hambletonian Stakes Wednesday in straight heats.

Kerry Way trotted the mile in 1:58 4.5 in the first heat and in 1:59 3.5 in the second.

Polaris was second in each heat, by three-quarters of a length each time.

Kerry Way was the first try to win the coveted Hambletonian stakes since 1958.

Driven by 62-year-old Frank Ervin, the little daughter of Star's Pride went off as the unofficial choice in the betless 41st edition of the classic and won in straight heats.

Armbrø Gazelle, one of two Canadian colts in this race for three-year-old trotters, finished fourth in the second heat and fifth over-all, having landed in sixth place in the first heat.

This good finish, by an entry that started the first heat in 12th position—in the second tier—earned \$6,004 for owner Max J. Webster of Brantford, Ont. The driver was Bob Sillphant, 51-year-old native of Rapid City, Minn.

The other Canadian entry, Governor Armbrø, owned by Armstrong Brothers of Brantford, Ont., broke in the second heat and finished 11th. Added to a first-heat fifth, this gave Governor Armbrø seventh place over-all, well out of the money.

The victory was worth \$60,004 to Gainesway Farm of Lexington, Ky., owner of Kerry Way. Polaris earned \$30,022 for owners Patrick DiGennaro and Anthony LeCesse of New York State.

Kerry Way established a new record for two heats by a three-year-old filly. Her times added to 3:58 2.5, which topped the old mark of 3:59 4.5, set in 1950 by Elaine Rodney at intermediates.

SOUTHPORT, England (AP)—Kel Nagle, a slope shouldered Australian, shot four birdies and an eagle on the back nine Wednesday for a 68 and took a two-stroke lead over the 165-strong field in the \$200,000 World Golf Tournament, the richest in the world.
