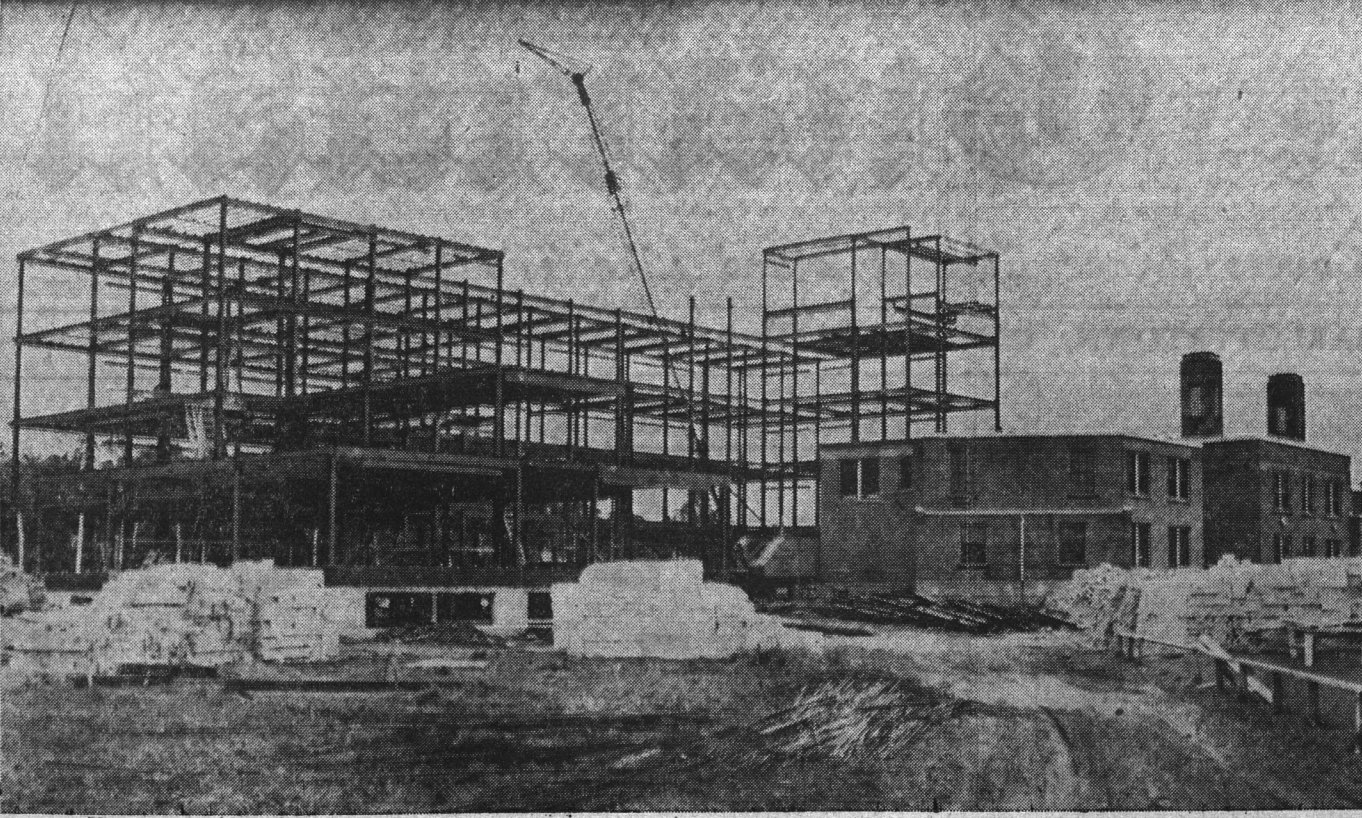

The delays have been caused through weather, excavation problems and other minor mishaps.

The Convention will be presided over by the Provincial President, A. C. MacEachern.

Precautions Relaxed As Big Storm Veers Away From P.E.I.

Precautions taken for the impending threat of hurricane "Daisy" were relaxed last evening with the lowering of storm warnings in the area as the fourth hurricane of the season veered from its apparent path over the Maritime Provinces to pursue a course almost parallel to the south coast of Nova Scotia. Protective measures were taken for sea and air transportation and also for communication and power installations as the prospect of a big blow appeared imminent. At the RCAF Station at Summerside all aircraft other than five Neptunes were housed in hangars, while the big planes were pointed on the strip ready for a take-off to Montreal should the hurricane hit the province. Northumberland Ferries cancelled all crossings after 11 a. m. and did not resume operations throughout the day. The first crossing will be made this morning if the seas and weather conditions are favorable. In Charlottetown members of the Yacht Club pulled their boats up on the shore in order to prevent any damage occurring to the boats.

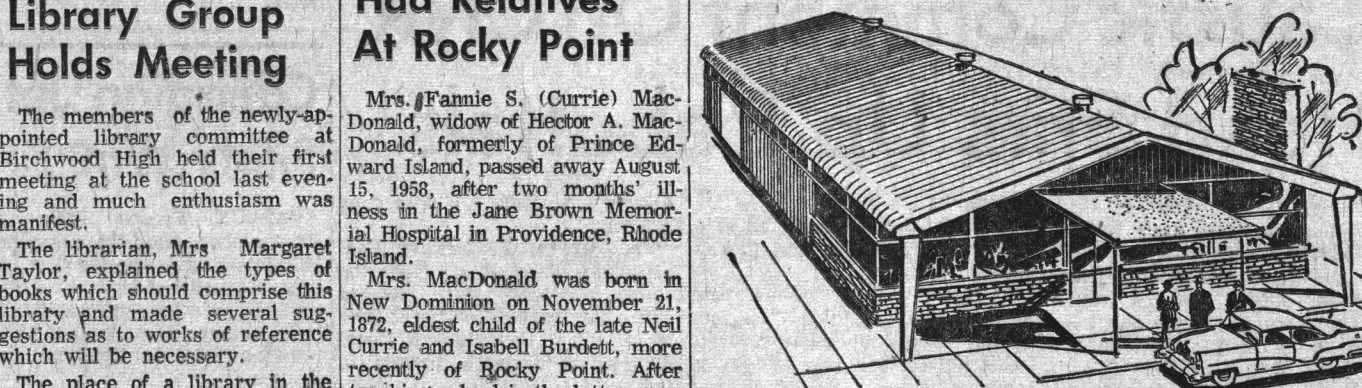
Birchwood High Library Group Holds Meeting
