

Score Leads Indians To 2-0 Shutout Over Chicago

There were three games and three heroics in major league daytime action Wednesday.

Herb Score pitched a three-hit shutout and struck out 13 Chicago batters as Indians defeated White Sox 2-0. In the other American League game, Murray Wall lived up to his name and slammed the door on a bases-loaded Baltimore rally in the ninth, preserving a 7-5 Boston victory over Baltimore Orioles.

In the only day game in the National League, shortstop Daryl Spencer smashed a clutch home run into left-field bleachers with one on and two out in the last of the ninth. The blow gave San Francisco Giants an 8-7 victory over St. Louis Cards.

In addition to the action at Cleveland, Boston and the Golden Gate, New York was to meet Washington in the U.S. capital at night while Detroit sat in at Kansas City.

Pittsburgh visited Philadelphia and Chicago dropped in at Los Angeles in National League night games. Milwaukee was at Cincinnati.

Left-hander Score, whose career almost ended when a line drive struck him in the eye last May 7, showed good control Wednesday. His curve was breaking sharply and his fast-ball was the blur of old. Score now stands 2-1, tossing his first shutout in a year. He walked three.

Indians scored in the second on Carroll Hardy's sacrifice fly after a double by Rocky Colavito and single by Chico Carrasquel. They added another off Billy Pierce in the third on Bob Avila's home run.

In Boston, Ted Williams, Jackie Jensen, Frank Malzone and Pete Runnels collected the vital blows in the 10-hit attack.

Congratulations are in order to Bathurst Papermakers on winning the Maritime senior hockey championship.

The Papermakers left little doubt as they soundly drubbed Charlottetown Royals 22-5 in the two-game total goal series. The Northern New Brunswickers were full value for their win and led a mighty well-balanced squad. The Papermakers' victory left no one asking for a further comparison of Northern New Brunswick hockey - and that played in other regions of the Maritimes.

Royals on the other hand had a most successful season as they finished in the runner-up position. They humbled two Nova Scotian outfits, North Sydney Combines and New Glasgow Rangers, something the Bluesoes didn't expect would happen.

But the future of senior hockey here is not bright. We are talking of course of league competition with mainland teams in the loop. Geographically we are not wanted by our mainland friends who maintain the cost of travel here is out of the question.

Amherst Ramblers started last season with the Royals and Summerside Aces but didn't last after February 1st. At that time they were regretting the fact that they ever got tied up with the three-team league.

26 Pound Trout Caught In Tenn.

NEW YORK (CP) — A brown trout weighing 26 pounds, two ounces, caught four days ago by George Langston on an eight-pound test line at Dale Hollow, Tenn., may be a North American record for that fish.

Field and Stream Magazine said that if Langston's specifications are certified, the fish will be the largest brown trout caught in North America since 1911, the year the magazine started keeping detailed records.

And Field and Stream added there is no evidence of a large brown trout having been caught in the United States or Canada before that date.

The world record is 39 pounds, eight ounces, caught in 1866 in Scotland, where they are called Loch Leven.

Valdes Takes Split Decision

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP)—Cuban heavyweight champion Nino Valdes scored a split decision over homegrown Mike DeJohn in a blood-spattered 10 - round, televised bout Wednesday night. DeJohn weighed 204, Valdes 206½.

Valdes won by a mere two points.

Referee Al Berle gave the Margin to DeJohn 5-4-1 while judge Bill Recht gave it to Valdes 6-4. Judge Bert Grant had the rounds even 5-5 but gave it to Valdes, eight points to six.

The defeat was the fourth in 39 fights for DeJohn. It was Valdes' 43rd victory against 15 losses and two draws.

DeJohn piled up points in the

first two rounds but began to wear under gruelling pressure from the eighth - ranked heavyweight.

Valdes opened a cut over DeJohn's left eye in the third round and his chopping inside punching spilled blood from the local boy's nose.
