Local and Other Items.

AT HALIFAX.—The brigantine *Stella*, lying at Hart's wharf, is on her first trip. She was built in Charlottetown and is owned there. She is a smart craft. She has just returned from Porto Rico, and is discharging molasses. Captain Neilson is in command. He was master of the steamer *Albert*, which foundered at sea several years ago. The crew have a number of pets on board including parrots, magpies, doves, monkeys, etc.—Halifax Herald.

NOVA SCOTIANS SUCCESS.—The *Fredericton Herald* prints an interview with Harry Waugh, a returned Kookier, who formed one of the four, two being Nova Scotians, who left for the Pacific in 1896 and made their piles. The Nova Scotians were D.R. McKay, of Stellarton, and Dan McGillivray, of Cape Breton. McGillivray was bought out by the others for \$40,000. McKay and Waugh have five claims, now pronounced very valuable and they have taken out a large amount of gold.

FATALLY BURNED.—The Montreal Star of the 9th says: "Flora, the daughter of Mr. John A. Nicholson, M.A., Principal of the Westmount Academy, died from the effects of injuries received last Tuesday morning while playing with matches. It appears that on awaking on Tuesday morning the little girl, who is two years and eight months old, climbed on top of the bureau and succeeded in lighting some matches which were kept there. Her clothing was in some way ignited and before the fire could be extinguished she received such injuries that they proved fatal yesterday afternoon at four o'clock." The hosts of friends in this Province of Mr. and Mrs. Nicholson will sympathize with them in their great affliction.

Queen Wilhelmina's Oath.

The coronation of the young queen of Holland will take place, according to a recently published decree, on Sept. 6. On that day the young woman, with right hand raised, in the presence of the states general, will pledge herself to the following formula, which is a strange contrast to the oaths administered to the Russian and German emperors:

"I swear to the people of the Netherlands to observe and always maintain the fundamental law. I pledge myself to defend and to preserve with all my power the independence of the kingdom, to protect public and private liberty and the rights of all my subjects and to employ for the preservation and advancement of individual and general prosperity all the means which the laws place at my disposal as the due of an upright queen. And may God aid me in my work."

QUEER FUNERAL MISTAKES.

There have been some queer mistakes made, of all kinds, but this is one of the most unusual and desirable, although no real harm was done. A man, prominent in his professional life of this city, died. He was a member of a certain society in this city which sent representatives to the funeral. The members of the organization were notified of the death of their fellow member by postal cards sent out by the Secretary. One of the cards was addressed to and delivered at the late residence of the dead member, inviting him to attend his own obsequies. A similar incident was if anything, worse. A member of a secret society died and his fellows were notified of his death and the time and place of the funeral as usual. A card was delivered at the address of the dead man directed to him in his own handwriting! He had been the secretary of the organization and had addressed sets of postal cards to the members at his leisure. When a member died a set of the addressed cards were sent to the printer who printed the name of the deceased member on the back with the other matter used in the notice. So when the Secretary died his assistant or successor sent a set of the cards to the printer, so that the dead man was sent one addressed by his own hand.—Portland Express.

ANGLO-AMERICAN SOCIETY

Formed to Promote Better Relations Between the Two Countries.

LONDON, June 10.—The Chronicle prints a preliminary list of the members of the Anglo-American committee, the declared object of which is to promote better relations and a closer union between Great Britain and the United States. The committee does not aim at a treaty or other bond of alliance. It aspires only, in the words of the Right Hon. James Bryce, to "a constant, cordial co-operation." It excludes from its sphere of operations anything directly concerning the present war and does not intend to present any kind of a public demonstration.

The idea of the promoters is to enrol 10,000 representative men and women in Great Britain.

More than a hundred have already signified their attention of joining the committee, including the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Archbishop of York, the Duke of Fife, the Earl of Jersey, Earl Grey, the Bishops of London, Darham, Winchester, Chester, Hereford, Liverpool, Manchester, Worcester, Ripon and Peterborough. Viscount Peel, Lords Brassey, Coleridge, Farrer, Vinniss, Lister, Welby and Charles Bessford, and Commoners Aquith, Bryce, Mowbray, Northcote, H. M. Stanley, Sir Fredrick Pollock, Dr. Broadbent, the Prince of Wales' physician, Lewis Morris, Sir Walter Besant, J. A. MacLaren, Anthony Hope, Conan Doyle, Rudyard Kipling and a number of the leading non-conformist clergymen.
