### THAT PREFERENTIAL CLAUSE

Another Interesting Discussion in the Commons.

Mr. Foster Wants More Light—Amendment Voted Down.

OTTAWA, June 1.—The discussion on the preferential clause in committee was continued yesterday by several Opposition members.

After recess, Mr. Foster again protested against the course of the Government in refusing an explanation of the meaning of the preferential clause.

Hon. Mr. Paterson said he had no explanation to make further than those he had given.

Mr. Foster appealed next to Mr. Laurier who said the same.

Mr. Foster then said that for the purpose of bringing the ministry to something more definite he would propose an amendment. He therefore moved that the clause, which defines the terms on which countries may be admitted to a lower scale of duties, be amended by adding the limit clause taking into consideration the average tariff on the principal goods interchanged between the countries.

Hon. Mr. Laurier objected to this limitation. He was understood to say that under clause sixteen as it stood the comparison would be on the average of the whole imports of each country.

Mr. Russell also objected to the amendment.

Mr. Foster found it rather interesting to notice that Mr. Russell was quite satisfied with the indefiniteness of the government's proposals but complained of the ambiguity of the amendment which if it did not clear up all doubt it at least reduced the uncertainty. He asked Mr. Russell to explain what meaning he attached to the original clause and whether he agreed with the latest explanation of the Prime Minister.

Mr. Russell declined the first request and said he had not been able to hear what Mr. Laurier said.

The amendment was lost.

When the main motion was called Mr. Foster referred once more to the extraordinary power allowed the Government under this clause. He proposed in amendment that after the words authorizing a reduction of duties to any favored country, the following clause be inserted: After Parliament has given its sanction thereto. Hon. Messrs. Fielding and Tupper followed, when house adjourned.

### To Prolong the Armistice.

### POEM BY THE POPE.

The Pope has just completed a latin poem of eighty stanzas, pointing out the beauties of frugality and the evils of gluttony. The poem is filled with charm and quiet humor. His Holiness says: Pay attention before all to cleanliness, that the table appointments being spotless, the glass being clean, and that from the cellar comes the purest wine of the Albanian Hills, which exhilarates the spirit and keeps away troubles; don't trust Bacchus; so don't be frugal in diluting wine with water.

He continues: "Obtain from healthy grain well-cooked bread, eat sparingly of chicken, lamb and beef, which are meat nourishing to the body. Meat should be tender and without abundant sauces or root vegetables, which spoil it."

"Fresh eggs are excellent, whether raw or slightly cooked. Drink an abundant quantity of foaming milk, it nourishes infants and assists old age. Also honey, that celestial gift. But of this use frugally."

"Add to these sweets, fresh vegetables and garden supplies, and ripe fruit according to season, especially tender apples, which, with their pink tints, brighten the banquet."

"Lastly, comes drink, which in hard seeds moods, sends you a softly sipping, black liquor that comforts the heart."

The Pope adds, that by following these precepts, a man may live to a healthy strong and good old age.
