His Honour Lieutenant Governor J.J. Bowlen has recently returned from his trip to Europe. The following is a resume of the trip: The Canadian Pacific Airlines held their inaugural flight of the Britannia to Europe from Edmonton via Polar Route on October 12, 1959, and His Honour was aboard.

The crossing was a record one and they landed in Amsterdam. After spending two days in Amsterdam and Holland, Dr. Bowlen then journeyed to Brussels where he spent a few days seeing the World's Fair. He was told that he was the only Lieutenant-Governor of Canada to have done so.

His Honour then travelled to London where he spent a very busy week which culminated with a private audience with Her Majesty. This is the second time that His Honour has been such honoured.

Her Majesty stated that Princess Margaret enjoyed her tour of Canada very much and that she and the Duke of Edinburgh were looking forward to their visit in 1959. His Honour left London on the same day as the private audience and arrived in Canada the following day, after spending approximately two weeks in Britain and Europe.

On returning His Honour accepted the invitation of the Government of British Columbia to share in the celebration of their Centennial by attending the Governor-General and Lieutenant-Governor's Week. His Honour's daughter, Mrs. May Mooney, accompanied her father on the British Columbia trip.

Somewhat Light Headed Ideas On Safety, The Stage

This Safe-Driving Week (rendered somewhat light-headed by the "Common Cold") I have an idea that isn't as fantastic as ideas now in practice costing billions in the field of science. The idea: Suppose during next Safe-Driving Week, business firms all over Canada devote the money they use in a single week to promote their commercial products, and the ingenuity of their top advertising personnel to propagandize safe-driving.
