

## N.B. Fur Breeders Take Top Honors

New Brunswick exhibitors continued to take the major share of championships as the Platinum foxes were shown Thursday with W.R. Church, Gunningville, N.B., showing the champion standard Pearl Platinum adult fox, the champion pup and the grand champion standard Platinum fox of the show.

Archie Neilson — Mr. Neilson ranches Mr. Church's foxes in the Neilson ranch at Salisbury — showed the reserve champion adult Pearl Platinum, but L.K. Lockerby, Hamilton had the reserve champion pup which went on to become grand champion Pearl Platinum fox of the show.

Mr. Lockerby had the top adult male and the top pup male and female in the medium platinum.

In extra light Platins, Mr. Lockerby showed the best adult male and female foxes.

Mr. Church had the top adult female, and male pup in medium, and the best male pup in the light Platins.

Mr. Neilson had had the best light adult female in light Platins.

Mr. Church had the top get of sire and the top progeny of dam entries.

Mr. Lockerby swept all of the top prizes in the straight Platinum sections. They were adult male, adult female and male of female pup.

Placing of the Mink classes got underway in mid-afternoon — E.T. Mill, Kensington, took all of the championship awards in White mink. The awards in Sapphire (light) mink were pretty well distributed with all three of the top awards made Thursday, going to visiting exhibitors.

L.B. Logan, Middle Musquodobit, N.S., topped the section for Light Sapphire mink; Charles Wright, Truro, won the section for medium Sapphires and John MacInnis, Englishtown, N.S., had the top mink in the section for Sapphire, Breath of Spring and Stewart.

federal offices and banks were closed.

In Ottawa, school children had the day off but in Winnipeg, all schools held Remembrance Day ceremonies.

One in the Manitoba capital was particularly apt as six survivors of a Lancaster bomber crew gathered to pay tribute to Andrew Myrarski, a buddy killed trying to save another crew member in a bomber shot down during the Second World War.

The gathering took place at Andrew Myrarski School, named in honor of the young Winnipegger.

It snowed in Winnipeg as 3,000 gathered at the cenotaph in Halifax. It was sunny and cold. Other centres reported overcast skies.

In Montreal, 2,000 veterans and troops paraded to Dominion Square where a crowd of 3,000 watched the ceremony.

Some 3,000 shoppers and workers turned out in Toronto, where the Golden Book of Remembrance was taken from the old city hall to the spectacular new one.

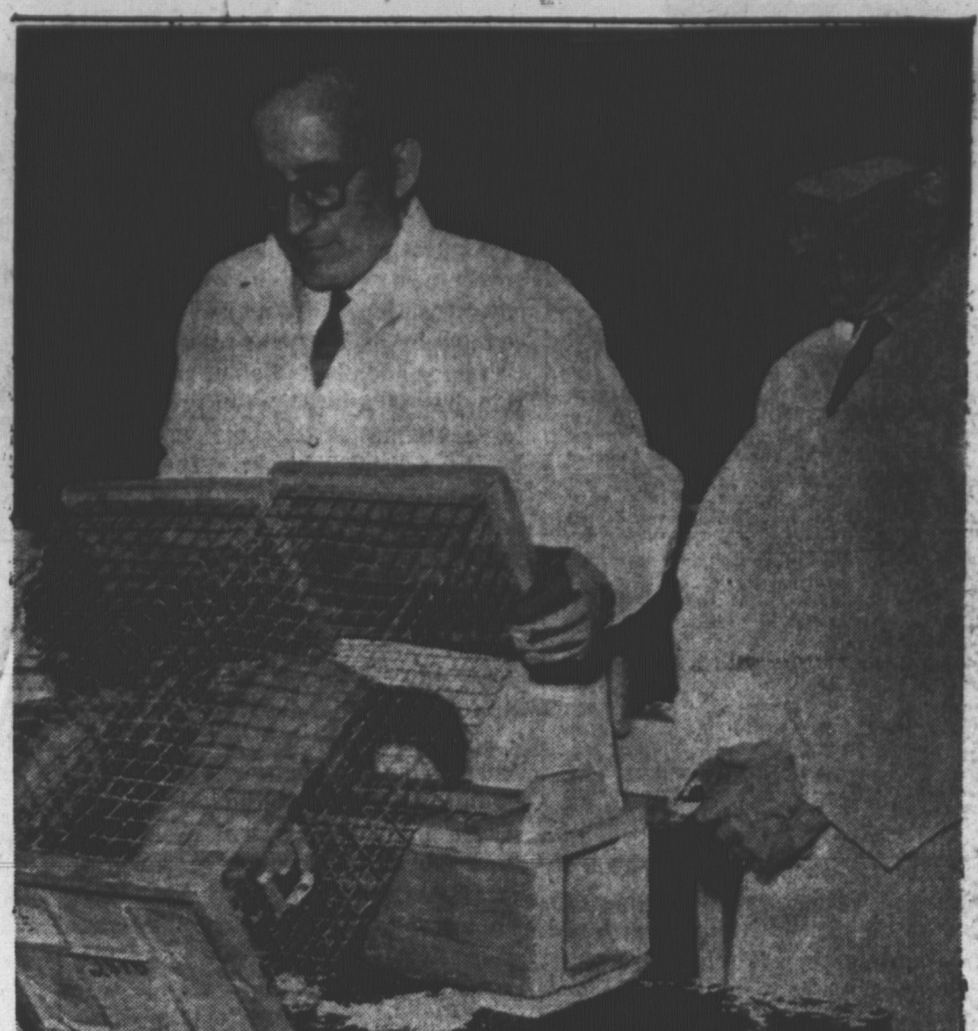

ferred his resignation at the time but this was denied.

In his letter of resignation, Mr. Gordon said:

## Towns And Villages In Prince Honor War Dead In Ceremony

SUMMERSIDE — Many of the Remembrance Day services yesterday saw speeches directed at the youth of the province rather than to the veterans and there appeared to be a greater participation by the children in the solemn ceremonies than in other years.

In his address at the Miscouche ceremonies, Rev. George Savoie, Roman Catholic Chaplain with the RCAF, told the young people that his brief message could be given in three words: "remember, think, prepare".

Referring to the veterans and those war dead, Father Savoie advised the youths to make it a point to get to know the veterans in the community and to find out the names of those who had valiantly given their lives. "You can't remember them unless you know them or know of them," he said.

He also told them to give thought to the consequence of war, especially in this modern day of nuclear armament.

As for preparation he said that, as they reach adulthood "you will have to fight". He added that they might not be fighting with machine guns or other weapons but eventually they would have to fight for justice and honesty in their daily life.

Rev. E. G. Kelly was master of ceremonies for the afternoon service.

Last evening a banquet was held at the Miscouche Legion where Father Savoie was again guest speaker. He devoted much of his address to the work of the Royal Canadian Legion and what service they perform in the community.

Guests who also spoke briefly at the banquet were David MacDonald, the newly-elected MP for Prince County; Hon. Henry Wedge and Squadron Leader J. E. Richard, who were accompanied by their wives.

A number of Legion members spoke briefly including the master of ceremonies, P. C. Martin; Everett Gallant, president of the Legion Branch, David Cameron, Reg Gaudet and Eddie Gaudet.

Mr. Martin was presented with a 35-year service pin while a 25-year pin was presented to Ernest Gaudet.

Here, for the first time, veterans' wives were guests at the evening banquet at the George E. Pearson, V.C. Legion Home.

Guest speaker Merrier J. Mullin talked briefly about the centennial fund and then spoke on patriotism and its importance to civilization today.
