

Chesapeake Bay Project Watched, Commons Told

OTTAWA (CP) — The works department is watching with "keen interest" the construction of a combination causeway-bridge-tunnel across Chesapeake Bay in Maryland, the Commons was informed Wednesday.

Works Minister Deschatelets said in a written reply to J. Angus MacLean (PC—Queens) that engineers from his department will visit the Maryland project site in the near future.

Mr. MacLean had asked if the 17.6-mile Chesapeake crossing was being studied with a view of applying the engineering methods to the proposed Prince Edward Island causeway.

Mr. Deschatelets made no reference to the P.E.I. project in his reply.

Pearson Denies Russian Offer Of Icebreaker

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson said Wednesday in the Commons he is not aware of a Russian offer to send an atomic-powered icebreaker to keep the St. Lawrence River open so that wheat shipments to Russia could be kept on schedule.

In any case, he told Louis-Joseph Pigeon (PC—King), Canada has adequate icebreakers for the St. Lawrence.

Mr. Pigeon had asked whether the government was ready to accept the Russian offer.

Later Edouard Woolliams (PC—Bonaventure) asked whether the available Canadian facilities were sufficient to keep Canadian waters open in winter for grain shipments.

Mr. Pearson replied that Mr. Woolliams knows Canada has icebreakers for that purpose.

George Nowlan (PC—Digby-Annapolis—King) asked Mr. Pearson if this meant icebreakers would be used to interfere with the international water port from Atlantic ports.

Mr. Pearson said he hoped nothing he said would add to Mr. Nowlan's pre-occupation with that subject.

New Express, Freight Shed Considered

OTTAWA — A new express and freight shed for the Canadian National Railways at Charlottetown is being considered, it was revealed in the Commons Wednesday.

Transport Minister George McArthur, in replying to a question put on the order paper by Heath McQuarrie, MP for Queens, said that the CNR management had advised that consideration is being given to the erection of a new express-freight shed.

However, Mr. McArthur said the railway has not yet determined what the starting date for the construction of the building will be.

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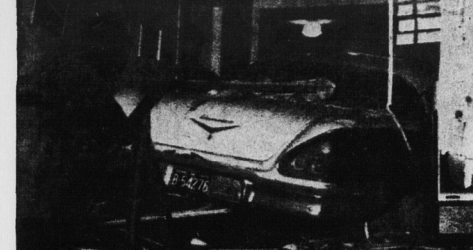
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A month ago the 2,200 bishops convening here expressed reservations about modernizing the Mass and did not give it the necessary two-thirds majority.

But the reservations were put into amendments in a compromise proposal under which the central part of a Mass will remain in Latin as recited by the priest.

No decision has been made on when changes will come into operation, altering the ancient rites which have prevailed for centuries.

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The chapter also includes a provision allowing congregations to receive Holy Communion with wine as well as bread on special occasions such as the ordination of a priest.

Meanwhile, the controversial draft decree's fourth and fifth chapters seeking improved relations with the Jews drew support from Albert Cardinal Charbon.

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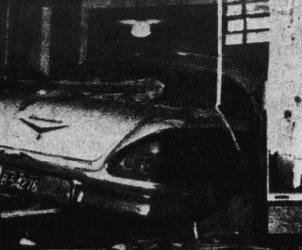
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Cardinal Meyer and several other bishops thought the chapters were particularly concerned with the over-all subject of ecumenism.

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
