Naturalized Player Rule May Cause Court Action

TORONTO (CP) — The Canadian Football League has legislated itself into a possible legal hassle by ruling last week that no member team can carry more than three naturalized Canadian players.

At least one United States-born naturalized import has consulted his lawyer about challenging the new CFL rule in court.

Six of the nine CFL clubs supported the rule change at the meeting last week in Ottawa. Previously, naturalized imports counted as native Canadians for the purposes of CFL rules which limit the number of U.S. imports on any one team to 14.

The new rule might violate the Ontario human rights code, which prohibits discrimination by employers on the grounds of place of origin as well as race, creed, color, nationality or ancestry.

In addition, it is an offence under the code even to ask an employee or prospective employee for information about his place of origin, race or religion.

HUNTER'S CORNER Recent Thaw Bares Ground And Gives Birds Relief

The recent thaws have bared the ground and given our game birds a welcome respite. The Huns that have survived winter's 'blitz' will have no food or grit problems for a time at least. They took a heavy beating this winter as trouble began on November 17th and gradually worsened. Sunday night December 6th a real tough snowstorm set in and by Monday night the countryside was pretty well snowbound. January was a wintry month with snow and approximately two feet deep on the level. This snow had two crusts one of which was heavy and prevented the Huns from securing grass, clover and grit. Our Huns took a heavy beating. Whole coveys went under on account of this lack. One covey is reported on the north side that got its grit requirements on the south side of a built up road bed. A covey of 14 was fed all winter by a farmer at Hillsboro and four have apparently made the grade at Birch Hill. A machine dozed out a farmer's lane and turned up considerable soil in the process. The four spent a lot of time pecking around the bare ground.

Observers among the farming community estimate a 90 percent loss among the hun covies but figure there is ample stock left for seed. Even one hundred pairs would suffice for that purpose. In sections bordering our main highways the loss was close to one hundred percent. Pheasants appear to have wintered well — the few we have that is. My daughter lives on the border of Winsloe and Highfield. One morning her five-year old daughter Linda rushed into the kitchen quite breathless and exclaimed: "Mother come

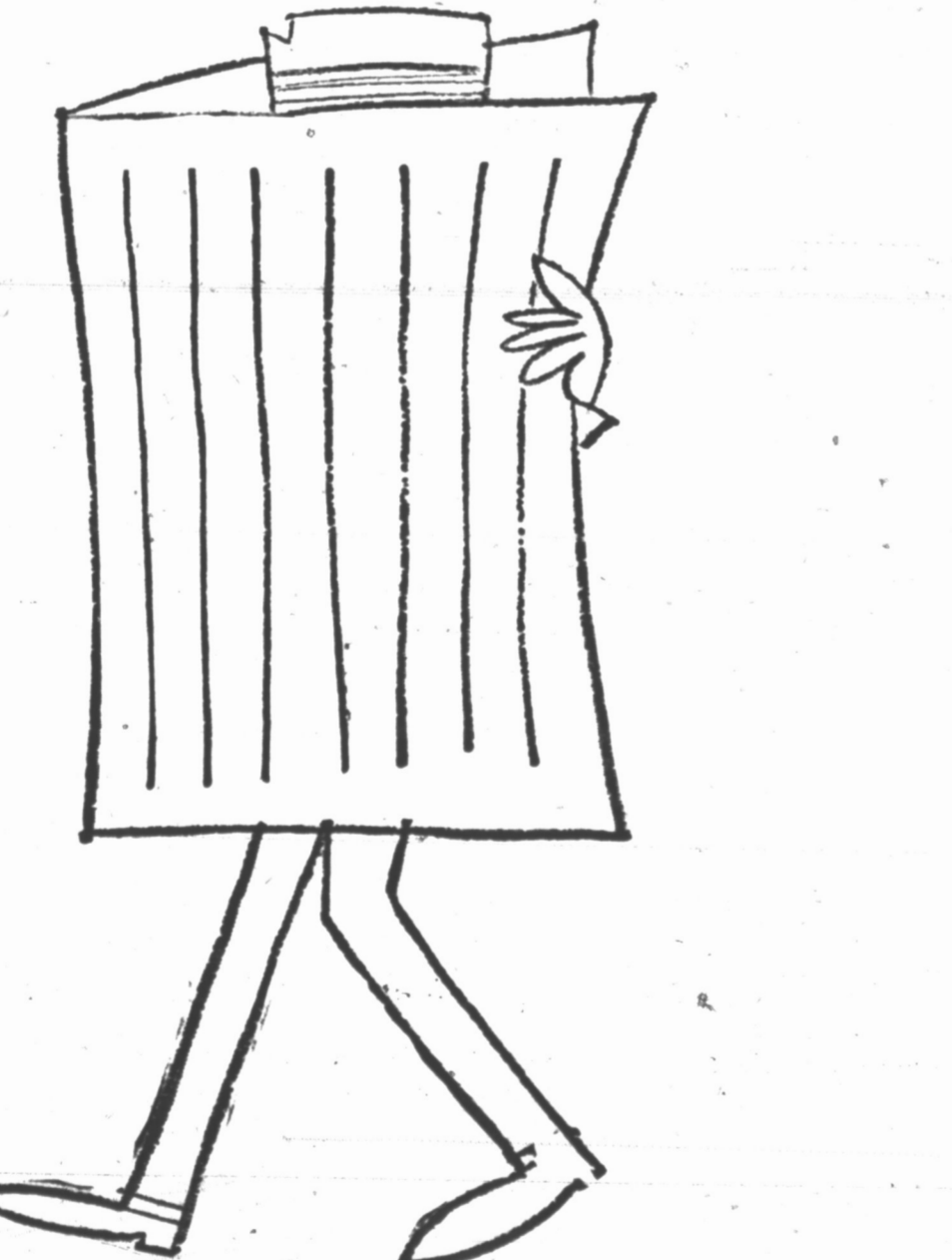
Combines Host Eagles Tonight

Game time is 9:15 p.m.

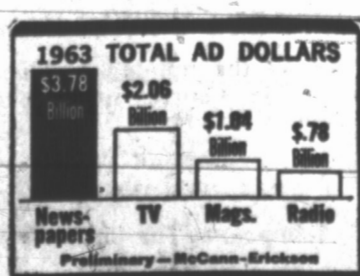

To be eligible a teacher must:

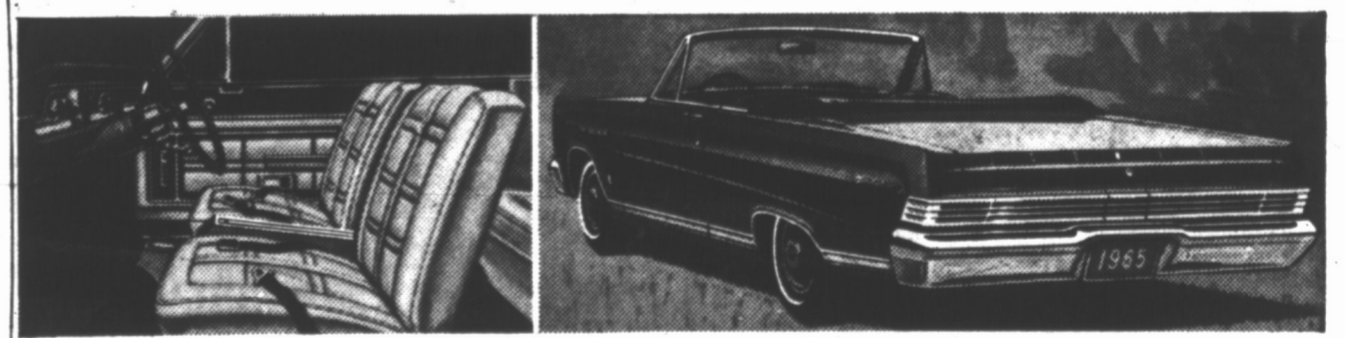
1. hold a Prince Edward Island teacher's license, and be actively engaged in teaching in P.E.I.
