

Moncton Man Is Injured In Accident Near Borden Sunday

Mr. Ralph Belmont, of Moncton, N.B., is a patient in the Prince County Hospital, seriously injured as a result of a car accident which occurred at Ross's Corner at 12.30 a.m. Sunday morning. Mr. Belmont was a passenger in a car driven by R. John David Carroll, also of Moncton, and they were proceeding on the highway when the accident occurred.

The car, a 1952 DeSoto, containing Mr. Carroll and Mr. Belmont met another car at the approach to the bridge at Ross's Corner and pulled over to the right to pass. On the pavement caused the car driven by Carroll to leave the highway and roll over, coming to a stop wheels upright.

The other car, which has not been identified, took the two men to the Prince County Hospital.

Mr. Belmont was reported last evening to be suffering from a dislocated neck. His legs were in a paralyzed condition and his attending physician said last evening that it was too soon to know whether this condition would be permanent.

He had been in an unconscious condition all during the day but had regained consciousness last night.

Mr. Carroll was uninjured and was released from hospital after a medical examination.

"Once again I have the privilege of assessing the value of the services rendered to our community and to the peoples of other lands by the members of our Abegweit Chapter.

"We have all heard with the greatest interest the reports of the convenors of the various departments and I do not intend to go into further detail. It has been an active year. Through our treasurer we learn that our money was made by means of a rummage sale, flower show, tag days and the lottery of a Christmas hamper. These are all up to last year's standard and the two latter considerably above. This is encouraging.

The most direct assistance has been to a young nurse for glasses etc.

"Our interest in the promotion of culture has been demonstrated through the flower show and music and drama festival scholarships.

"A most delightful afternoon tea given by our gracious provincial president, Mrs. Frowie at Government House June last, was a happy occasion on which to meet the other members of the I.O.D.E. on the Island.

"It has been an active and successful year and I do want to thank you all for your part in making it so. I personally am more than grateful for the friendship, loyalty and efficiency of our secretary, treasurer and other members of the executive and those who have undertaken to convene the various projects through the year.
