Public Meeting.

A public meeting was held in Mr. Waugh's Hall on Tuesday evening last, for the purpose of taking action in regard to obtaining increased Post Office facilities, and other matters. Richard Hunt, Esq., was called to the chair, and Mr. H. J. Richardson acted as Secretary. The first resolution proposed was one asking the Government to place a mail Clerk on board the mail Steamer calling here, in order that we might obtain our Colonial mails without their first having to go to Charlottetown, and also asking for the Post Office in Summerside to be made a distributing office; it passed. A resolution asking for a grant of money to lay down side walks in Summerside; one asking for a Square and Market House; one asking for a grant to build a new block to Summerside wharf; and one asking for a grant to the Canadian steamers, to induce them to call at this port. There was also a resolution put to the meeting, asking our Government to form a Treaty with the United States, by allowing the Americans to fish in our waters free, and the Island fish and produce to be admitted free into their ports; it was negatived by a small majority, notwithstanding that it was very strongly urged by its proposers. We do not know that there were any more resolutions passed, and we think there were too many as it was. As we heard an individual remark, "why did not the meeting ask for the whole revenue at once." If the Government will give all that is asked for we will consider them a true liberal one.

PARTIAL ELECTIONS.—The Election for the Third District of Queen's County, on Wednesday the 17th, resulted in the return of the Leader of the Government, Hon. George Coles, by a majority of 826 votes, Mr. Ross only polling 25 votes.

For the Second District of King's County, Hon. E. Whelan has been defeated, and Mr. Edward Rielly and Mr. McCormack elected. Mr. Whelan was 45 votes behind Mr. Rielly.

We will endeavor to keep our readers posted up in the Parliamentary proceedings while the House is in session.

The ice in our harbor is breaking up. The channel is quite clear, and we expect to see the steamer in a few days.

We have received a communication from Mr. A. A. McKenzie, in reference to the Teachers meeting recently held in Summerside. As its publication would (on all probability) lead to an unpleasant discussion, we can not see any use in inserting it.

The many friends of the Hon. James Yeo will be glad to hear that he is recovering from his late severe illness.

We understand that Mr. Simpson, the mail carrier, will in future come in direct to Summerside, instead of going round through St. Eleanor's. He will go out through St. Eleanor's, however, on his return.

An editorial article on the Benevolent Society of Summerside and its bye laws, is crowded out this week—we will give it in our next issue.

The Steamer Albatross, from Boston, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday; it is reported that she has small pox on board.

The Steamer Princess of Wales left Charlottetown for Pictou on Tuesday last. She will return to-day, bringing the English mail, which arrived in Halifax this week.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—On Tuesday, the 9th inst., as Mr. Henry Maxfield, of Centreville, Bedeque, was engaged in goose-shooting, his gun unfortunately burst, the breech striking him on the forehead. He did not appear to suffer much from the effects of the concussion until the 16th, when he complained of the brain being cold. On the 17th, medical assistance being called in, he was found to be in a state of lockjaw. He was immediately put under the influence of chloroform, the wound examined, and some fifteen pieces of the fractured skull removed. The wound was then bandaged up, but after consciousness was restored, lockjaw returned accompanied with great pain, until death terminated his sufferings on the morning of Tuesday, the 18th inst. We deeply sympathize with his bereaved relatives.—Pat.
