ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Montreal Gazette: During the recent bye-election to the Ontario Legislature the general superintendent of the Ontario Railway which traverses North Hastings, issued a circular saying that the company required every employe who had a vote to cast it in favor of the Liberal candidate. The new list of the Ontario railway subsidies contains \$63,000 for the Ontario Central Railway. The action of the railway authorities was an outrage, and Mr. Hardy has rewarded them for it.

St. John Telegraph: It is said that not much enthusiasm is being displayed at Washington over the war in the Philippines and the great American victories reported from there. This is not surprising for little wars of that kind are not well calculated to excite feelings of gladness in the hearts of those who are forced into them. Great Britain has carried on many such contests, and they are among the worst of the burdens of empire, bringing in no glory and little gain. The present war in the Philippines is likely to be a tedious contest for the population is large and in a measure warlike, and the country is favorable to guerilla warfare.

Hamilton Spectator: Contrast, if you please, Sir Charles Tupper's great speech of yesterday with, say, Cartwright's speeches when in opposition. Sir Charles' speech was Canadian all through; he was glad to acknowledge that Canada was prosperous; he told the government that so long as it held to the present tariff system he and the opposition would be with it. It was a cheerful, manly, Canadian speech, well adapted to make Canadians think well of their country and remain here. Do you remember Sir Richard's awful whines when in opposition? A times when the country was quite as well off as it now is, it was the habit of Sir Richard to make gruesome complaint that the country was going to hades. Tears and lamentations filled his speeches. Nothing was right. Every other country on the face of the globe—particularly the United States—was better than Canada. And thousands and thousands of young Canadian fools believed the lachrymose orator and went to the United States. An Englishman's View.

LONDON, April 2.—The Daily Chronicle prints extracts from a letter written by a distinguished British naval officer recently to a publicist, who dwines upon the difficulties facing the Americans there. The writer, whose name is not given, says that the climate is very trying for nine months of the year, and that it is quite impossible for whites to live there. The American, he declares, lack mule batteries, or horse, to move their artillery. He is confident that the Americans "would prefer to clear out," but explains that, "they cannot do this, because of the foreign merchants." The officer also remarks: "The Americans do not appear to understand the game of using one lot of natives against another. If they wish to conquer the Islands, they must adopt that plan, and also make roads and railways."

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Montreal is negotiating a loan of three millions. The Mail and Empire suggests that in order to be fashionable the civic authorities should announce that they have a hands-me-surplus.

—At a special meeting of the standing committee on prohibition and moral reform of the Ontario Association of the Methodistist church, held at Toronto a few days ago a resolution was adopted declaring that Sir Wilfrid Laurier's answer to the prohibitionists was unsatisfactory both in argument and conclusion, calling for protest and resistance by all friends of prohibition throughout the entire country. The resolution also declared that a prohibition bill should be introduced during the present session of parliament.

—Although the people of the United States will not be called upon until November, 1900, to elect a president for the next term, the republican managers are already looking around for a candidate. All the signs are that Mr. McKinley will be chosen to succeed himself. A poll of the members of the House of Representatives shows that he would be almost the unanimous choice. On the Democratic side there is still discussion over the money question, and Mr. Bryan keeps himself to the front as the leader and continues to insist that silver is the issue.

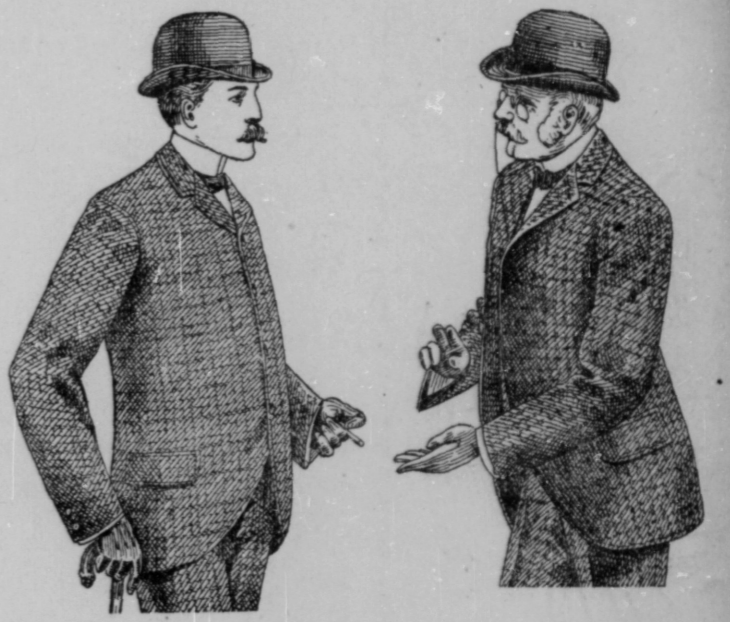

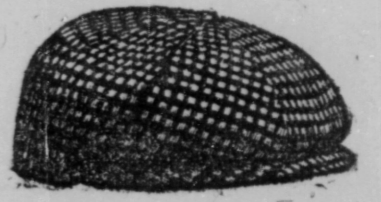
