Ontario Counties Are Certified Brucellosis Free

OTTAWA—Six Ontario counties have just qualified as brucellosis certified areas, bringing to 65 the number of areas in Canada that have been certified since a national eradication program was launched in 1957, Dr. K.F. Wells, veterinary director general, announced Thursday.

For an area to qualify of certification, not more than one per cent of all cattle and not more than five per cent of all herds can be infected with the disease. Officials of the health of animals division, Canada department of agriculture, say just over 1,000,000 cattle are involved in all certified areas.

The six counties, Leeds, Brant, Wentworth, Glengarry, Carleton and Peel, have been certified for a three-year period.

The 65 areas by province: P. E.I. 3; N. S. 7; N.B. 19; Quebec 3; Ont., 12; Man., 6; Sask., 19; B. C. 4; Yukon 1.
