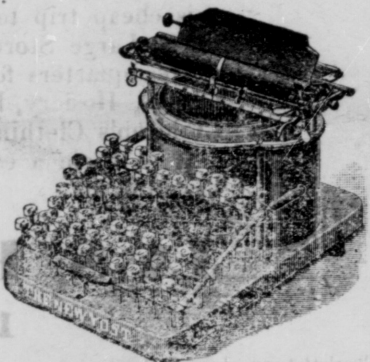

Behring Sea Arbitration.

SIR RICHARD WEBSTER POINTS OUT MORE
FLAWS IN THE U. S. CASE.

Advice from Paris state that Sir Richard Webster continued his argument on Friday before the Behring Sea tribunal of arbitration in behalf of the British case. He chaffed Mr. J. C. Carter, of counsel for the United States, on his theories on property and its origin. American law, Sir Richard said, did not claim any property whatever in the seals and there was not a vestige of authority for treating the seals as domestic animals. Sir Richard further argued that there was no property in the seal, until they were killed or captured. The British Foreign Office has issued a blue book which contains the correspondence concerning an agreement between Great Britain and Russia, as to the protection of Russia's interests in the North Pacific ocean or Behring Sea. The original contention of Russia that her cruisers should have exclusive right to police the seas in question and to convey British trespassers to Petropaulovski, a port of Asiatic Russia, where the cases should be adjudicated. Lord Rosbery declined to agree to such proceedings and suggested that the British vessels caught trespassing be conveyed to Yokohama, where the cases should be adjudicated by a British consular court. Eventually the powers agreed that the trespassers should be delivered to a British cruiser or to the nearest British authorities on land. Great Britain at the same time undertaking to bring them speedily to trial.

Not Obligated to Explain.

(The Empire.)

Although the April reports show that Canada's foreign commerce thus far in 1893 is nearly \$12,000,000 ahead of last year—and that was at exceptionally high year—noting that the trade faddists and pessimists from their gloom and dependency. Foreign trade is not the sole index of national prosperity, but it is one indication and no insignificant one. An abnormal and alarming shrinkage in our outside commerce would certainly call for some explanation amongst protectionists or upholders of the National Policy. Out of respect for common sense a great practical condition must be susceptible of at least partial analysis and treatment. That must be the view of the ordinary plain and practical man. But we are informed on the most orthodox authority, that free traders are above the rules that govern practical people. The rest of us have to account for things in this world. But the free traders are a law unto themselves. "Free traders," says the Globe seer, "are not called upon to account for every alteration in the trade of a free trade country." Commerce may collapse, money markets may be convulsed, thrones totter, and nations go into bankruptcy, but "free traders are not called on to account" for anything. They have their theories; these theories, they believe, are fixed and eternal; if the facts don't square with the theories, why, so much the worse for the facts, that's all. This is precisely the view proclaimed by the reform statesmen during the Cartwright regime. The country was suffering, but the men in power were "fles on the wheel," and the man who dared to assert that the fiscal conditions might be improved was either a fool or a fooler. In other words, "free traders are not called upon" to explain the facts that prove their policy to be a delusion and a snare. Protectionists have to do it. National Policy men have to do it. But the free traders soar serenely up in the skies removed from more actual conditions and vulgar facts!

Strange Medical Cases.

A TOOTH IN A LUNG AND AN ENCYSTED
BUTTON IN A NOSE Baffle Diagnosis.

A late New York despatch says: Howard C. Conroy, a Brooklyn lawyer, is lying very ill at his residence on Reid Avenue. Until Wednesday, he was supposed to be nearing his end, but now he has had a turn for the better. His case is likely to find its way into the medical journals. It is nearly a month ago that he was taken ill, and the physician called in found that he was suffering from a severe lung trouble that gave all the indications of hasty consumption. The treatment usually prescribed in such cases was ordered. The patient did not experience any symptomatic relief. He was afflicted with the most violent paroxysms of coughing and had frequent hemorrhages. He grew weaker and weaker from this continued strain upon his system and it seemed as though the end was near. On Wednesday he had a violent fit of coughing, accompanied by a hemorrhage, when suddenly he felt something harsh come up his throat, and on investigation it was found to be a tooth. The ejection of this gave him immediate relief. It seems that just before he was taken ill Mr. Conroy went to a dentist to have some teeth fixed and some drawn. At the time he had an impression that he had swallowed one of his teeth, but the dentist, to reassure him, while knowing it to be a fact, denied it, and told Mr. Conroy that it was only his imagination. He took this for truth and so did not connect the tooth with his illness. It seems now that the tooth was drawn into the lung and caused the laceration which resulted in all the trouble.

Another curious medical case is that of a ten-year-old girl living near the Conrads. For eight years she has been a constant sufferer from nose-bleeding. She had been taken to a number of doctors, but had not been able to obtain any relief. A short time ago she was taken to Dr. Schondelmeyer, of No. 807 Quincy Street, a specialist in nose and eye troubles, and he examined the child and found in the nose a protuberance. He removed it and revealed to the parent of the child a shoe button. The child when a baby had snuffed the button up her nose, which had lodged there, and, becoming encysted, had remained undiscovered.

Affairs in Germany.

According to a late Berlin despatch, Count Herbert Bismarck, candidate of the Union of Landed Proprietors in the Schoenhausen district, in making his first speech before a meeting of his supporters in Schoenhausen last week, criticised the government's commercial policy as revealed in the customs union treaties. In most respects his remarks followed the lines already made familiar by his father in the Hamburger Nachrichten. The money necessary for the increase of the army, he said, would be in the government's hands already had not the Chancellor set his tariff reform policy in operation. The folly of the commercial treaties was evidenced by the unfortunate condition of the treasury. The need of the government and the people called for the restoration of the former duties on grain. The peasants would commit political suicide if they should vote for the Liberal or Radical candidates, who were eager to reduce the grain tariff still lower, and thus accomplish the ruin of German agriculture.

France Protests.

The Paris correspondent of the London Morning Post says: French exhibitors complain bitterly of the treatment received by them at the hands of the managers of the World's Fair in Chicago, and of the customs and railway officials in the United States. They assert that there has been much unnecessary delay in getting their exhibits through the custom house and in the matter of transportation to Chicago. They also complain of the intolerable dirt and general disorder around the exhibition grounds. The refusal of the Fair managers to appoint an international jury is also the subject of much adverse comments.
