

Charlottetown Man Assessed \$75 Fine

SUMMERSIDE — A Charlottetown man, Herbert Pletch, pleaded guilty to a charge of impaired driving before Magistrate W. Chester MacDonald yesterday in Prince's County court and was fined \$75 and costs.

Crown evidence was heard in the case of a Kensington resident, Wendell Ernest Mann, on charges of impaired driving and obstruction of a police officer.

The accused who entered a plea of not guilty, was represented by Neil R. MacLeod. Acting for the Crown was George R. McMahon.

Giving testimony for the Crown were RCMP Constable David Holmes of Summerside and Kensington Constable Vernon Reeves. Following the completion of this testimony the case was adjourned to July 5th when evidence for the defence will be heard.

Also heard was the testimony for the Crown in the case of Eric MacLeod Johnston of Summerside who had earlier entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention.

RCMP Constable William Edward Whalen, now of Charlottetown, told the court that he had followed the accused in a police cruiser through North Bedeque at speeds of up to 80 miles per hour and during this time had failed to gain on the accused.

The speed limit through this area at night, when the incident occurred, was 55 miles per hour, he said. This case was also adjourned to July 5th.

David George Simpson of Summerside was sentenced to 30 days in Prince County Jail on a charge of break and enter and theft, to which he had entered a guilty plea at a previous hearing.

In addition he was ordered to enter into a recognizance in the amount of \$1,000 to be in effect for two years under the usual conditions. He is also to be under the custody of Vincent MacIntyre, the provincial probation officer, for that period of time and report to him at least once a month.

Health Centre Administrator Notes Deficit

SUMMERSIDE — The Memorial Health Centre held its annual meeting in Tyne Valley Hall Wednesday night. Stanley Maynard acted as chairman. James Milligan, hospital administrator noted in his report a total deficit of \$4335.26 with a sharable surplus of \$382.80 for the year ending December 1965.

Mr. Milligan pointed out that the reason for the sharable surplus arises from the fact that the hospital closed in November and remained closed till the end of the financial year in December.

"Your hospital was closed for a period of three months, until Dr. A.H. Goldberg arrived from England and set up practice in Tyne Valley," he stated.

Mr. Milligan went on to say that "doctors are very hard to get, especially for a country practice and that the community and hospital should be very thankful to have a doctor of Dr. Goldberg's qualifications."

After listing various equipment bought by the hospital during the past year he concluded by thanking the women's institute, hospital ladies aid, and others making private donations to the hospital, and also the staff of the hospital for their fine co-operation during the past year.

Dr. A.H. Goldberg opened his remarks by expressing his thanks to the community for the warm welcome he and his wife received when they arrived in February.

He told the meeting that the hospital, with its up to date equipment and competent nursing staff was a credit to the community. Dr. Goldberg noted that 109 patients had entered the hospital since it re-opened in February.

The doctor went on to say that Dr. Leser from England would be relieving him when he went on vacation during July. "Contrary to rumors that have been circulating, I will be returning after a period of three weeks," he stated.

Dr. Goldberg concluded his address by thanking the hospital staff and ladies aid for the help they were to him since he arrived.

his name, rather than in the space following it, as the new election act requires.

The margin was shaved to one vote in the very tight poll, Launching. One of the ballots in the "rejected" envelope had two X's following Mr. MacDonald's name and this was allowed.

Liberal hopes really soared for a few minutes when Dr. Sinnott lost a vote in the Sturgeon poll when one of the ballots that had been credited to the PC candidate election night, had an "X" after the name of each candidate. But the temporary joy petered out when it was found that the actual count of 83 votes for Mr. MacDonald was one short of the 84 credited to him on election night. The ballots were doublechecked, but the final result that the Liberal did not gain a vote, even though none had been taken away from him because of any illegality.

BALLOT MISSING? Several Liberal spokesmen suggested there was a ballot missing from that poll. The totals did not check with the statement of poll from the deputy returning officer. A PC spokesman came back with the suggestion "the statement of poll was wrong."

There wasn't even a sign of any further change as ballots were counted from Gaspereaux, Murray Harbor North and Cambridge polls, and from the advanced poll for that district.

Alex Matheson, QC, Gilbert Gaudet, QC, both of Charlottetown, and George Ferguson, M.L.A. Murray River were agents for Mr. MacDonald. Gerald Foster, QC and Charles McQuaid, QC, both of Charlottetown, were agents for Dr. Sinnott.

An unusual feature of the proceedings was that Dr. Sinnott photographed several of the markings in ballots which figured in sharp disputes during the day. The doctor did so after asking, and obtaining permission from Judge DesRoches.

For the second day in a row, recount results exploded the traditional theory that a recount never favors the government candidate. 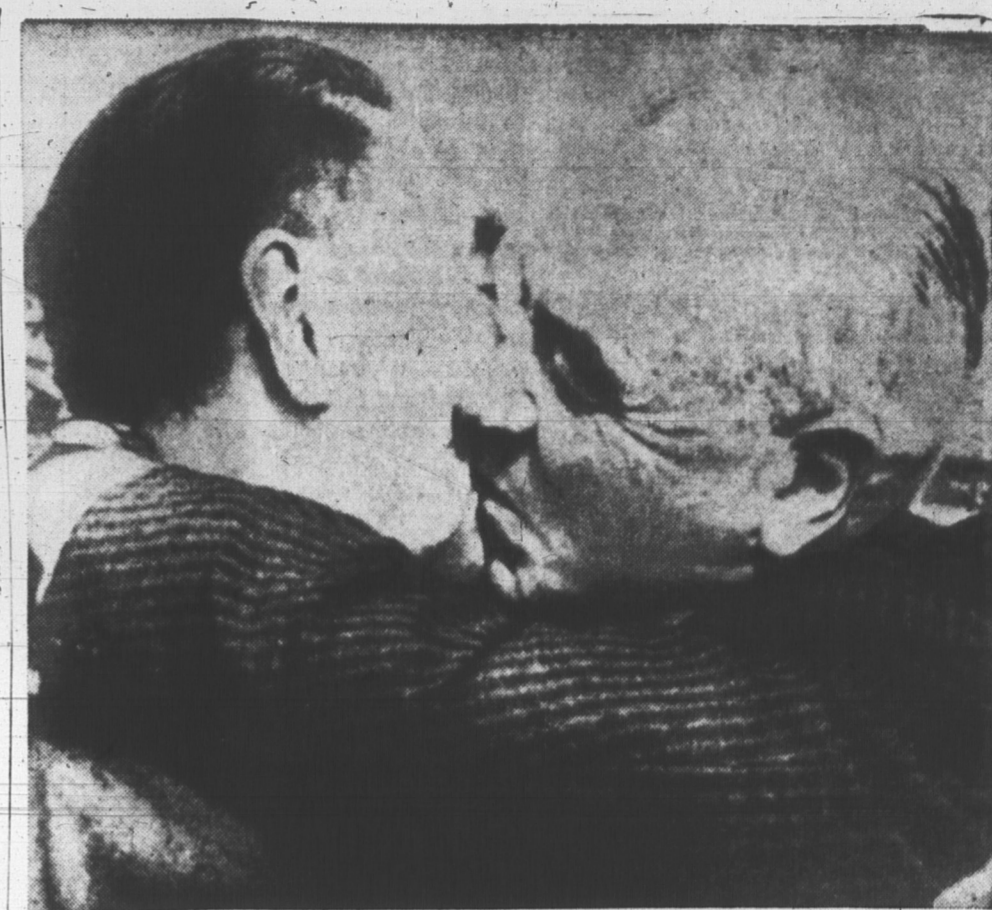

Fourth Purple Heart Won By U.S. Marine

CHU LAI (AP) - A U.S. marine sergeant who was wounded three times in the Korean war got his fourth purple heart Thursday - on a rocky hilltop in Viet Nam.

"It was the longest night of my life," said Sgt. Jimmie Howard, 36, of San Diego, Calif. Howard suffered a back wound while leading 17 other marines in a last-man stand. They fought an attacking force

of 250 Viet Cong in the early morning darkness.

Howard's small band held out for five hours until marine reinforcements arrived in helicopters and drove off the attackers.

From a hospital bed in Chu Lai, where he was in satisfactory condition, Howard told how his small force nearly ran out of ammunition and resorted to knives, bayonets and rocks to beat back the enemy.

"We wanted them to think we still had grenades," Howard said. "When the reinforcements got to us, we had just eight rounds of ammunition left."

Lemuel Craswell Dies In Hospital

Lemuel Craswell, a well known Hunter River businessman, died Wednesday, June 14, in the Prince Edward Island Hospital after a lengthy illness. Mr. Craswell was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ethan Craswell, Rustico. He was 67 years of age.

Mr. Craswell was a farm machinery dealer and livestock dealer known throughout the Island. He was born in 1899 in Rustico but later moved to Hunter River where he established his business.
