Forced Labor For Welfare Meets General Rejection

Most government and welfare officials in Canada agree that attempts should be made to find jobs for able-bodied welfare recipients but they reject the idea that recipients should be forced to work on relief in the province.

In Saskatchewan to get all able-bodied men off the relief rolls within two weeks. He said able-bodied persons comprise only five per cent of the 25,000 persons now on relief in the province.
