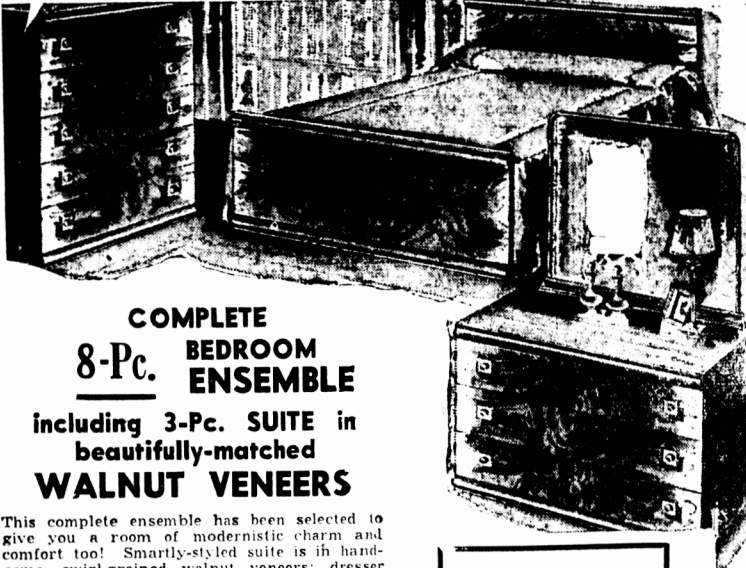

Around The Armouries

One of the units which has contributed much to the military life of the Province and, incidentally, to other units is the Sigs. At the present time the second in command of the 5th Signals Regiment here is Major Frederick S. Jenkins.

A native Islander the 2 I/C was born at Mt. Herbert. After getting his senior matriculation at Prince of Wales College he taught school at Mt. Herbert and Alexandria until the start of the war.

Maj. Jenkins first joined the Army as a signaller with the old 6th District Signals in 1937. He got his commission as a lieutenant in 1938 and 'went active' at the start of the war. He was posted to the Sydney Detachment until May 1940 when he went on a six months course at C.S.T.C., Barriefield, Ont. September of that same year saw him overseas as instructor with a holding unit at Borden, Hants.

He later went to No. 1 Canadian Corps Signals and was with the 7th Anti Tank Regiment as signals officer during their stay at Petworth, Sussex. After this he moved on to the 1st Canadian Army Signals at Ashstead, Surrey. Then in December he joined the 3rd Div. Sigs and was with them till the end of the war. They were the invasion division in North West Europe — France, Belgium, Holland and Germany.

At the end of hostilities he was in No. 3 Canadian Repat Depot and finally got back home in March, 1946. In civilian life he served with the V.L.A. for a time and then went into the Income Tax office. In 1947 he returned to the Army in the Reserve as Admin. Officer of 5th Sigs. Then when Lt. Col. F. J. Storey retired and Lt. Col. K. M. Johnson took over command, Maj. Jenkins was named second in command.

Personally popular with his fellow officers as well as his men, the major for a time served as president of the Officers Mess. He has a host of friends around the Armouries.

The 28th L.A.A. Regiment has just taken on nine new recruits in its unit at Saint Dunstan's College. Joining the Ack Ack group were students F. I. Bennett, W. J. Clarkin, G. P. Dalton, P. D. Driscoll, J. W. Lacey, J. J. McAdam, J. L. McGinn and R. J. Strang.

Officer Cadet G. W. Wellner has just received his promotion to lieutenant and has been posted to the 14th Battery. He will be absent for a while as he is being despatched to the Royal Canadian School of Artillery at Shilo, Manitoba, on course.

Other members of the regiment who will be leaving shortly include Lt. H. W. F. Hughes, assistant training officer, 14th battery, and Lt. J. G. Lacey, adjutant, who are being despatched to the Artillery Camp, Picton, Ont., on a lieutenant-to-captain qualifying course.

Capt. M. E. Campbell, training officer of the Battery, is going to R.C.S.A.A., Picton, on a captain-to-major qualifying course.

Several promotions have recently been announced by the P.E.I. Regiment (17th Recce). Among them are those of Sgt. T. M. MacFarlane to be W.O. 2, and Sgt. A. L. MacKay to be S.Q.M.S.

Others are Cpl. G. R. Birt and Tpr. J. N. Richard to Sergeant, and Tpr. C. C. Gallant to be Corporal. The strength of the regiment is steadily increasing as shown by recent additions. Among the recruits in recent weeks have been Troopers A. J. Arsenault, J. A. MacEachern, Cecil Muri, J. S. Delory, E. J. Gallant, T. A. Gallant, A. S. Gilbert, J. L. E. Kelly, A. B. Pidgeon, J. H. Gallant, A. A. King and C. B. Walsh.

Capt. E. L. Hume, popular adjutant of the 28th L.A.A. Regiment, has moved over and is now with the newly formed 3 A.G.R.A. (Ack Ack).

The Signals have recently entertained Col. G. O. Gamble, Command Signals Officer, H.Q. Eastern Command. He arrived this week on a routine visit to the local unit. That regiment reports another promotion this week. It is that of Cpl. J. H. Gallant who now joins the ranks of the Sergeants.

GRAIN

WINNIPEG, April 19 — (CP) — Prices moved lower today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange. May rye declined the 10-cent limit and flax suffered wide losses.

The declines were brought about by price drops on United States markets. A flurry of selling met little commercial demand. Routine domestic demand appeared in oats

and barley while rye had some trading by American interests. Some processors were attracted to flax.

Overnight export loadings reported today included 420,000 bushels of Canadian wheat to the United Kingdom; 130,000 bushels to Belgium; and 85,000 bushels to Switzerland.

Class two wheat prices increased 1 1/2 cents while international wheat agreement prices jumped 1/2 cent.
