

Tourist Sees Big Possibilities At Rocky Point

(By Doris Moore) On Saturday I went over to Rocky Point where I discovered one of the finest inland salt water bathing beaches in North America.

Instead of a full-scale summer resort I found nothing. To pass the time I took pictures of the following: A farmer driving a flock of geese.

A murky river with three ducks on it. Two people going up a road with a horse and buggy. I returned to the area of the beautiful beach. Quickly I visualized the possibilities of Rocky Point.

This would comprise a sprawling summer hotel, ultramodern in design with twenty to thirty good-sized cottages. Back from this a golf course would extend. There would be four sets of tennis courts each with four courts.

A spacious boat house with plenty of boats for rent would be a requisite. The hotel would be equipped with a main dining room and a grill room, the latter where dining and dancing would be combined.

It is to be remembered that tourists nowadays demand the ultra in food. If there is comfort along with it they'll remain a while; if there is scenery to delight the eye along with it, they'll remain longer; if there is dancing while they dine, they'll stay forever.

Now, these are all interests which will attract the tourist, as well as give recreation and entertainment to the Island people themselves.

Rocky Point could be utilized also as a winter resort. Skiing and skiing would predominate of the outside amusements. Tourists often have no other holiday in the whole year excepting those three to four weeks of the summer.

Find Husband Of Bartered Bride Had Three Other Wives. EDMONTON, Aug. 2 (CP) - The bizarre case of the "bartered bride" became more involved today, with reports that 71-year-old Alex Gokey had three other wives before entering what police termed a "fraudulent" marriage in Vancouver.

Meanwhile, Constable Lawrence Kenney of Jasper Place, Alta., where Gokey owns a pig farm, said today he is holding a warrant for Gokey's arrest on charges of abduction of a girl under 16.

Constable Kenney said he does not expect the warrant will be served for some time as Gokey, the girl's 18-year-old brother, Allan Ajas, and her 24-year-old sister-in-law, Jessie Ajas of Haney, B.C., stand on charges of contributing to juvenile delinquency.

Gokey is alleged to have participated in the "proxy" marriage of a 14-year-old girl at Vancouver last Friday.

At Jasper Place today, Constable Kenney also said he is checking records to substantiate the claim of a 63-year-old blind woman in an Edmonton hospital that she married Gokey in 1926 and was never divorced.

Yesterday, a woman living on Gokey's farm at Jasper Place said she had been Gokey's wife since 1942.

Constable Kenney also is checking information that Gokey was married to a fourth woman who died before the alleged second marriage took place.

Belgium Was Close To Revolt. BRUSSELS, Aug. 2 (Reuters) - Belgium was within 20 minutes of revolution Tuesday.

The capital was being stormed at 7 a.m. by King Leopold had not signed his proclamation quitting the throne at 6.40.

These facts were learned tonight from reliable sources close to the Government. They disclosed the full story of the dramatic moves that ended the 10-day monarchy.

It was the story of a tense clash between the King and even his staunch supporters in the all-Catholic cabinet, as the rioting Walloons marched on the heavily-guarded capital.

Corporation Profits In U.S.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2 (AP) - Corporation profits in the United States are running at a record rate, with the second-quarter total 43-per-cent higher than a year ago.

This upward surge developed without the stimulus of war which did not boost prices, sales and earnings until the start of the second half of the year.

A compilation made today by the Associated Press of the earnings of 450 corporations in all fields of business showed these totals: 1950 second quarter \$1,625,040,257. 1949 second quarter \$1,132,763,017. Increase: 43 per cent.

1950 first half \$2,865,306,259. 1949 first half \$2,319,616,453. Increase: 24 per cent.

Saint John Plans First Maritime Industrial Show

The Saint John Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the first exposition of "Maritime Made" produce. The exhibits, representing all the major producers of manufactured goods, will be on display from September 2nd to the 9th inclusive and are to be shown in the new \$1,100,000 Passenger and Immigration Building, West Saint John.

Although the Exposition will feature "Maritime Made" products, there will be a special section allotted to goods produced elsewhere. It is expected that more than a hundred exhibitors will take part. The following are some of the general groups of exhibits to be shown:

Form and marine equipment; building materials; household furnishings and supplies; food; business and industrial equipment; electrical goods; and hospital and medical supplies.

The Exposition will be held under the patronage of the Rt. Hon. C. D. Howe and visitors from the principal cities of Canada are invited to attend. Expected guests from P.E.I. are the Premier, J. W. Jones, and Mr. Cullen, the Minister of Industry. Premiers, Ministers and officials from the other three Maritime Provinces are also expected.

Representatives from Ottawa will include the Minister of Public Works, Hon. A. J. Fournier; C. Gustave Brauld, chief architect for the Dept. of Public Works, and other government officials.

Perhaps two of the main attractions at the Exposition will be a fashion show and a cooking school. Also of interest in the displays will be wares by the Enterprise Foundry Co. of Sackville and the James Robertson Co. of Saint John which will occupy four hundred and five hundred square feet respectively.

This exhibit will provide an opportunity for local and visiting buyers to see the produce which is available in the Maritimes. It should prove a stimulus to both producer and wholesale merchant, and introduce a new era in the economic life of the Maritime Provinces.

Orders Probe Of Liner's Grounding

OTTAWA, Aug. 2 (CP) - Transport Minister Chevrier announced today he has ordered a "formal investigation" into the July 12 grounding of the ocean liner Franconia.

The vessel, carrying 780 passengers, ran aground on the Island of Orleans as she was leaving Quebec harbor.

Earlier, Transport Department officials had stated that no formal investigation was planned. They said that on the basis of information obtained at a preliminary inquiry it was decided to suspend the pilot of the vessel.

Mr. Justice Arthur Ives Smith of the Quebec Superior Court will head the investigating commission.

Reports New Tool In Search For Cold Cure

BALTIMORE, Md., Aug. 2 (AP) - A scientist today reported he and his associates have discovered a new and important tool in the long search for something that will prevent or cure the common cold.

Using a Geiger counter and radio-active phosphorus they have found out how to tell whether a half-hatched chicken egg has a cold.

Dr. Thomas G. Ward of the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health, told of the discovery in the American Journal of Hygiene.

It is important because so far there has been no way of detecting simply whether a laboratory specimen contained the cold virus. The only way to find out was to inject the matter into human volunteers under complicated and carefully controlled conditions. It took time and each test series cost around \$1,000.

The new technique is still complicated and takes at least a day but it can be done in the laboratory. Dr. Ward indicated he already has learned new things about the common cold. He is not ready to talk about them yet because he hasn't had time for enough experiments to convince him they are true.

CNR Orders More Diesel Locomotives

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 2 - The Canadian National Railways have placed an order for 22 diesel locomotives, to cost approximately \$2,500,000, with General Motors Diesel Limited, London, Ontario, it was announced Monday by Donald Gordon, C.M.G., chairman and president of the national system.

The locomotives will be of 800 hp each and on their delivery, they will be assigned to service in various parts of Canada. They are to be 115 ton switchers, powered by an eight cylinder V type diesel engine and designed to cover yard, terminal and transfer requirements.

The purchase of an additional number of this type of diesel locomotive is in conformity with the announced policy of the railway in applying diesel power to its transportation requirements.

With the placing of this order the Canadian National will have in service or building 199 diesel locomotives. The new General Motors plant at London is the latest addition to Canada's large industries, and has just been completed and tooling for production.

NEWLY-LANDED

Continued from page 1 yielded within the last three days as the lines were reformed along strong natural barriers.

Latest to fall was flaming Kumchon, 35 miles northwest of Taegu, South Korean provisionally capital 60 miles northwest of Pusan. Reuters correspondent Lionel Hudson said Americans set the town ablaze and destroyed bridges along the highway to Taegu as they "reluctantly" retreated.

The withdrawal was intended to give time for marine and army reinforcements to make their weight felt at the front.

One American counter-thrust was halted along the Chinju-Pusan road, but the other appeared from the air to be moving ahead, east.

AP correspondent H. H. King with ground forces in the area said six strikes were made and fired the neighboring village of Sachon in a five-hour raid.

The Americans won high ground at Samgum, 10 miles east of Chinju, and took the town of Wungbong to the southwest of Chungnam which is 15 miles east of Chinju, King said. Red troops, however, closed in behind the American positions.

Dupont Co. To Develop H-Bomb

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP) - The United States Government today apparently gave the Dupont Company top responsibility for developing the hydrogen bomb.

An Atomic Energy Commission announcement said the big chemical firm has been selected to design, construct and operate new facilities to produce materials for atomic weapons or fuels potentially useful for power purposes.

Company officials said "the project is of vital importance to the security of the United States."
