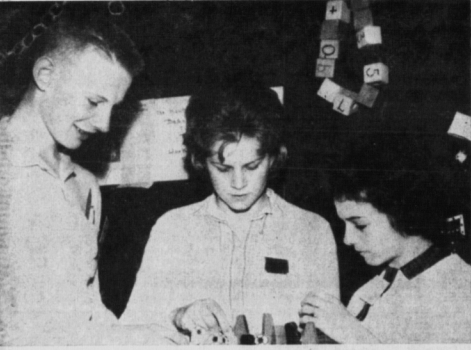


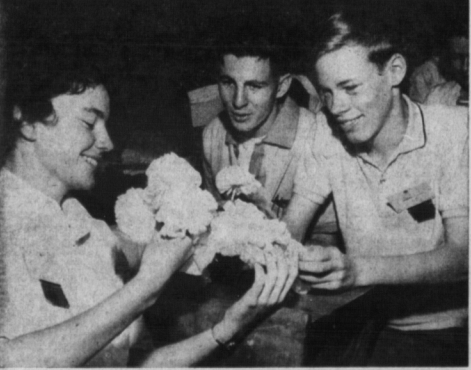

YOUTHFUL DELEGATES TAKE TIME OUT FROM THEIR SCHEDULE FOR A SING-SONG

Students Consider Centre As 'Invaluable Experience'

The desire to promote both personal and universal understanding of Junior Red Cross work has motivated delegates to the training centre here in their efforts to make the centre an outstanding success.

More than 100 students from five eastern provinces, here for a 10-day training session consisting of lectures, observation, practical work and recreation, will be returning to school in the fall better equipped to carry on Junior Red Cross work and to interest others in the program. The group includes 20 youthful observers from the United States.

As an aid in retaining the new ideas gained at the centre, the students keep a log of each day's activities, and these will be placed on display at their respective schools in the fall.

THREE THEMES

Activities of the delegates, junior leaders, and directors have revolved around three main themes during the past few days—international relief, international exchange, and community service.

The directors give lectures on these subjects at Prince of Wales College, where displays of photographs, paintings, posters, and handicrafts from all over the world have been arranged. In addition, several guest speakers have spoken to the group.

Most of the high school delegates feel that the training session has been an invaluable experience. Students describing the centre listed the interchange of ideas and the resulting closer ties between divisions of the Red Cross, among the more valuable features of the session.

SELF-CONFIDENCE

One student stressed in particular the importance of increased self-confidence gained from the training. Every delegate, he said, has an opportunity to participate in the preparation and functioning of the program, and most of them obtain confidence in public speaking—often for the first time.

Recreation at Montgomery Hall and at the YMCA was another popular feature of the training session, as was the growth of friendship among representatives of the different Junior Red Cross branches.

Through paintings and handicrafts from other countries, the delegates learn to appreciate the value of an important aspect of Junior Red Cross work—that of international exchange.

Paintings from such places as Korea, Japan, Czechoslovakia, Norway and the U.S.S.R. hang in the rotunda at Montgomery Hall and in one of the classrooms at P.W.C. These are the creations of students of high school age or younger, as are the games, toys, and dolls dressed

ed in native costumes, complete to the last intricate detail.

Tape recordings from other countries are an additional aid through which the delegates increase their understanding of people in distant lands.

The students have already demonstrated, during the past few days, their ability and eagerness to make a practical application of theories which they learned about community service. On Saturday, they entertained patients at the Rehabilitation Centre and the Provincial Sanatorium, and a party was held for the patients of Beach Grove Sunday afternoon.

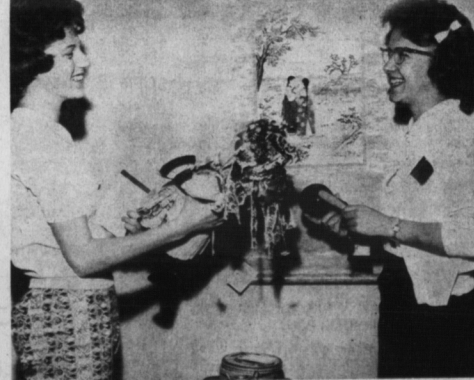
BUS TRIP TO 'S'IDE
