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Summerside Elects Council Despite Raging Snowstorm

Edgar M. Cannon, a new-comer to municipal politics, was elected as Councillor for the West Ward, while James L. MacDougall and Wm. E. Jenkins were re-elected as Councillors for the Centre and East Wards in yesterday's civic election at Summerside.

Mayor Wm. A. Currie was elected by acclamation, and succeeds Henry W. Wedge who retired from office after serving as Mayor of Summerside for the past six years.

In the only up-set in the election Mr. Cannon, in the West Ward, polled an even 300 votes for a majority of 92 over Clarence Steele, a member of the Summerside Town Council for the past six years, who had 208 votes.

The interest in the election in this ward, despite the weather, is indicated by the voting statistics which reveal that valid votes cast in this ward increased by 65 over those of the previous year. Councillor-elect Cannon is a master mechanic with Curran and Briggs Limited.

MAJORITY OF SIX

In the Centre Ward, James L. MacDougall who has served on the Council for the past two and one-half years, being elected twice by

acclamation, won his first contested election yesterday when he polled 131 votes for a majority of 6 over that of Reagh Finney, another nominee in the Centre Ward, who received 125 votes.

Councilor MacDougall, associated with the produce firm of Simmons and MacFarlane Ltd., was chairman of the police, fire and abattoir committees in the past Council.

In the East Ward, Wm. E. Jenkins a member of the Council for the past four years, was re-elected with 238 votes for a majority of 84 over Lorne Monkley who polled 174 votes.

Councillor Jenkins, chairman of the finance committee in the previous council, operates Jenkins Bros. cannery and cold storage plants in Summerside. Valid votes cast in this ward showed a decrease of 44 less than the number cast in last year's civic election.

Mayor Wm. A. Currie, making his first entry into civic government, has had a lifetime of business experience, and at the present time he is credit manager for R. T. Holman Ltd.

He has been an active leader in the P. E. I. Branch of the Red Cross Society, and until recently, chairman of the local Blood Don-

Association.

Mayor Currie will take the oath of office today, and the first meeting of the new Council will be the regular monthly meeting on Monday, February 13th.

Following a spirited campaign that aroused great interest among the electors voting was conducted in the three wards as a severe blizzard increased in intensity throughout the day and strong winds piled a snowfall of several inches into snow drifts that slowed and finally halted practically all motor traffic in town.

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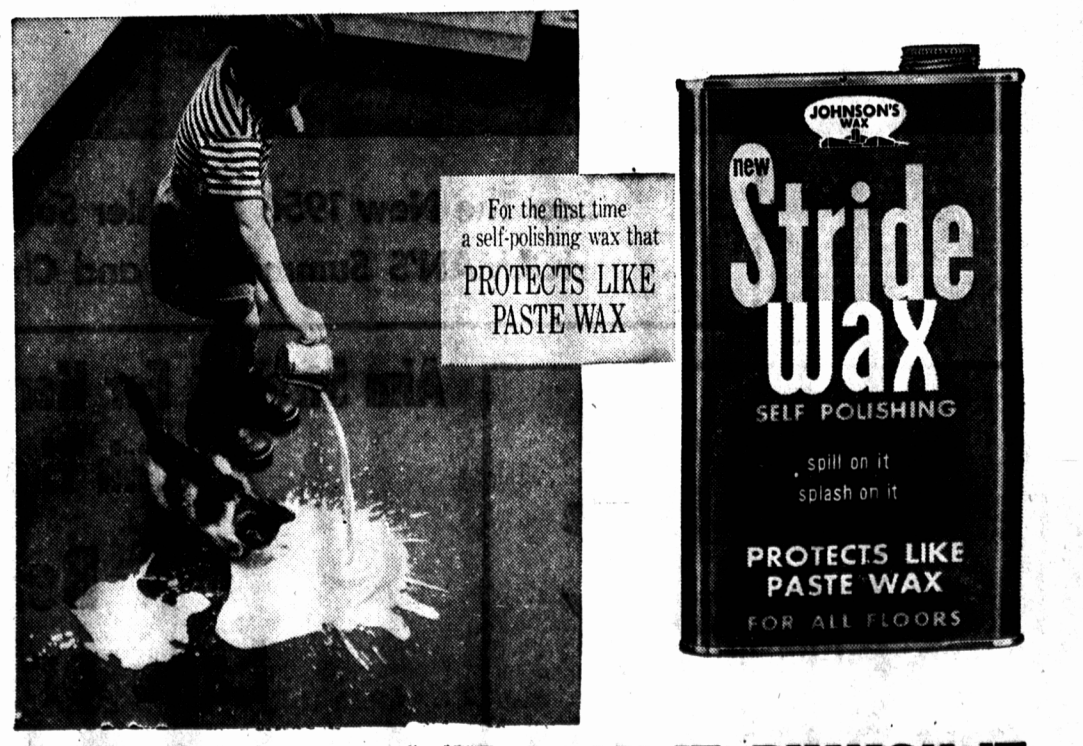
