Dr. Florence Murray, missionary on furlough from Korea, was greeted by a very large congregation when she addressed the Thankoffering service of the W.M.S. Auxiliary in the United Church Sunday evening. For the second time within ten years Dr. Murray has been a war evacuee from the country where she has given outstanding service as a medical missionary. This time she had but twenty minutes to pack some belongings and bid farewell to her hospital staff. Many of her personal possessions had to be left behind and there is little chance that they will be recovered. In her address Dr. Murray defined the political situation in Korea as it was before the war, and described the terrible suffering of the refugees from the north. Many had no shelter and one morning last winter one hundred bodies of people who had frozen to death during the night were found in the streets of Seoul. As she told of the great poverty of the Korean people, many of whom have not sufficient food, clothing or shelter, a feeling of pity that we have so much when others have nothing seemed to pervade the congregation. Dr. Murray deplored the fact that Canada should be ready to send so much money and so many men to Korea to fight a war — to bring death to Koreans — when she sends so few missionaries to lead them in the Christian way of life and thus help prevent war. She stressed the need for more missionaries and increased gifts to assist work, also the great need there will be for relief in Korea as soon as the war ends and goods can be sent. It was a powerful address, deeply moving in its appeal, and one that will be long remembered by those who heard it. The service was conducted by the Auxiliary president, Mrs. A. C. Green, assisted by Mrs. Fred Leard. Guest soloist for the evening was Mr. Albert Huestis of Summerside. The benediction was pronounced by the minister, Rev. P. A. Fitzpatrick.
