Down The Sport Trail

NEW YORK, April 28—

Noisy Tepee: Steve O'Neill, Big Chief of the rampaging Cleveland Indians, squatted on a bench and puffed serenely on a cigar as we strode into the Indian clubhouse to discover what kind of war paint the rampaging scamp hunters were wearing this spring.

"I'm not predicting that we'll win the American League pennant," began Big Chief between puffs, "but I'll guarantee that we'll be in the thick of the scramble all the way. We're in first place now and hope to lead the heap from now on. Never in my baseball life have I had the privilege of being with a club that is so enthusiastic, so confident and so easy to get along with.

"My pitchers didn't get enough work on their way back home from camp but they're rounding into form slow but sure. Oral Hildebrand, I think, will have his best year. He's put on 12 pounds and looks great. Johnny Allen is better than I expected. A sweet pitcher. Frank Pytlak is back in form and in a jolly mood. Bruce Campbell also is better than I thought. He's hitting in the spring for a change and fielding brilliantly. Roy Hughes probably is the most improved player on the club. He's confident and a great student of the game, too."

Let by Jimmie Foxx who made his fifth home run of the season, the Sox collected 16 hits to out-score the Chisox who made 13 safe blows.

Heinie Manush hit a triple and three singles while Foxx added a double and a single to his homer. The work of two rookies, Harry Kelley's pitching and Russell Peters' hitting, helped give the Athletics a 4-2 victory over St. Louis Browns at Philadelphia.

Peters hit a homer in the fifth to tie the score, and then tripled with two in the sixth to win the game. Kelley, meantime, yielded only six hits, one a homer by Ike Solters in the eighth.

Newsmen scored all the way from first on Hayes' hard single to right in the fifth for the A's other tally. Paced by homers by Goslin and Greenberg, the champion Detroit Tigers jumped on three Washington pitchers today and ran away with an 8-1 ball game.

Greenberg, Detroit's hard-hitting first baseman, banged out three hits of the visitors' 12 in four times up. His homer—the first of the season for him—came in the Tigers' big sixth inning. He scored Gehring ahead of him.

Lefty Joe Sullivan, making his first start of the season, held the Senators well in check, although they got eight hits off of him. Ed Link started for Washington but for the fourth time this year failed to go the route.

WOMEN OF EUROPE Taking up Chess

(By The Canadian Press)
LONDON, April 28—The British Chess Magazine says: "It was not to be expected that, with the unquestionable spread of chess among men, women chess players would be content that their game should remain a mere appanage to masculine chess. But of course they had a long leeway to make up, both in standard of play and in organization; the latter defect being the more easily tackled, as indeed is now being shown.

WOMEN OF EUROPE Taking up Chess

"As to the standard of play, Miss Vera Menchik's case proves that the attainment of a high level is not impossible. But emulation of her position by another of her sex at present seems too difficult a task. All the more therefore is organization important.

WOMEN OF EUROPE Taking up Chess

"At the last general assembly in August, 1935, a letter was put forward for consideration, from Mrs. A. M. S. Shannon of Ireland, in which she appealed to the International Federation, or rather to its constituent unions, to help to increase the number of women players and to raise their standard of play. She suggested that each Federation should organize annually a national championship for women. She pointed out that in the Women's World Championship then taking place in Warsaw few of the national federations—as a matter of fact there were seven—had entered representatives of whom three came from one country. She suggested that several strong players might have been without information to the tournament.

WOMEN OF EUROPE Taking up Chess

"Mrs. Shannon went on to propose that the Women's Championship competition should in future be open not merely to 12 but 20 entries, the federations inviting besides their champions other strong players; that it should be of the same duration as the men's tournament; and that more prizes should be offered.

WOMEN OF EUROPE Taking up Chess

"As far as we know, the countries with women's championships already in existence are Great Britain, Scotland, France, Holland, Poland, Russia and Spain. (New Zealand has now a women's championship). Unofficially, at Warsaw or since then, prizes were made by Austria, Denmark, Italy, Norway, Sweden, and the United States, to organize national women's championships. Some progress has been made up to now.

WOMEN OF EUROPE Taking up Chess

"In Sweden the Stockholm Allmanna Schackklub, which last August had only one woman member, Mrs. Shannon, now has 12, some of whom are playing in the club's usual tournaments, which is a new feature in Scandinavian chess.

"In the United States we hear that arrangements are well in hand for a women's tournament, with as many players as possible from different parts of the country, to decide who shall be the U. S. A. representative at Stockholm in 1937.

"The British Chess Magazine has last year or this, as far as it has gone, the names of various national women champions: France, Mlle. Paula Schwartzmann (also winner of the Paris women's title); Holland where this was the first occasion of a contest, Madame C. Roodsvant;
