GEN. SIR DONALD MARTIN STEWART will resign as Commander-in-Chief of the Indian Army in October, and will take a seat in the Council of India. Lt. Gen. Sir Frederick Seigh Roberts will succeed to the command of the Indian Army.

HIS GRACE the Archbishop of Quebec has issued a circular to his clergy, ordering that the Te Deum be sung in all their churches to return thanks to the Almighty for the termination of hostilities in the North West and the safe return of the volunteers.

PICOU AND STELLARTON BRANCH.—The people of Westville, N. S., are petitioning the Dominion Government to have the Stellarton and Picou branch run through their town. At a recent public meeting resolutions to this effect were passed and a committee appointed.

The steamer Miramichi arrived from Montreal last evening with freight and one hundred and thirty passengers to this and other ports. She sailed at midnight for Picou, and will return to Summerside on Tuesday morning.

The value of real estate in Georgetown is evidently on the increase. To-day a tract of land in the suburbs, containing about twenty-two acres, and a town lot near the residence of Mr. Easton, were sold by A. McNeill, Auctioneer, at the Law Courts Building, for the sum of \$600 cash. Mr. Thomas Hessian was the purchaser. It is noteworthy, that while real estate is said to be depreciating in value, this property brought per acre \$25.

Dominion Political Notes.

OTTAWA, Aug. 1.

John Gordon, of Brudenell, and Samuel D. Chaisson, of Rollo Bay, P. E. I., are gazetted Harbor Masters.

By an order in council it is provided that in order to facilitate the operations of the Canada Temperance Act, distillers are permitted to remove spirits from their distilleries into counties where the Act is in force in quantities of not less than ten gallons.

The Governor General will be in Ottawa on Tuesday next, when the change in the personnel of the ministers will become an accomplished fact by the swearing in of the new ministers.

The Cabinet has been engaged since the prorogation in preparing arrangements for a census of the Northwest territories. This is preliminary to bringing down a measure giving the Northwest representation in the Federal Parliament.

Riel's Trial.

REGINA, August 1.

Riel's trial was resumed this morning. Capt. Young, Gen. Middleton, Rev. C. B. Pitblado, Carr Deant, and Corporal Pigott, gave testimony rebutting the insanity testimony given yesterday by witnesses for the defence.

Fitzpatrick addressed the jury for the prisoner, drawing tears from two of the jurymen and several of the audience. Riel addressed the jury for nearly two hours. He said he did not desire the plea insanity, and hoped with God's help, to show he was not insane. He paused abruptly in his speech and offered up a brief prayer for help, and then continued his address. Robinson addressed the jury in a powerful speech on behalf of the Crown, and the case was given to the jury.

A Soldier's Revenge and Suicide.

BOMBAY, July 31.

A soldier to-day was reported for misconduct. In revenge he shot and killed two sergeants belonging to the native regiment. He then barricaded himself within quarters and shot his wife dead. After keeping up for a time an ineffectual fire against those whom he attempted to assail his retreat, he lay down beside his wife's corpse, and with his last bullet, ended his own life.

Two Men Killed.

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.

Nine workmen on the new Aqueduct, at Shaft No. 24, near Highbridge, got into the bucket at noon yesterday to come to the top of the shaft, 175 feet. When a third of the way up the edge of the bucket caught in a projecting rock and was upset. Four men were thrown down the pit, and two were killed.

Lord Randolph Churchill's Discreditable Intrigues.

LONDON, Aug. 1.

The Times declares that if Lord Randolph Churchill persists in dragging the Cabinet into discreditable intrigues, the Opposition will be relieved of all fears in the coming general election.

A German Spy Captured.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 1.

A German Revenue Officer has been arrested by the Russian authorities at Jacobstadt, on the Baltic, as a spy. On his person were found letters addressed to his wife containing descriptions and plans of the Russian forts and fortifications.

A Sensational Despatch—A War with Russia Certain.

PARIS, Aug. 1.

The Telegraph has a sensational despatch from St. Petersburg, saying that war between England and Russia is certain, directly after the election in England.

Glasgow's Iniquities.

GLASGOW, Aug. 1.

At a meeting to-day, the Provost of Glasgow declared, in speaking of the revelations made by the Pall Mall Gazette, that iniquities were practised in Glasgow on a similar scale to those of London.

A Defaulting Cashier's Death.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 1.

Henry Conove, assistant cashier of the Manufacturers' Bank, died on Friday. Deficiencies have been discovered in his accounts to the extent of \$74,000.

Monsignor Fabre.

MONTREAL, Aug. 1.

Monsignor Fabre, during his trip to the Maritime Provinces, will be present at the celebration of the 25th anniversary of Bishop McIntyre, at Charlottetown.

Mr. Spoopendyke's Death.

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.

Stanley Huntly, well-known journalist of this city, died last night. He was author of the "Spoonendyke" papers.

CURRENT NOTES.

The Transvaal Government is bankrupt. Tripoli is being heavily fortified by the Porte.

The average wealth of Massachusetts farmers is said to be about \$2,529 per capita.

The executors of Victor Hugo propose to erect a statue of the poet at Besancon, his birthplace, and in the Pantheon a tomb worthy of the illustrious dead.

The export of cattle from Montreal to Great Britain since the opening of navigation has been 19,000 head—5,000 more than last year to the same time.

Good authorities in England claim that there is too much wool being produced in the world of an inferior grade. The finest goods and wools are in demand and hold their prices the world over better than the low grades.

Mr. Gladstone expresses his confident belief that the newly enfranchised electors will show their preference for Liberal men and Liberal measures. He looks forward with assured confidence to the result of the general elections.

The United States Government is now prosecuting a sea captain before the District Court of Boston for having cast away his ship and cargo. The brig Mary Celeste was lost upon a coral reef off the coast of Hayti, during the beginning of the year, and it has been proved that the captain deliberately ordered the vessel to be put back on her course, which was carrying her to destruction, after the man at the wheel had taken measures to prevent a disaster.

By the law of the United States, wise in this respect, this is an offence which can be punished with death. Yet criminal as the captain may be, he must have been acting on behalf of the owners of the vessel, who are, therefore, as guilty as he. That men could be found capable of casting a ship away in this barefaced manner is merely a proof that the safety of ships and those who sail in them cannot be trusted entirely to those who own and command them, something moderately well recognized by this time. The noble system of insurance should be so overhauled that it would be impossible to burn a house or wreck a ship for profit.
