New Diabetics Found Total 12 Per Month

Charles Praught, Charlottetown, national vice president of the Canadian Diabetic Association, was made honorary president of the Charlottetown and District branch of the association. The honor was bestowed upon Mr. Praught at the association's annual meeting last evening in the national film board theatre.

The award was termed a small recognition for Mr. Praught's service to diabetics and members of the Charlottetown branch. The Prince Edward Island branch is the first to initiate this award as no other Canadian province has it.

The annual meeting included the yearly minutes as read by the secretary, Florence A'Hearn. R. E. Seller chaired the meeting and read the president's annual report.

Mr. Seller's report commented on the fact that 12 new cases of diabetes were discovered per month in Prince Edward Island last year. He also spoke on the work of Mr. Praught and commended him for his help to the association.

The Rotary Club of Charlottetown was thanked by the executive for underwriting the costs of the Diabetic Children's Camp operated by the association at Tea Hill last year. Mr. Seller also thanked Billy MacMillan for his work as camp director.

The report also included the work of the Hospital Committee who sent a rose to every diabetic admitted into hospital last year. Mr. Seller closed his report by outlining the results of five meetings held by the executive during the past year.

Island Native Killed In Ont.

A native of Mount Stewart, Wayne Jay, 22, was stabbed to death yesterday in a downtown Toronto apartment building. One man was charged with capital murder yesterday following a fight that began in the apartment.

Jay, a son of Basil and Doris (Russell) Jay, collapsed and died on Dundas Street after staggering from the building. He had been stabbed several times.

Police said they were told that an argument over a woman had started at a party in an apartment and that Jay and the other man went outside to settle it.

They charged Daryl Clark, 18, who arrived in Toronto recently from Saint John and had been living in the apartment with Mr. and Mrs. Norman Peterson. Clark was arrested on Sherbourne Street in the vicinity of the stabbing scene.

The dead man was married to the former Joan Daley. In 1952, he and his family moved to Newcastle, N.B., where he attended Harkins High School.

Also surviving are his parents, a brother in Newcastle and three sisters in this area.

Two Not Guilty Pleas Entered For Impaired

Irvin Brinsley Smith, East Royalty, and Nelson Warren Buell, Abney, pleaded not guilty to impaired driving charges yesterday in Queens County Magistrate's Court before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC.

Smith was remanded to April 23 and Buell to May 3, with bail to stand.

The case of George Warren Myers, Lake Verde, who pleaded not guilty to having no brakes on his vehicle, was adjourned to April 30.

Four persons were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for illegal possession of liquor.

Two Common Assault Cases Are Dismissed At Souris

SOURIS — George Roche of Dundee, charged with common assault, had his case dismissed by Magistrate James B. Johnston yesterday in Souris Magistrate's Court. On a similar charge, Gertrude Roche of Dundee, had her case dismissed also.

Joseph MacDonald of Choptow, pleaded not guilty to a charge of assault. The crown called two witnesses, Hilary Patrick Cheverie, Souris and Roger Stirling Burke of Fortune. Kenneth MacDonald of Little Harbor and the accused testified for the defense. Magistrate Johnston found the accused guilty and fined him \$20 and costs.

James Arnold MacLellan, Souris, charged with forgery, had his case adjourned to Georgetown on April 21.

Stewart Ross Coffin, Kingsboro, charged with impaired driving, had his case adjourned to Souris on April 23 with no plea being taken.

A plea of not guilty was entered by Grover Lawrence Smith, Amundale, on a charge of possession of a still. The accused had his case adjourned to Georgetown on April 21.

Earl Joseph MacKinnon, Forest Hill, pleaded not guilty to a charge of having care and control of a motor vehicle while his faculties were impaired. Magistrate Johnston adjourned the case to Souris on April 28. M. J. McQuaid was counsel for the accused.

Five people were fined \$20 and costs for illegal possession and one man was fined \$20 and costs for being intoxicated in a public place.

Two Prisoners Are Off To N.B.

RCMP officers have taken two prisoners, held by local police on charges of vagrancy, into custody to return them to Edmundston, N.B.

William Earl MacFarlane, Charlottetown, and Michael Robert Walker, Toronto, were apprehended in a motor vehicle which had no registration. Investigation later revealed that the car had been stolen in Edmundston.

MacFarlane, out of prison pending his appeal of a sentence of two years and six months in Dorchester Penitentiary after entering a plea of guilty to a charge of break, entry and theft at Buster's Service Station, was believed to have been en route to Ontario.
