Land Tax, 1897

Owners of property are reminded that by the recent amendment to the Assessment Act, the system of valuing property for Land Tax has been changed, and it is necessary that new valuations and declarations be made this year. Such declarations to be made by the owner, occupier or agent, before the Provincial Treasurer or Deputy Receiver of the district.
 In valuing property the value of the buildings must be included.
 The rate of tax for 1897 is one fifth of one per cent, or 20c on every \$100 of valuation.
 The tax will be due on the 1st December. A discount of 5 per cent. will be allowed if paid on or before the 15th Nov., 1897.

THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.


Items of Interest Boiled Down For More Easy Reading.
 Fredericton's new opera house is to be opened on Monday next by the Miles Stock Company.
 The Spanish cabinet council has approved the proposal of political amnesty for Cuba and the Philippines.
 An English agriculturist has succeeded in the cross-fertilization for grasses, clover, cereals, and other good plants.
 Mr. Sheppard, the Canadian commissioner to Brazil, has, on account of the troubles there gone over the Andes to Chili.
 A floating dry dock, built in England and spacious enough to accommodate large ironclads, recently arrived at Havana.
 The commissioner of agriculture has in preparation a bulletin, which will shortly be issued, explaining how to prepare and ship poultry for the British market.
 Harvard this year, for the first time, has a negro as a candidate for the degree of A. B., in the person of a young colored woman from Millerton, N. Y.
 David Cowrie, an engineer of Hamilton, Ont., is claiming \$35,000 indemnity for the imprisonment of his son in Cuba by the Spanish war authorities.
 The general opinion in London is that Great Britain will not give her consent to the American-Russian-Japanese sealing agreement to abstain from pelagic sealing.
 The German Government has ordered that the necessary measures be taken at Peking to obtain redress for the outrage upon its missionaries at Yon Chefu, two of whom were killed.
 A recent fad of Herr Krupp, the German ironmaster, is said to have been the use of iron as a mineral for his visiting cards. The plate was rolled as thin as the most faintly cardboard.
 The Amalgamated Society of Engineers has issued another manifesto, supplicating the workmen of Great Britain, Ireland and other countries to provide \$50,000 weekly to defend trade unionism.
 Two Mauritius postage stamps of the issue of 1858, belonging to Dr. Legrand's collection have been sold for 48,000 francs (\$12,000) to M. Bernishon, of Paris. There are only 17 impressions of these stamps in existence.
 A church has been built out of one big tree at Santa Rosa, Cal. The whole structure and its furniture were made from one goodly specimen of sequoia. The interior is finished and panelled in wood also and there were a lot of shingles left over.
 A Kansas City church, not content with offering inducements to bicyclers to attend services by providing a safe place for their wheels, will establish a Sunday morning nursery, where mothers can leave their babes while they themselves listen to the sermon.
 Forty-five years in bed is the record of Miss Clark, of Chatteris, in Cambridgeshire, Eng., who died recently. She was disappointed in love and shut herself up in her bedroom, which she never left alive. She was well off, and occupied herself with fancy needlework.
 Tobacco experts say that the cheapest cigar that J. Pierpont Morgan smokes costs him not less than \$1.25. His cigars are made in Havana, of tobacco selected especially for him by an expert whom he sends to Cuba every year, and made up without regard to cost.
 Thirty-three thousand persons will be on the pay-roll of Greater New York, and twenty-two thousand more will draw pay indirectly through city contracts. So, although 235,000 voted for Tammany, nearly one in every four stands a chance of getting some substantial return.
 A terrible famine is ravaging the province of Arshangel a portion of European Russia, in the extreme north, extending from the Ural Mountains on the east to Finland on the west. Many have already died of starvation. The people wander about reduced almost to skeletons.
 The British Columbia sealing fleet returns, just completed, show the catch this year to be 36,410 skins, with an average of 741 skins per vessel. This, compared with the catches of 1896, includes a material falling off, largely due to the restrictions placed on the industry. Returns for 1896 show a total catch of 55,677, or an average of 843 skins per vessel.
 While England is fighting on the Afghan frontier Russia is building military roads in the Pamir region close to the boundary of India. One has just been completed over the Ak-Baital Pass at a height of 15,000 feet. It can be used by carts and was begun in July. Another has been made near the Kains Tata boundary, and it was intended to complete another before the cold weather set in at the Bordoba boundary in the Allai Valley.

LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVE MEETING IN BELFAST.
 At a large and representative gathering of the Liberal-Conservative Association for Belfast, held at Eldon, on Wednesday, the 10th inst., the following resolutions were unanimously passed: Moved by M. G. Anderson, Gravel Cove, seconded by A. A. Moore, Fownal:—
 Resolved, That much as we disbelieve in their general policy, in order to give the Government a fair and untrammelled opportunity of carrying out their railway promises, this convention, in view of the pressing need and paramount importance of railway facilities for this electoral district as well as for Murray Harbor, after deliberation, agrees to allow the Government's nominee for Attorney General, Mr. H. C. McDonald, to take his seat without opposition provided that, before nomination day, Mr. McDonald shall give reasonable assurance that the promises made during the last local election as to the construction of the railway, will be carried out.
 Further Resolved, That this convention adjourn to meet at the Masonic Temple, on Wednesday, Nov. 17th, at 10 o'clock.

The vigorous foreign policy of France evidently costs something. The tax bill of the people grows heavier. No wonder that we hear mutterings of discontent. The Budget Committee the other day definitely agreed to a scheme for raising 10,000,000 francs by a tax on foreign securities, and 16,000,000 francs by an increased stamp duty on foreign State loans. The motor carriage, through a novelty, has already been pretty heavily taxed. This last item of taxation is graduated according to the size of the town or city in which the owner of the carriage lives. In Paris the tax is 60fr off, for carriages seating two persons, and rising to 100fr. But in towns of 40,000 population it is graduated from 49fr. to 75fr., and still lower for towns of smaller dimensions and less population.
