BRITAIN REPLIES TO GERMAN CHARGE

Act Of Aggression Alone Could Bring British Hostility

By J. F. SANDERSON Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, June 28—Great Britain tonight replied to Chancellor Hitler's charge that Britain "must always be hostile to Germany" by declaring that only an act of aggression by the Reich could bring about British hostility.

Clipper Starts Regular Service For Passengers

PORT WASHINGTON, N. Y., June 28—(AP)—The first regular passenger service ever to be flown by airplane across the Atlantic stepped rather casually aboard the big Dixie Clipper today and a minute later were off for Europe—scheduled to arrive at Horta, the Azores, by breakfast time tomorrow.

While 5,000 spectators waved, and harbor craft saluted with whistles, the \$700,000 flying boat of Pan American Airways taxied smoothly over Manhattan Bay—then upward and out, opening a new era in aviation.
