

# Large Daily Double Pay Highlights Racing Action

**SUMMER SIDE** — New records, good fast times and, especially, large pays, were the order of the night at the Raceway here last night.

The fastest mile of the evening came in the second dash when Wayne's Pride, a 6-year-old chestnut gelding owned by Leigh Clark of Summerside and driven by Clarkie Smith, did the twice around the oval in 2:10.7.

This was a new lifetime mark for the Son of Ableway, out of Bonny Frisco.

Also taking new tabs were Topway in the seventh race and Askit in the fifth.

Askit, a 4-year-old bay gelding reined by Emmett Bernard, lowered his mark to 2:14.1 in beating out a field of seven others in the fifth while Topway, a 6-year-old bay mare owned by W. McArthur of Kensington, took a new tab of 2:13 flat in the seventh.

There were no double dash winners on the eight-dash card. Other winners were: Dale Regent, Shelton Byrd, Rio Grande, Mountain Jester and Windy June.

The upset winner of the night was Topway in the seventh. A win ticket on the gelding in this race returned a terrific \$41. The gelding also combined with Shelton Byrd in the second daily double to pay \$290.40. The first double, on the first and second dashes, paid \$111.50; the quinella on the fourth, \$23.20, and the exactor on the eighth, \$49.20.

## Hockey Player Stresses School

**EDMONTON (CP)** — John Utendale, one of the few Negroes ever to play professional hockey, thought hockey was the only thing that mattered when he was 17.

Now 27, he recently received a bachelor's degree in physical education from University of Alberta. As a teacher, he figures he's in a good position to help youngsters avoid his mistake.

"I should have taken a scholarship to University of Colorado in 1955," he says. "I'd have my education completed by now."

"But hockey meant everything then and I thought I could eventually reach the National League."

If he had taken the scholarship, he admits, he would be less vocal in encouraging young athletes to choose education over professional sport.

"I tell any boy who's interested to complete at least his high school education in his home town while playing the best calibre of hockey available."

"Then I tell boys to accept the best offer they get to attend university. If they're interested in professional hockey, university won't retard their development. Bill Hay (Chicago centre) and Red Berenson (Montreal winger) have proved that."

Wary of living out of suitcases while playing for minors and senior amateur clubs across Canada, Utendale attended University of British Columbia in 1959-60 for one winter semester and one summer session to qualify as a teacher.

## Aussies Clarke Shatters Record

**OSLO, Norway (AP)**—Australia's Ron Clarke shattered the 26-minute barrier for the 10,000-metre run and eclipsed two world records Wednesday night with a fantastic time of 27:39.4 over the fast Bislet Stadium track.

The tall, lean Aussie was clocked en route at 26:47.0 for six miles, surpassing the pending world record for that distance.

Clark's time for the 10,000 metres — about 6 1/4 miles — was 34.6 seconds faster than his pending world mark of 28:14.0 set at Turku, Finland, last June 16.

The 28-year-old Aussie time for the six miles smashed to bits the pending mark of 27:11.6 racked up by two Americans, Billy Mills and Gerry Lindgren, last month.

**SAID HE'D DO IT**  
 Clarke had declared he was going to break the world records for both six miles and 10,000 metres.

Only last Saturday the phenomenal Aussie smashed the 13-minute barrier for three-miles with a time of 12:52.4 in cracking another world mark.

Clarke was cheered on from the first lap by an enthusiastic crowd of about 17,000.

As he headed into the last lap within his grasp, the fans jumped to their feet and cheered a tremendous ovation.

Earlier in the opening day of the two-day international meet, American Ron Whitley took the 400-metre hurdles in handy fashion. He was timed in 51.2 seconds. Norway's Jan Gulbrandsen was second in 52.9 and George Shepherd of Toronto was third in 54.3.

## Manager States Mays Difference

**MINNEAPOLIS (AP)** — As long as the National League has marvelous Willie Mays in the lineup it will continue to dominate the American League in All-Star competition.

Willie did it again Tuesday when he hit a leadoff home run, walked twice and scored the winning run in the National's 6-5 triumph. As a result the National won its seventh in the last eight All-Star decisions and edged ahead in the long series for the first time.

"Mays was the difference," said Bobby Bragan, the Milwaukee manager who acted as a coach under manager Gene Mauch of Philadelphia.

Step by step Mays is moving in on the long line of records that Stan Musial left when he finally retired after appearing in 24 All-Star games. In the 16 games in which Willie has appeared the National owns a 10-5-1 edge.

Willie erased one of Musial's marks when he raised his hit total to 21 with his first-inning homer. Mays' total of nine runs batted in is only one short of Musial's National League high of 20, set three behind Ted Williams's All-Star mark of 12. His All-Star batting average is a hot .385.

When Willie arrived late Sunday night from Philadelphia there was doubt he would be able to play. He had suffered a severely bruised hip in a home plate collision with catcher Pat Corrales of the Phils Saturday night.

# Pro Golfer Joey Campbell Takes First Day's Lead

**TORONTO (CP)**—Joe Campbell of Perdido Bay, Fla., who hadn't seen the course until he stood on the first tee, spanked the par 70 Mississauga Club layout Wednesday for a first-under-par 66 and took the first-round lead in the \$100,000 Canadian open golf championship.

Respected Mason Rudolph of Clarksville, Tenn., finished a stroke behind the indefatigable Campbell with 67.

Jack Nicklaus of Columbus, Ohio, Masters winner, was in a group of 69 along with defending champion Kel Nagle of Australia, but they had to watch half a dozen with 68 move in ahead of them.

Al Johnston of Montreal, was in the two-under-par bracket at 68. So was Bruce Devlin of Australia.

Arnold Palmer of Latrobe, Pa., stormed down he back nine in three-under-par 32 to finish with even par 70 among nearly a score of others.

**LOOSE GAME**  
 Gary Player of South Africa, winner of the U.S. Open, had trouble keeping his game together and finished with 74.

It was a day for the victory-starved tourists. Campbell hasn't won a tournament since 1962 and Rudolph's last win was last year.

Campbell, 29, said he liked the course—a tight course, "not a test of strength" and was happy that he "is playing as well now as I have ever played."

He makes his home in Knoxville, Tenn. and was on the starting tee nine hours after his arrival at midnight.

This is Campbell's fourth appearance in the Canadian Open. His best in earlier tournaments was a tie for 13th in 1963.

Campbell missed par only once, overshooting the third green.

Rudolph putted well, sinking one birdie putt after getting out of a trap.

Nicklaus said he was satisfied he is playing better and feels much encouraged.

Nagle played steadily with a birdie and eight pars on the front nine.

Palmer took a shaky three-over-par 38 front nine but came home strong with 32.

Al Johnston's 68 was the highlight of a good showing by Canadian pros. George Knudson of Toronto, a regular on the tour, finished late with par 70, in the same big bracket with Adria Bigras of Montreal, Quebec Open winner, and Bob Rose of Toronto.

Lawrence O'Hearn of Halifax, comparative newcomer in pro ranks, had 72.

Campbell twice missed the fairway on his tour but was it only one trap. He one-putted seven greens, including the last three.

In the last two tournaments on the tour he placed seventh in the St. Paul Open and tied for fourth in the Western Open. In the spring he was third in the Azalea Open at Wilmington, N.C.

So far this year he has won \$14,100 on the tour, standing 42nd on the list.

Rudolph, who plays out of Lehigh Acres, Fla., was steady and only his miscue at the home hole cost him a tie with Campbell. He came out of a trap at the fifth to sink a birdie putt and one-putted three holes the rest of the way for birdies.

# Roughriders' Ball Team Blends The Old And New

**REGINA (CP)** — Three new coaches, a realigned front wall and a familiar, explosive backfield will carry Saskatchewan Roughriders' hopes for a Western Football Conference playoff berth this season.

Eagle Keys, former Edmonton Eskimo head coach, became Roughriders' field leader after Bob Shaw departed for Toronto. Keys has a tough act to follow: Shaw led Saskatchewan to third place in both 1963 and 1964.

An assistant to Shaw last season, Keys faced the problem of replacing veteran Canadian tackle Bill Clarke and import centre - linebacker Neil Habig, five times a WFC all-star.

Habig, a Purdue University graduate, announced he plans to remain in the United States, and Clarke has finally yielded to, advancing age and sore knees, a realigned front wall and a familiar, explosive backfield will carry Saskatchewan Roughriders' hopes for a Western Football Conference playoff berth this season.

He joins imports Clyde Brock of Utah, Tom Holmgren of North Dakota, and Wayne Tydik of New Mexico at tackle with veteran Canadians Len Legault and Reg Whitehouse.

Wayne Shaw and Benedict were the only certain returnees at guard.
