Let's Talk It Over

A Prince County Viewpoint by "d" Dame Rumor has it that there is an unusually good demand for this year's university graduates in Canada. This should encourage young college aspirants in Prince County. Much, perhaps too much, has been written of late about the misfits who attend universities. Undoubtedly there are some of these in every university, but you will also find them in all walks of life. Implementation of the Massey Report with regard to Federal aid to universities and an increased number of scholarships will tend to improve the situation. It will go far to seeing that the survival into higher learning of the fittest minds rather than of the fittest pocketbooks will be the rule. It cannot be gainsaid, of course, that the larger percentage of university minds comes from the wealthy class, but the percentage is not so high that we can safely ignore those who are eminently fitted for university training but cannot foot the bills incidental to this higher education. The shocking succession of children's deaths by car accidents makes it imperative that we re-view very carefully our ideas and regulations of safe driving. In all cases to date, the drivers have been exonerated of all blame. They were such accidents as any of us might have had. This does not mean, however, that we cannot take steps to make it safer for our children in this age of speed. Are we, any or all of us, making due allowance for the natural impulsiveness of young children? Perhaps a new set of standards could be worked out that would
