Hilkiah, the high priest who discovered the Book of the Law during Josiah's temple renovation, apparently had a son named Jeremiah. When this young man was about 25, the Lord called him to be a prophet.—Jeremiah 1:1-5.

Early in his career Jeremiah delivered a famous message to a Jerusalem temple. He told the people not to believe themselves safe from God's wrath simply because his temple was there, and to heed their ways.—Jeremiah 7:1-7.

For some 38 years Jeremiah pleaded with his people to return. God directed him once to illustrate his impending wrathful destruction of Jerusalem itself by breaking an earthen flask so it couldn't be mended.—Jeremiah 19:1-13.

Just before the promised destruction of the city, Jeremiah prophesied for his people a 70-year period of captivity in the land of the Babylonians who conquered them.—Jeremiah 25:1-1.

N. Ireland Student Minister To Preach In Kings Co. Area

MONTAGUE — Derek Drysdale, BA, the new Presbyterian student minister arrived in Montague last Friday. A resident of Belfast, Northern Ireland, where he has come to Canada in order to devote his summer vacation to the more practical training of the ministry for which he is training.

Twenty-two years of age, Mr. Drysdale was educated in Belfast and Londonderry, proceeding to Dublin University where in 1960 he graduated at Trinity College with a BA in classics and philosophy. In October 1961 he entered New College, the divinity faculty of Edinburgh University, to begin his theological studies and so has just finished his second year of theology and intends to return to Scotland in October in order to complete his BD degree in June 1963.

He then intends, if possible, to spend one year on the continent engaged in post-graduate studies in some field of theology, after which he must return to Ireland to fulfil his two years ordained assistantship. He will then be ready for a call to a church of his own.

This is Mr. Drysdale's first visit to Canada and he arrived on the island via New York, Longue Valley which are at present without an ordained minister. Mr. Drysdale who has a student in the same kind of work in Saint John, N.B., was appointed to the churches by the board of home missions by the Presbyterian Church in Canada to whom he applied last January offering his services on the suggestion of a Canadian student whom he met in Edinburgh. Although at the moment he is living at the Hill Side Inn in Montague he hopes to move into the manse within the next few days.

Mr. Drysdale is eagerly looking forward to his stay on the island and will be here until late September. Throughout his ministry here, Mr. Drysdale will be working under the control of the moderator, Rev. M. Carl Currie, BA.

Sewer Outlet Overflow Is Planned

Plans are being readied for the proposed construction of a sewer overflow outlet in the harbor near the Cundall Home, city engineer Norman Stewart said yesterday.

The overflow outlet will relieve tide pressure on the sewer line. Tide pressure causes considerable flood trouble in the line in the area of Churchill Ave., Mr. Stewart said.

The line is a combination storm and sanitary sewer, with its outfall in the harbor. Some houses in the Churchill Avenue area are at the same elevation as the sea wall at Victoria Park which means that sea water will, during high tides, back up into the line to that area.

This creates a pressure that during periods of heavy runoff will not allow a fast flow of sewage, causing water and waste materials to come up through manholes and into basements. Heavy flooding was experienced this spring. Sewer gas is also forced out manholes.

Mr. Stewart said the new overflow outlet will greatly reduce the tide pressures and should stop the flooding problem. It will function only in periods of combined high tide and heavy surface runoff.

Teddy Wright Is Underdog

NEW YORK (AP)—Although he upset Denny Meyer a month ago, aggressive Teddy Wright of Detroit was rated a 2-1 underdog for the return middleweight bout at Madison Square Garden tonight.

Within a two-week span, the 25-year-old Wright knocked off the two Meyers of Portland, Ore. First he outpointed Phil Meyer, which was not a great shock. But on June 9, he got off to a big lead against Denny, then the third-ranked 160-pound contender, and barely held on for a split decision.

As a result of the 22-year-old Denny was demoted to No. 6 and Wright was promoted into the top 10 with a No. 8 rating. Denny, a sturdy youngster with plenty of stamina, claimed he wasn't in top shape for his first fight with Wright. He took the bout on four days' notice when the garden needed a substitute. Wright, of course, had only short notice himself but he had the fight with Phil Meyer two weeks before and was in good condition.

Meyer has a 21-7 record in Wright's record is 40-7, including 18 knouts.

Scoring of the 10-round bout will be by the rounds system.

U Than Begins European Tour

NEW YORK (AP)—U. Thant, acting secretary-general of the United Nations, left by plane Wednesday for a two-week European tour which will include talks with British Prime Minister Macmillan and President de Gaulle of France.

He will make official visits in Ireland, Norway, Switzerland, England, France and Finland.

It was unanimously agreed that if the tenders did not exceed the figure set by the building committee, the project would commence within a short time. In the event that tenders exceed the estimate, another meeting of shareholders will be called to consider the matter.

Charlottetown now has one curling rink, known as The Charlottetown Curling Club on Easton Street. It had its official opening early in 1961. Five leagues are available to members of this club.

Thursday night's meeting, held at the Charlottetown Golf Club was presided over by the president Dr. J.K.L. Irwin.

Bilingual Plea Made In Toronto

TORONTO (CP)—The most practical formula for the defence of Canadian culture and traditions is development of a fully bilingual Canada, Thomas G. McCormack, president of Dominion Stores Ltd., said here at the company's annual meeting.

"There are encouraging signs of such a development," Mr. McCormack added. "The teaching of French in the primary grades of some Ontario schools has begun. More and more Canadian companies, such as Dominion, are publishing annual reports and other documents in both official languages."
