Peakes' Bombers defending champions of the King's County Baseball League, overpowered Mount Stewart 11-1 Sunday afternoon at Mount Stewart in the third and final game of their best-of-three semi-final series played before nearly 3,000 fans.

His batter partner, catcher Merlin Devine, came up with the best game of his career and nailed five Mount Stewart runners attempting to take liberties on the base paths.

Ernie Crane started on the mound for the losers and gave way to Art Coffin in the fourth. Both hurlers were hit hard by the victors who had a total of 14 base knocks.

CHICAGO (AP)—Ted Kluszewski, snatched from the National League to provide pennant-bound Chicago with some power, came through Monday to lead the White Sox to 2-1 and 13-7 victories over Kansas City.

Kluszewski smashed a pair of homers to spark Chicago's second-game victory. His single in the third inning of the opener was the key hit in providing the White Sox with their 32nd one-run triumph this season.

FANCY QUEEN WINS FEATURE Mighty Lee Shatters Sackville Downs Record

HALIFAX (CP)—Fancy Queen, a fast-stopping four-year-old mare, topped to the Martlet time pacing championship here Monday in the featured two-dash free-for-all event on an eight-dash harness racing card at nearby Sackville Downs.

The Harry Hirsch-owned mare topped the summary to win the major share of the \$2,500 purse, richest in the three-year history of the event.

But it was Mighty Lee, champion of Prince Edward Island race circles, that sent the 4,000 fans into a frenzy with his record-shattering 2:04 mile in the second dash of the feature event.

Fancy Queen, who won the first heat of the two-dash championship, chased the Lee horse to the wire for a place. Mighty Lee an early leader in the first dash, finished fifth.

Mighty Lee's mile was a full second faster than the track record held jointly by Convar and Fancy Queen. The Sydney horse equalled the mark in the first heat Monday.

Convar, owned by Francis Breaux of Moncton, finished fourth and seventh.

Rainbow Clegg placed in the first event and dropped to fourth in the final heat, while Moncton's Walter Rosecroft was third and sixth.

Mighty Lee returned \$15.00 in his winning mile, which was one-fifth of a second slower than his 2:03 4-5 mile July 30 at Charlottetown.

Crystal Maid and Runnymede Beale were double winners on the card. Close to \$48,000 spilled through pari-mutuel windows.

Tiger-Cats Maul Argonauts 37-3

HAMILTON (CP)—Hamilton Tiger-Cats mauled Toronto Argonauts 37-3 Monday in a five-straight triumph without a defeat in Big Four Football Union competition.

The game was played before a record crowd of 24,425 in the revamped Civic Stadium.

The Ticats contained everything the Argonauts could throw at them in the line of offensive play. They gained momentum slowly, leading by a converted touchdown in the first quarter. It was 17-3 at half time and 31-3 at the end of the third quarter.

Tom Dublinski finally got into action for Hamilton and fired touchdown passes to Zeno Karcz and Paul Dekker. Bernie Faloney hurried one to Ron Howell and Gerry McDougall connected to Tommy Grant from a Faloney pithout.

The latter inserted one of football's most forgotten plays in the last quarter when he put Arqs squarely on the spot with a second-down quick kick that went the length of the field.
