HEREDITARY TRANS-

MISSION OF QUALITY.

It was said by a noted character that had he had the choosing of his grandfather he might have had a far better reputation than he had. He struck a great truth, it applies not only to black sheep among the bipeds, but equally to the wool bearers. The progenitor of the flock answers for the next two or three generations. It has even been known that a ram has left his marks upon the flock for several generations, both for good and evil. Thus the ram is half the flock, and may be more. But the ewe is not to be neglected. She embodies the spirit of the sire in the lamb; and as she is permitted to do it, she will succeed or fail in this natural function. It will not do then to spend money in getting a sire, and neglect the ewe, whose influence for ill may spoil the good of the ram, then the ewe sees to be helped to give full effect to the vigour of the sire. This is done by feeding and general good care. But good care does not include any coddling. This is not good for a sheep, which wants the pure breath of heaven to carry off the great amount of bodily heat concentrated in the wool clothed carcasses. The food of a sheep does not require so much carbonaceous matter as any other animal, on account of its heavy fleece, by which it is protected against a loss of vital heat induced by the food. On the other hand, it needs more of the nitrogen, or flesh-forming elements of food, for the fleece has just the same quantity of these elements in it as the flesh and skin have. Here are the figures to prove this:

Composition of flesh.	Skin.	Wool.
Carbon, per cent....51.83..	50.0 ..	50.65
Hydrogen, per cent, 7.57...	7.0	7.03
Nitrogen, per cent. 15.01..	18.7	17.07
Oxygen, per cent. 21.37	23.0	24.60

The rest consists of mineral matter, sulphur, etc.

This should be a revelation to the shepherd in regard to the feeding of his flock. Let us compare the fleece with an equal quantity of live weight. The wool is practically free from water, save a little moisture, while the flesh has 75 per cent. of it. Thus one pound of wool may represent four pounds of flesh. Think of this when we weigh a ram of 100 pounds which has a fleece of from 15 to 20 pounds. The fleece really stands before us, equal in every respect of nutrition and exhaustive effect on the little animal, as its whole live weight, and has taken quite as much of every element of nutrition from the food. But how many shepherds think this when the ewes are building up the lamb, and her fleece too, and has to maintain herself as well? Then with what care should the good shepherd treat the pregnant ewe, to carry them safely over the crisis of the year's existence.

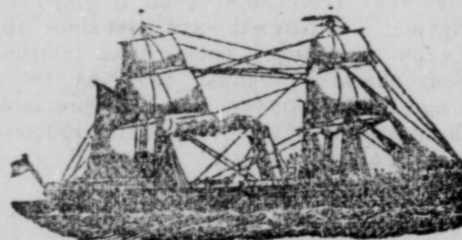
We are apt to give not too much prominence to the breeding of our animals, thinking that as like produces like all we have to do is to procure some well-bred stock, and trust to them to transmit their good qualities to the progeny. This is all very well for a beginning, but the future is to be considered, for it must not be forgotten that, like a man's good character which has been built up by a score of years of honest dealing, and may be lost in a few days by some fault, so with our animals—the result of a score or two of years of careful breeding may be lost by one year's neglect in feeding. And thus it is that we must secure the hereditary transmission of every good quality, by maintaining these by the very best feeding and care. And especially is this a matter in which South African sheep farmers should pay the utmost regard and attention. Cape sheep at their best are not stock over which much "coddling" can be indulged in, and this makes it all the more imperative that the very best quality of stock should not be ruthlessly sacrificed at the shambles. A good deal of the poor quality of wool produce seen at the London sales is directly traceable to a want of better breeding stock, and likewise better attention in the shape of better feeding; and South Africa will never come up to the high standard of excellence attained by other British colonies till that is carefully and perseveringly done.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES

Montreal Star: The financial returns for October remind us that the "party of economy" is still in power. The expenditure on consolidated fund for the month was higher even than last year; the expenditure on capital account was three times as large as last year. Taking the first four months of the fiscal year ending with October, it is seen that the expenditure under consolidated fund has gone up when contrasted with that of last year; that the expenditure on capital account has increased nearly three-fold; and that both the gross debt and the net debt have grown unconformably.
