The pollution survey of Charlottetown, P.E.I., is scheduled for Oct. 15, according to a department of health official.

Representatives of the department, the City of Charlottetown, and surrounding communities met last summer to discuss the problem of harbor pollution.

A report of the meeting, the Ottawa firm of J. L. Richards and Associates was prepared by the city.

The survey company would prepare preliminary plans for a sewage collection and disposal system and make up a topographical map of the harbor and watershed areas.

The general purpose of the survey is to determine, from a health and economic point of view, whether or not raw sewage should continue to be discharged into the harbor and to provide for collecting rivers. Under study is the role of the existing storm sewer and sanitary sewer systems in providing for expanded service, and the problem of industrial wastes, with recommendations for their disposal.

The firm will study the movement of water in the harbor area, and explore methods for the discharge of sanitary wastes so as to alleviate or minimize the pollution problems now being experienced.

Reference is made in the report of the survey, "in the event that it is considered not advisable to continue the discharge of untreated sanitary wastes, recommendations for collection and treatment program, extending over a 50-year period, should be made."

The survey company would prepare preliminary plans for a sewage collection and disposal system and make up a topographical map of the harbor and watershed areas.

The general purpose of the survey is to determine, from a health and economic point of view, whether or not raw sewage should continue to be discharged into the harbor and to provide for collecting rivers. # Great Slave Lake Railway Begins To Show Usefulness

low the Hay River to its north-eastern terminus, Hay River, the railway, now completed scheduled for 1964.

Primary purpose of the completed 435-mile railway will be to carry lead-zinc concentrate from a mine at Pine Point 250 miles from Hay River to the north shore of Great Slave Lake. A spur line will connect the mine with the main line.

Construction of the line began Feb. 12, 1962, when Northern Alberta Industries, Walter Dillinger, ploughed through a thick growth of young poplars at Roma, just west of here, with a 36-ton bulldozer.

In preparation for the 1963 construction program, hundreds of tons of rail spools, ties, fastenings and other items are being stockpiled at the end of the line.

Contracts were let last fall for the construction of some four miles right-of-way to Hay River. The uncompleted section will be about 100 miles long. The line will be used for the construction of a new road for CNR construction engineers. It parallels the pioneer railway route through the rugged river valleys and plateaus.
