SPECIAL TRAIN SERVICES

CHRISTMAS HOLIDAYS Prince Edward Island

Commencing Monday, December 18th and continuing throughout the Christmas holidays to and including Tuesday January 2nd, two trains a day will be operated, daily except Sunday, between the mainland and Prince Edward Island.

The present regular train service to Prince Edward Island is by train No. 40, leaving Moncton at 11.10 a.m. and arriving Charlottetown at 6.10 p.m. (Summerside 5.50 p.m.)

The regular train service from Prince Edward Island is by Train No. 39, leaving Charlottetown at 7.00 a.m. (Summerside 7.15 a.m.) arriving Moncton 1.25 p.m., where connection is made with trains for Montreal, Toronto and points west and with eastbound trains for Halifax and Sydney.

A through sleeper is operated on Trains Nos. 39 and 40 between Montreal and Charlottetown.

The extra train service to Prince Edward Island will be provided by Train No. 42, which will leave Sackville at 6.00 p.m., arriving Charlottetown 10.30 p.m. (Summerside 10.15 p.m.) This train will connect with the Ocean Limited and Scotian eastbound from Montreal at Sackville.

From Prince Edward Island the extra train service will be by Train No. 41 leaving Charlottetown at 2.10 p.m. (Summerside at 1.45 p.m.) arriving Sackville 7.00 p.m. where connection will be made with the Maritime Express for Montreal, Toronto and points west, also with the overnight trains between Saint John, Halifax and Sydney.
