

Catholic Welfare Bureau Discusses Relief Problem

The regular monthly meeting of the Charlottetown Catholic Social Welfare Bureau was held last night at the Bureau headquarters with the president, Mr. R.M. MacDonald presiding.

Considerable time was spent discussing the relief problem in the City which was particularly acute during the past month when the unusual cold, together with the high number of unemployed, created food, fuel and clothing needs among many families.

The Bureau's expenditures for the month amounted to \$2,241.49. The main expenses were for food, fuel, child maintenance and clothing.

During the month the Bureau paid out \$710.60 for food for the needy. The fuel bill amounted to \$627.06 while \$503.41 was paid out for child maintenance and \$300.92 for clothing.

The Bureau Director, Sister Mary Henry, suggested that a committee of men should be appointed to study the unemployment situation and ascertain if it would be possible to obtain work for a number of men who are now receiving relief.

Housing conditions in the City were also considered and it was suggested that an effort be made to seek an improvement in living conditions in many dwellings.

Suez Crisis Subject Of Intercollegiate Debate

Tonight at St. Dunstan's University gymnasium, for perhaps the first time in Charlottetown, the Suez crisis will be debated on a public platform when the local University debating team will meet a team from the Dalhousie University Law School of Halifax in a regularly scheduled Maritime inter-collegiate debate.

Representing St. Dunstan's will be Ian Gillies of Halifax and Lorne MacGuigan of Charlottetown. They will defend the affirmative of "Resolved that the Anglo-French action in the Suez, Autumn 1956, was justified."

A win for St. Dunstan's will assure them of at least a tie for the Maritime debating championship, but because the schedule will not be completed until February 16, it is not known if any other colleges are eligible for top honors in the league. Dalhousie has a record of one win and one loss so far this year.

The importance of tonight's debate can be seen from the fact that a win for St. Dunstan's could mean a trip to Ottawa in early March to compete in the Dominion finals. By virtue of an unanimous win over St. Thomas College in Chatham, and last Saturday's split decision victory over Kings College in Halifax, St. Dunstan's is undefeated this season.

The debate, which begins at 8:00 o'clock, is open to the general public.

Rehabilitation Gov't To Pay For Burned Convent

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government has agreed to pay \$649,000 compensation for a convent destroyed last May in an air crash, it was reported Friday.

The convent, at nearby Orleans, burned and 13 persons died when an RCAP jet - interceptor fighter aircraft plummeted into it last May 15.

The judge - advocate-general's branch of the defence department was reported to have agreed Friday to pay the Grey Nuns of the Cross, who owned the convent, \$649,000. Claims for compensation arising from the death of 11 nuns still were under discussion.

The department also is to pay \$19,500 to the family of Rev. Richard Ward, naval chaplain assigned to the convent and who perished in the disaster, and \$5,000 to the family of Miss Aline Lapointe of Masson, Que., a convent cook who died.
